

WITH today's visit from Queens Park Rangers we renew acquaintances with old friends of whom the most recent is David Richards, our full back and captain of five seasons ago, and who now performs the trainer's duties at Loftus Road. Another familiar face is that of "Mick" O'Brien, the ex-Watford centre half back, who is now in control of the destinies of the Rangers Club.

The early history of the Queens Park Rangers Club is one of uphill struggle for existence. Season after season adversity had to be fought in the matter of finance, match results and the acquisition of playing pitches. Today, all these seemingly futile efforts have resulted in producing a popular West London Club.

It was in 1885 that Jack McDonald and Fred Weller, assisted by the Rev. Gordon Young inaugurated a team from amongst the boys of Droop Street Board School, Queens Park. This School team eventually became attached to St. Jude's Institute which name the Club was then called. The finances at this period was such that the only gear that was possessed consisted of four uprights, which were joined together by two pieces of tape to form a crossbar.

Their first playing pitch was at Welford's Home Farm, but between 1885 and 1898 their resultant venues are too numerous for recording. In one instance they had to contend with adverse public opinion as the residents in the vicinity of their ground were of the mind that a football team was detrimental to the interest (and value?) of the neighbourhood.

In the year 1891, St. Jude's Institute

adopted professionalism and at a subsequent meeting held the same year the name of the Club was changed to its present title. Admission was obtained to the Southern League, and the Reserves contended themselves with London League football. A Company was then floated and registered with a £5000 capital, whilst the management of the team was under Jock Campbell.

The first honour to fall the way of the Club was the West London Observer Cup, which trophy they obtained through defeating Fulham Rangers (the then champions of the West London League) by three goals to two, and which they subsequently held for a period of three years.

Their best season in the F.A. Cup was in 1922/3 when they lost to Burnley in the Fourth Round, having knocked out the Arsenal in an earlier round of the competition.

Their new signatories for this season includes "Mick" Ridley a full back from Reading, who played in 27 first team matches last term, Jack Crawford who had spent ten years previously as a winger at Chelsea, which latter Club paid £4000 for his transfer from Hull City, Tom Dutton, an inside forward from Leicester City, Sam Abel a centre forward who has seen service with Nelson, Chesterfield and Fulham, Gordon Reed a North Eastern League centre forward product whose transfer was secured from Newport County, J. Hammond an outside right obtained from London Paper Mills F.C. and G. E. Watson a young winger from Durham City.

CLUB NOTES

Our first word must be one of praise to our Reserve team. By their defeat of Leicester City on Monday evening by three goals to nil, they went to the head of the London Combination, West Ham having kindly inflicted a defeat on the Arsenal by two goals to nil. To our knowledge this is the first time we have ever secured the top place in the Combination, and to do so is no mean achievement, especially when it is remembered that some of the contestants are strong First Division Reserve sides. Anyhow, well done our "Stiffs." May you keep it up all the season.

The game with Leicester City was an exciting affair, interest being maintained until the final whistle. It is impossible to single out anyone for meritorious play, for all played extremely well and thoroughly deserved the splendid ovation they received when leaving the field. The experiment of trying Jack Russell at centre forward was quite a success, and on his exhibition in this game, he has been given the same position in the first team today against Queens Park Rangers.

For our match today, in addition to the change mentioned above, Dave Hutchison returns to the outside left berth and so we have for the first time this season the left wing that did so well during the last campaign.

The Reserve team is at Crystal Palace. Stan Coote's injured foot which prevented his appearance

against Leicester City has not resulted in the improvement anticipated. Horace Hackett and Joe Taylor resume at inside right and centre forward respectively and Harry Haggard gets his second run out at outside left. Both George Stephenson and Billy Pease are suffering from injuries sustained in Monday night's game so we are trying Colin Cook at inside left and Tom Bell at outside right.

George Harford's damaged hand is greatly improving and he is now in training with the other players.

On Wednesday next we journey to Gillingham for our Southern Section Cup Tie. Supporters are requested to note that the Kick-Off has been fixed for 5.15 p.m. Should a replay of this match be necessary it will in all probability be played the following Wednesday, and the kick-off arranged as late as possible. On Thursday we are taking a team to Biggleswade to help the finances of our nursery club. Biggleswade, who are receiving the assistance of Joe Payne, R. Conquest, G. Burns, F. Carpenter and R. Griffiths, protégés of ours, have done exceptionally well so far this season. After suffering defeat at the hands of Northampton "A" in the opening match of the season by three goals to one they have accounted for in turn Boston Reserves by seven goals to two, Desborough Town by two goals to nil and Kempston Rovers by four goals to one.
