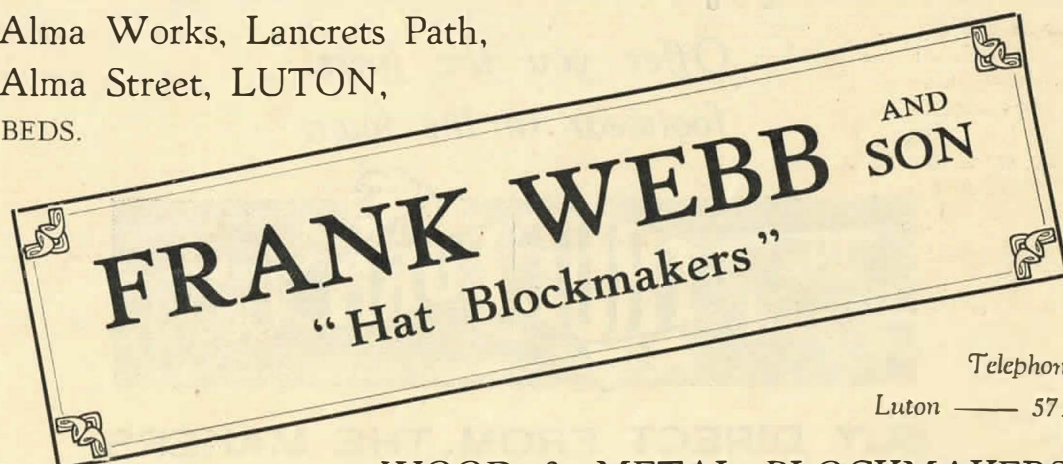

OUR visitors today, Bristol City, is a Club, who of recent years, has not been treated very kindly by Fate. Their vicissitudes since inception in 1894 have fluctuated enormously, and consequently the passing of years has now found them occupying a position in the Third Division (Southern Section) of the Football League.

The Bristol City Club was formed on the 12th April, 1894, at a meeting held in the house of Mr. F. W. Keenan, which was situated within a mile of the Club's present ground at Ashton Gate. At this meeting, at which there were eighteen members present in addition to the Chairman, the Club, Bristol South End Association Football Club, was formed. The first match ever played by this Club was on September 1st, 1894, when they had for their opponents, Swindon Town, whose fame at that period was such, that they were billed as the "Champions of the West." It is also curious to note that the poster advertising this match also reported, "Admission 3d., Enclosure 3d. extra, NO DOGS admitted."

In season 1897/8, the name of the South End Club, was changed to its present calling, Bristol City, and at this period too, professionalism was adopted, and the Club entered the Southern League, where they remained for four seasons, during which period they were runners-up on three occasions. In season 1901, admission was obtained to the English—not the Football—League, which competition they christened by finishing sixth in the League table. In season 1905/6 promotion to the First Division was obtained when 66 out of a possible 76 points were obtained. This record has only been broken on one other occasion—in 1919/20, when Tottenham Hotspurs finished up with 70 points from a possible 84.

The City remained in the First Division until 1910/11, when in conjunction with

Notts Forest, relegation to the Second Division was enforced, whilst in 1921/2 a further drop put them in the Third Division (Southern Section). They regained Second Division status the following year only to be relegated again in Season 1924/5. A further stay in the Third Division saw them promoted once again in 1926/7 and then after a spell of five more years in the Second Division they returned to the Southern Section in 1932/3, where they have since remained.

Their team selected to do service today is a blend of youth and experience, the choice having fallen on the following.

Harry Dolman (goalkeeper) First club Willenhall when 18. Transferred to Chesterfield 1929 and played in all 42 games when they won promotion.

Cyril Bridge (right full back) Bristol born. First club Wesley United and then Kingswood before signing for the City.

Roy Clipson (left full back) Signed for Lincoln City in 1926/7 and after 2 seasons went to Newark Town 1929/30 saw him at Bury, whom he left to come to Bristol.

"Clif" Morgan (right half back) Another local boy who was discovered playing with the Boys' Brigade team. Formerly an inside forward.

George Pearce (centre half back) Is an Army International and played against French and Belgian Armies when serving in the Royal Tank Corps.

Jimmy Loftus (left half back) Durham born and first played for South Shields from whom he was transferred to Notts Forest four seasons ago. Is captain of Ashton Gate Club.

Jack Hodge (outside right) First club St. Austell in Cornish League and prior to this year had two seasons with Plymouth Argyle.

Albert Banfield (inside right) Bristol born, and once refused trial with Arsenal. His junior club was St. Philip's Adult School, before joining the City the season before last.

Joe Riley (centre forward) Yorkshire born, and scored many goals for Goldthorpe United before joining Bristol Rovers. Came to City from the Rovers this season.

