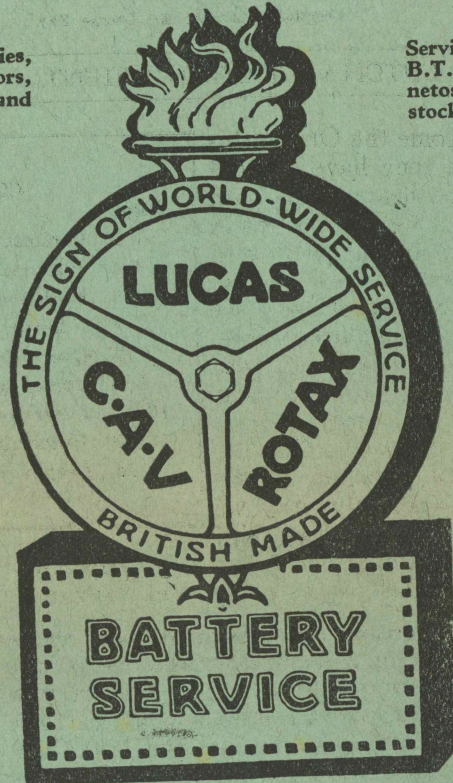

The Reserves won the Cup in 1896-7, when they beat Dunstable Town; in 1899-1900, when they beat Bedford Queens; 1900-01, when they beat Arlesey Town; in 1901-02 beat Luton Amateurs after a drawn game; 1903-04 beat Luton Clarence; 1905-06 beat Arlesey. They have not played in this competition since the War, but in 1921-22, the first season of the Competition, they took part in the Beds. Premier Cup Competition and won the trophy at the first time of asking. They have not taken part in the Competition since then until this season, and they are in the final, to meet Bedford Town or Biggleswade and District.

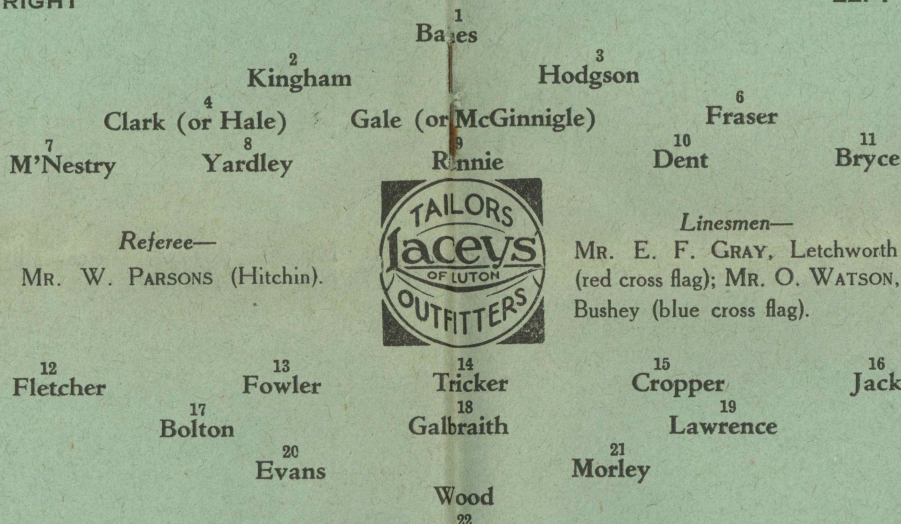

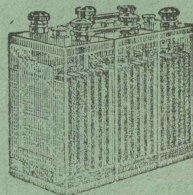

News from all Quarters

The supporters of the Arsenal club seem to think there is some vendetta against the club at the Football Association offices.

With that I have no concern, but I do protest against the suggestion that the prosperity of the Arsenal, both financially and on the field, has aroused jealousy amongst those who are not pleased by the tendency of soccer supremacy to move from the north to London.

I know something of the feelings in the north, but I know nothing of ill-will towards the club.

