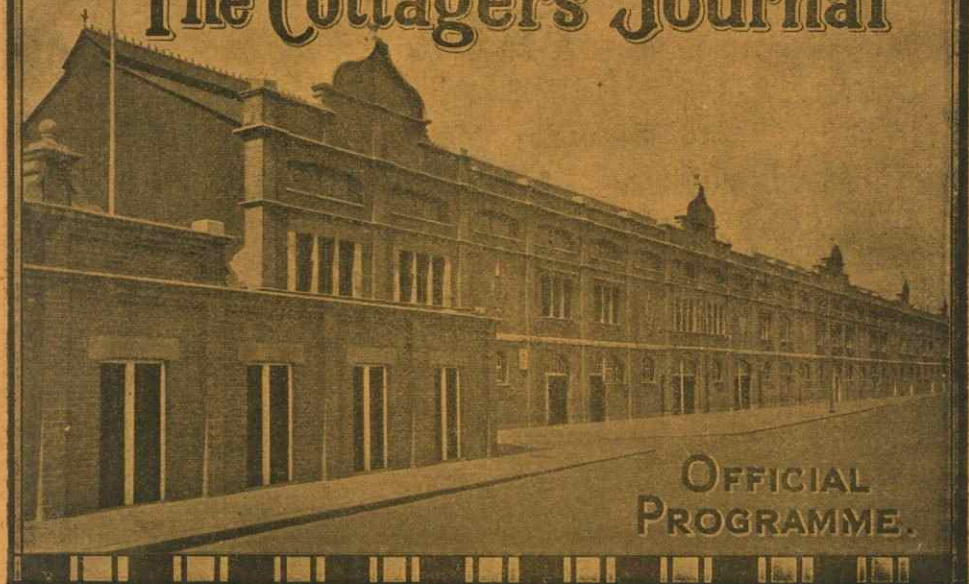

NOTES FROM THE BOARD ROOM

Our feelings have been rather mixed of late regarding the form of the League team. First we passed out of the Cup quite creditably, for there was nothing wrong with the side as it played under handicap at Nottingham against the Forest; then there was disappointment in only drawing with a crippled Exeter side, enhanced considerably by only just scraping home against Merthyr, winding up with a brilliant rally to win at Southend.

It would have been an unpardonable disaster had we failed to beat the Welsh club, but we never are seen to any advantage against weak opposition. It was a different story at the Essex resort, where we had Bert Rosier back in the defence, and he played an inspired game against his old club. His return enabled Albert Barrett to move into his proper place in the half back line, and he, together with every other member of the side, gave about their best display of the season.

With regard to our skipper you will have read that there was a prospect of Barrett being transferred to Sunderland. It is quite true that negotiations were made with this

object in view. We are loth to part with Albert, but, realising that it would have been a big step of advancement for him to have gone North, as in the case of Manchester City last season, we agreed to a transfer. The matter was left with Barrett himself to decide, and he again emphasised that he has no desire to reside out of London; thus nothing was done.

The sincere sympathy of the Club generally and all connected with it is extended to the Chairman, Mr. John Dean, in a sad bereavement which has overtaken him under tragic circumstances. His brother, Mr. Thomas Dean, while driving his car to his office in Manchester died suddenly at the wheel, the car continuing to run and became a wreck. Fortunately it was not in a busy part of the city. Mr. Thomas Dean was one of the original shareholders of Fulham and it was his influence which brought our Chairman into the game to become a real good friend of the Cottagers. The funeral took place yesterday at Hammersmith Cemetery.

TALES OF THE COTTAGERS.

By "The Baker's Man."

First of all I want to get the unpleasant stuff off my chest, and I feel compelled to hand out the cane to the team that played against Merthyr. As one critic remarked, they ought to have won by twenty goals, and this is not much of an exaggeration, for the Welsh club was easily the weakest League combination I have ever seen. That we only scrambled home by the odd goal in nine is difficult to understand, and the more one thinks about it the more one marvels at our comparative failure.

The boys tell me that in such circumstances they can hardly help themselves dropping to the low level of the opposition, and I know the moral effect of all this. The trouble was that they found things so easy, and two goals came very quickly, that they slipped into bottom gear unconsciously and could not get the clutch in again. What an opportunity was lost to give our goal average an appearance that would have given some of the clubs a shock, and what a difference it might have made at the end of the season. Plymouth Argyle could testify to the value of percentages.

THE REVIVAL.

What a pleasant change there was a week ago at Southend, where the United were beaten by two goals to one, though some of the critics have been inclined to minimise the value of the victory. The one goal margin does not represent our superiority; only a capital display between the posts by our old player, McKenna, prevented our triumph being a substantial one. Temple got his usual goal, and Hammond, who scored the other, showed a remarkable revival of form. The whole team, however, played excellently.

Rosier was fit enough to resume

at back, and he came back with renewed enthusiasm which had a good effect on the team generally. Barrett was thus able to revert to half back, a position I always like him best in, and it was one of the features of the game the manner in which our halves had a strangle-hold on the United attack, Shankly, who has been busy among the goals of late, and got four out of five the week before at Shepherd's Bush, being completely blotted out of the picture. It was a most satisfactory return to the best form the team has shown this season.

THE DISPUTED GOAL.

A lot has been written about the dispute over the Southend goal, and the general opinion was that the referee made a mistake in allowing it. The ball certainly was put in the net, but the game ought to have been stopped before then. Beecham had fallen in gathering a long chance drive from a half back, and before he could recover a crowd of players were on top of him in a scramble in which he was fortunate to escape serious injury. That a goal should be recorded against him under such circumstances seemed to be a miscarriage of justice.

We completed a very satisfactory double with the Southend club, for at the Cottage here we beat the United Reserves in the London Combination by six goals to one. The boys gave a capital exhibition, playing really good football. It was pleasing to see Teddy Craig fit again and in a scoring mood. He got a couple of the goals, the other four being equally divided between Proud and Avey.

gress towards recovery, and with a clean bill of health we still have a chance of making a bold bid for promotion. Len Oliver is all right again, and there was a prospect of him being able to resume his place in the team this afternoon. Johnny Price has been indulging in light training all the week, and he will very soon be ready for service, and so is Binks. Goalkeeper Owen is having trouble with a knee, which may take two or three weeks to mend.

Yes, we really have a chance of getting back to the Second League, though Brentford are making a sultry pace at the head of affairs. Their wonderful home record, all 15 games played having been won—shall we stop the run next Saturday?—is something to think about, and Brighton and Northampton are speeding up, though Plymouth do not now seem so sure of themselves. We are treading on the heels of this quartette, and the remaining programme will be of particular interest.

A VISIT FROM LUTON.

This afternoon we receive a visit from Luton, and are hopeful of making amends for the 1—4 defeat the Strawplaiters inflicted on us earlier in the season. The Bedfordshire club have hardly come up to expectations this season, the illness of their manager, Mr. McCartney, who has now retired, no doubt having had much to do with this. George Kay, the former West Ham captain, is now in command, and there has been an improvement, the last three home games having been won. They still have only one away victory to their credit, at Watford in September.

An accident to Rennie, their Scottish centre forward, who had been a prolific goal scorer, which kept him out of the team for several months, crippled the attack. It was thought at one time that he would never be able to play any more, but he re-

turned to the side and in something like his old form in the match won a week ago against the Rangers. The visitors are a far more useful combination than their position in the League suggests. We were hopeful of having Oliver fit to resume for this game.