Joe Landells (inside left) Was transferred from Millwall, some three weeks ago. A good shot and very dangerous when in front of goal.

Peter Caaney (outside left) Another Bristolian who commenced his football career when playing for Two Mile Hill School. Assisted Wesley Rangers before joining the Colts.

CLUB NOTES

The first team recorded another win away from home last Saturday, at the expense of the 'Grecians.' This performance is highly satisfactory, and will give supporters, whose interest had begun to wane, pause for reflection, as to whether their conclusions had not been drawn too prematurely. To those other supporters who turn up week after week, for the pleasure of seeing a game of football, in which their team participates, the performances of the past three weeks will give rise to great jubilation.

The game at Exeter was the best exhibition given by our team to date, the football displayed reaching that high standard to which we became accustomed last year. It is impossible to single out any one individual performance, as to a man, all rose nobly to the occasion. Joe Coen had not a great amount of work to do in goal, but one of his saves in the opening stages boarded on the miraculous. Tom Bell, too, must have felt highly pleased in scoring the two goals, and perhaps this performance will give him confidence to rise to further heights. Andy Rennie's luck was dead out for he hit a defender and the frame work three times with pile drivers, that looked all over certain scorers. Anyhow, the same team is doing duty today, and we hope the supporters will show their appreciation of the recent performances when the players enter the field.

Now about the Reserves. They put up a magnificent show against the Arsenal, and although defeated, we have no hesitation in saying they were unfortunate in so being. Mr. Joe Shaw, the Assistant Manager of the Arsenal, said after the match, "You should be proud of your boys, at the wonderful exhibition they have given. I should be if connected with a Club that played such great football against such formidable opposition." Such is praise indeed, as was also the wonderful reception the spectators gave our lads as they left the field after the game. It is happenings such as these which creates that enthusiasm amongst Officials and Players in endeavours to go all out, and we do earnestly hope that the supporters will keep it up. In comparison, the game with Brighton on Wednesday was a very scrappy affair. Tempers too,

became frayed which necessarily reduced the standard of the game. Greatest interest was effected in the display of "Spud" Murphy, our latest acquisition from Norwich City, and although he did not have as much of the ball as we should have liked, we saw enough to know that we had made quite a useful capture. Today the "Stiffs" are at Bournemouth, and the team selected is the same as that against the Arsenal with the exception that Beck takes McGinnigle's place at right half, Taylor replaces Cook at centre forward, and Murphy is on the extreme left.

The transfer of John Ball, a centre forward from Huddersfield Town, was effected late last evening. Huddersfield obtained his services from Sheffield Wednesday about a month ago. Whilst with the Wednesday he was a prolific goal scorer. He will be leading the team today.

A few weeks ago, Capt. Prince Cox, the Bristol Manager, remarked, "We have practically the same team as last year, yet we are without a win so far. Joe Smith, manager of Reading, has been enquiring about Gibson, reserve centre forward of Sunderland, and Davies, outside right of Halifax Town, has been attracting much attention. Yes there is plenty doing behind the scenes and both Newcastle United and Bolton Wanderers are pretty certain to figure in big transfer deals soon. They of course, will be the buyers.

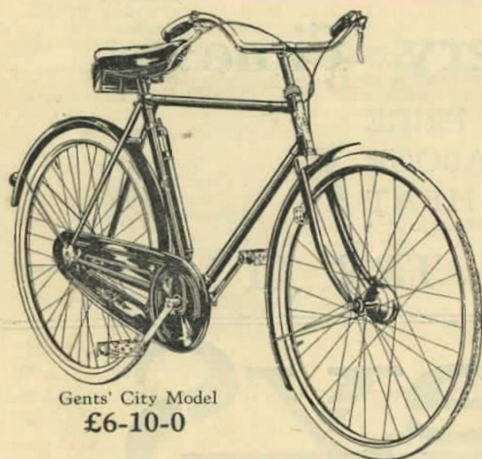

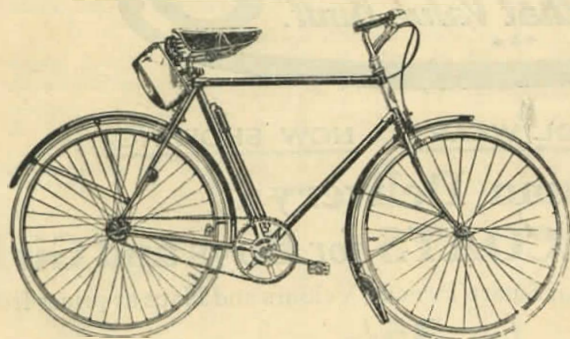