The team has played in Lancashire four times this season and I will vouch for it they, and all connected with the club, met with a good reception and courteous treatment on each and every occasion and also on two recent occasions in Yorkshire.

There is no jealousy. The Arsenal won the Cup. Good luck to them! The Arsenal are going strong for the League Championship. If the team proves worthy, none will begrudge them of the honour.

I have never heard a single complaint in the north that the offices of the Football Associations are in London, and I do not know that the game is one scrap better for that fact.

I am not aware that the Football League suffers in anyway because the offices of the League are in Preston.

What is the meaning of all this talk about jealousy? I am beginning to think that those who pretend to see it are busy trying to create it, for years ago I suggested registration by telegram accompanied by the form sent by registered post, so that it matters not where the offices are.

I made my protest against placing on the field, alien players. I did it in pursuance of of my continued advocacy that the opportunities of English players should not be restricted by English clubs.

We don't want clubs running away to the Continent for players and that would be the natural outcome if freedom were permitted, but remember I made the same protest in other cases before the Arsenal's cropped up.

News from all Quarters

Then the Arsenal are sore about their clock, and, knowing the full facts, they have some ground for it, and although my objection was to clocks that were presumed to be stopped and keep time with the referee's timing, any kind of clock started with the start of the game and again at half-time is sure to create troubles for the referee.

The referee is the official timekeeper and having done without a clock for all these years why introduce one which may presume to be manipulated as on other grounds?

In view of incidents on the Liverpool and Blackpool grounds, everything should be done to make the referee's task easier and his authority respected, and if the referees and others took the view that clocks, whether presumably manipulated to keep the actual time of play, or continuously running without any attempt to record periods of stoppages, were likely to make their position as time-keepers more difficult, the prudent course is to remove them.

An instruction to that effect could not be personal or in the nature of a vendetta for the order affected other clubs.

Even if I stand alone, I shall not alter my opinion that the policy of our clubs should be to develop our own players and find room for them in our teams and to accept every opportunity of increasing the confidence in and making the task of our referees as easy and congenial as possible.—MR. C. E. SUTCLIFFE in the "Topical Times."

WELLINGTON.

"THE VERY IDEA."

Hugh Trevor, Sally Blake and Frank Craven are the leading lights of "The Very Idea," the all-talking production at the Wellington to-night; it is adapted from the stage play of that name by William Le Baron. Its theme is a comedy handling of a theory concerning an improved race. Alan Camp, one of the characters in the story, tries out his ideas by arranging for the adoption and careful upbringing of the off-spring of his chauffeur and his sister's maid. But when the bargain is to take place the mother refuses to part with her baby, because she loves it too much. The story is full of hilarious predicaments.

EMPIRE.

"UNDER A TEXAS MOON."

"SONG OF THE WEST."

Filmed in natural colour, "Song of the West" comes to the High Town Electric Theatre to-night. John Boles, the famous singing star, is hero in the story, which is of the gold rush days of '49.

The story opens at Fort Independence, where a troop of soldiers are preparing to accompany a covered waggon train to California. 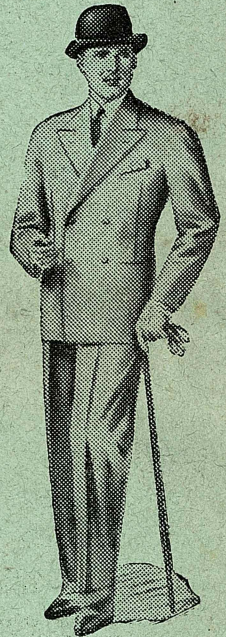
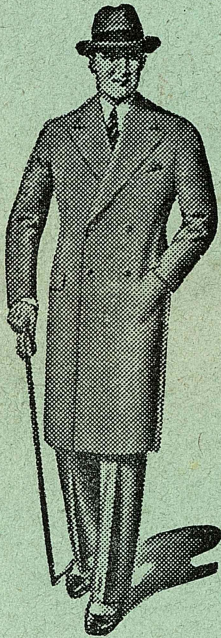
