teams suffered in this respect, and a friend of mine who watched a game in London on the same day, under the same conditions, and by players valued at least £60,000, remarked that the forward play, especially the finishing, was particularly poor.

One thing I noticed on that day was the drop in attendance on the Rec., it being only 2,750. Why? Partly because of the weather and partly because a few results had gone against us. Yet a couple of weeks ago, 6,000 rolled up to see our Cup-Tie with Cardiff. I would like to remind those who can only be termed lukewarm supporters, or Cup-Tie fans if you like, that without League matches there would be no Cup matches, that good football is more often seen in a League match, and that a little extra support and encouragement to a team when things will not go right makes all the difference.

While on the subject of support may I be allowed to take this opportunity to deny certain press reports referring to my departure from the Club. At present I have no intention of leaving. I have neither approached any club nor have I been approached, but should the gates remain under the 3,000 mark I am afraid there will be several that will have to find pastures new.

At present we have a few youngsters who, I am certain, will make a name for themselves as footballers in the near future, but to bring these youngsters along takes time, and you will have to give the Club all the support you can, or others will reap the benefit these lads have received at the hands of Harry Wilson and Jimmy Hopkins.

To those who have not yet seen our "Reserves" in action I would say, come along the first chance you get and I'm sure you will not be disappointed. Results have been against them so far, but they are a full ninety-minutes' team that never give up trying, and whatever the score may be, you will be satisfied

PEN PICTURES OF OUR VISITORS

HARFORD, GEORGE B. (Abbey Wood, London), *goalkeeper*.—Height, 5ft. 10 $\frac{1}{4}$ ins. Weight, 12st. Was doing big things with the bass viol and the sousaphone in a theatrical orchestra when Millwall decided he would be better as goalkeeper, for they had seen him perform with Bexley Heath. Was three seasons at New Cross, and there a member of the promotion team. Then went to Luton, where he has been ever since. Has plenty of "saving" grace, and is as agile as a monkey.

KINGHAM, R. (Harpenden), *right back*.—Height, 5ft. 11ins. Weight, 11st. 10lb. Seven years ago was alternately playing back or half-back in St. Albans' City team, his home being midway between Luton and St. Albans'. Was given a chance with the Hatters' Reserves, and quickly made his way into the first team. From his first full season to date he has never lost his place except for injury, which has not been frequent. Believes in playing the ball, and is very competent with his head, which he invariably keeps cool.

MACKAY, THOS. S. (Cassop, Co. Durham), *left back*.—Height, 5ft. 11ins. Weight, 12st. 7lb. Was a big lad when he left school to work in a coal mine, and Hartlepools United discovered him doing very well at centre half in junior football and gave him the chance to become a professional at the age of seventeen. Was there only a little over twelve months, when Sheffield Wednesday took a fancy to him and paid Hartlepools a big fee. At the beginning of last season he went to Luton, who paid handsomely for him. Within a week or two he had proved better as a full-back than as a pivot, and had much to do with the long run in the Cup Competition.

BROWN, WM. (Silvertown), *right half-back*.—Height, 5ft. 11 $\frac{1}{4}$ ins. Weight, 11st. 7lb. A Schoolboy international well under ten years ago, but has been with the Hatters

four seasons. Was originally a centre forward, and played many games for the Hatters in that position, but last year definitely settled down at right half. Some say he is the best centre half in the Club. Is a stylist, and has assimilated much of the wisdom of Fred Kean. Quick on the ball, and knows how to use it to advantage, while he has a powerful shot in either boot.

McGINNIGLE, HUGH (Bargeddie), *centre half*.—Height, 5ft. 10ins. Weight, 12st. Left his Lanarkshire village for Falkirk, and played variously at centre forward and centre half for the Scottish club, before arriving at Luton four seasons back. Took some time to settle down, and variously played at half-back and forward before making the pivotal position his own two seasons ago. Is a great Cup-tie fighter, dour and relentless, but without "vice," and is going as hard at the end as at the beginning.

FRASER, CHAS. R. (Plaistow, London), *left half-back*.—Height, 5ft. 11ins. Weight, 11st. 10lb. Eighth season as a professional, and one of the best all-round sportsmen that ever left the big city. Played against Scotland in the Schoolboy International, and won several boxing championships before he turned professional footballer at the age of eighteen. Has had his share of injuries, but that does not affect his good temper, and his fairness to opponents. Has a sense of humour, and this, together with his great skill, has made him a prime favourite on Southern Section grounds.

RENNIE, JOSEPH, brother of Andrew Rennie, a recruit from Maryhill, Hibernians this season, may appear in place of Fraser, the latter being uncertain owing to injury.

PEASE, WM. (Leeds), *outside right*.—Height, 5ft. 9 $\frac{1}{4}$ ins. Weight, 11st. 10lb. Played a brief period just after the War as an amateur for Leeds City, but then came south to Northampton in 1920, and stayed until 1926, when he was transferred to Middlesbrough at a big fee, and remained in the capital of Cleveland district until this season. At Middlesbrough, broke all scoring records for outside right, scoring 24 goals in 30 games, and in following season scored 27. Holds two championship medals, International medal, Professionals v. Amateurs medal, toured South Africa with F.A. team in 1929, and received medal and cap. Is very speedy and quick on the ball.

MARTIN, GEO. S. (Glasgow), *inside right*.—Height, 5ft. 9ins. Weight, 11st. 7lb. Left his job as a young plumber and sanitary engineer to play for Hamilton Academicals, and after a time went to Hull City, thence to Everton, and subsequently to Middlesbrough. Holds championship medals for both First and

RENНИE, ANDREW (Baillieston, Glasgow), *centre forward*.—Height, 5ft. 11ins. Weight, 12st. 4lb. Was discovered in Paisley junior football eight years ago as a centre half, and quickly gained his regular place in Luton's first team. In emergency went centre forward and surprised everybody by heading the list of League scorers with 43 goals in his second season in that position. Was injured badly the following season, and for three seasons has played at inside left. Recently returned to centre forward, and has started goal-scoring again. Shrewd in initiation, and a brilliant shot. "There's no rough stuff about Andy."

HUTCHISON, DAVID C. (Shotts, Lanark), *inside left*.—Height, 5ft. 8ins. Weight, 11st. Had early experience with Albion Rovers and Motherwell, and then made a surprise move to Carlisle United, with whom he stayed four seasons before coming to Luton last season. Typical exponent of the Scottish game, and worth place in any club as an example not only of football, but of conduct on and off the field.

PEARSON, GEO. W. (West Stanley), *outside left*.—Height, 5ft. 5ins. Weight, 10st. 10lb. Was taken straight from junior football by Chelsea, and had seven seasons at Stamford Bridge before joining Luton this season. Was a member of the team that toured South America in 1929. Is of necessity tricky and speedy, but stocky enough to resist the big men. Has recently been restored to the first team and may be regarded as one of the probables against the Arsenal on the 13th.
