LUTON TOWN v. WATFORD

November 10th, 1934.

WATFORD. To Luton ears that magic word is the symbol of a renewal of friendly rivalry, and no matter what the relative positions of the two teams in the Football League, a keenly contested game is always assured whenever the Local Derby teams are in opposition. We extend to the "Wasps" a cordial reception here this afternoon.

The Watford Club can boast of a long association with football, and although their path has at times been rather a weary one, they have overcome many difficulties in a manner which is deserving of the highest praise.

It was in the year 1891 that the Watford Club came into being, and was caused by an amalgamation of Watford Rovers and Hertfordshire Rangers, a club who played in a meadow off Langley Road, and who had in R. C. Barker, a goalkeeper who had been "capped" against Scotland.

Admission to the Southern League, Division II, was effected in 1896, whilst professionalism was adopted the following season. At the end of Season 1899-1900, Watford made themselves conspicuous by winning the championship of their division, but two years later disaster overtook them and re-election had to be applied for. This, although at first granted, was subsequently rescinded at a later meeting.

This set-back brought to the fore Mr. R. A. Thorpe, the then Chairman of the Watford Urban District Council, who with the aid of John Goodall, the player-manager, got together a good team of players, and consequently re-admission to the Southern League was obtained. At this juncture a new ground at Cassio Road was opened. From this time onwards Watford have never looked back, and although, like ourselves, they have never occupied an exalted sphere, they can boast of a useful record.

The present Club was formed in 1909, and their ground at Vicarage Road is capable of holding 35,000 spectators. The original colours of the Watford Club were red, green and yellow stripes, and this led to them being dubbed the "Wasps." Although now their colours have been changed to turquoise blue and white, and are thus of a more sombre hue, the nickname of the past still clings to them.

Similar to ourselves, Watford commenced this season without pulling up too many trees, but of recent weeks a great improvement has been made, and so we can look forward today to a keen tussle. Let us hope then that the honours go to the most deserving side. The Watford team selected to do duty is as follows:

J. Maclarens (goalkeeper) 6 ft. 1 in. 13 stones. Birthplace—Stenhousemuir. Was transferred from Leicester City and has proved himself one of the best custodians since the days of "Skilly" Williams.

W. Brown (right back) 5 ft. 8 in. 11 stones. Birthplace—Durham. Last season had the unusual experience for him of finding his place in the first team difficult to retain, due to the Club's resources of full back talent.

J. Moran (left back) 5 ft. 10½ in. 11 st. 7 lb. Birthplace—Wigan. Formerly a Spurs defender and has rendered Watford yeoman's service during the past two seasons.

W. Findlay (right half) 5 ft. 8½ in. 11 st. 10 lb. Birthplace—Wishaw. Possesses ball control of the highest standard, which has enabled him to play many brilliant games. Is also a very fine constructive player.

J. H. Armstrong (centre half) 6 feet. 12 stones. Birthplace—Limington. Secured from Queens Park Rangers and has considerably strengthened the defence. Plays the third back game to advantage.

A. Woodward (left half) 5 ft. 11½ in. 11 stones. Birthplace—Watford. A local lad who has made good. Of fine physique and retains his abilities for the full ninety minutes. Missed only one match last year.

C. R. Rattray (outside right) 5 ft. 5 in. 10 st. 7 lb. Birthplace—Fleetwood. Transfer obtained from Blackpool for whom he made many League appearances. Is still young and much is expected of him.

T. Barnett (inside right) 5 ft. 8½ in. 10 st. 7 lb. Birthplace—Manchester. Played in all League and Cup matches with one exception in 1933/4 and is something of a marksman.

W. H. C. Lane (centre forward) 5 ft. 9 in. 11 st. 4 lb. Birthplace—London. Is in his second season and to date has scored about 40 goals. Possesses good ball control and dribbling powers.

R. V. O'Brien (inside left) 5 ft. 9 in. 12 stones. Birthplace—Coventry. Is something of a utility man and is equally at home amongst the halves. Previously had 4 seasons with Coventry City.

J. Poxton (outside left) 5 ft. 7½ in. 11 st. 10 lb. Birthplace—Chesterfield. Services secured from Millwall, and was a regular member of their Second Division side for some seasons. Is a useful goal scorer.

CAN YOU ANSWER THESE?

Answers to *last* Week's Questions.

10. The ball striking the referee continues, the ball being in play, and as a goal cannot be scored direct from a goal kick, the decision in this case is a corner kick. The referee is not a player although he is often dubbed one by the partisans.

11. The earlier situation indicates very ungentlemanly conduct on the part of the captain but his subsequent action in using bad language to the referee must be treated under violent conduct, and dismissal from the game is the only punishment for violent conduct. The referee's action in ordering the player to the pavilion was the correct one.

12. Law 4 gives very definitely that the ball must have passed between the goal posts under the bar, and the International Board ruled that the whole of the ball must have passed over the goal-line before a goal can be scored. In the case given because of the interference by the spectator the scoring conditions were not fulfilled, therefore no goal should be awarded. The referee should stop play and restart it where the interference took place. One knows that the "spirit of the game" urges a goal being awarded, but the law prohibits this.

CLUB NOTES

The first team did exceptionally well last Saturday by bringing back both points from Bournemouth and the score in no way reflected upon their superiority for with the slightest amount of luck at all we should have been credited with twice the number of goals. Jack Ball hit the framework on numerous occasions with the goalkeeper beaten, and might easily have recorded a hat trick had fortune favoured him. So well did the team play as a whole that Bournemouth were almost continually penned in and quite an hour had elapsed before Joe Coen was called upon to make his first save, and then it was a good 'un, which brought the house down. Tom Mackey and Reg Kingham were on top form although the latter was troubled somewhat in the first half by the antics of Parris, but once his measure had been taken, the winger became greatly subdued. The halves were brilliant and Tom Tait never got the better of Thayne on any one occasion. Bill Brown and Charlie Fraser played great football and the former's goal was a real gem, being reminiscent of one of Andy Rennie's "first timers." The forwards gave a greatly improved exhibition, shooting at every conceivable opportunity, and as previously mentioned with the slightest amount of luck the score would have been doubled.

Today we meet our old friends and rivals from Watford, and expect, as always, a keen tussle. Recent performances have placed the "Wasps" considerably away from the bottom rung, a position they occupied at the beginning of the season. The team selected to do duty is the same as played against Bournemouth.

The Reserve match with Northampton was not a too thrilling encounter, but perhaps we are inclined to be too critical, after witnessing matches such as we saw against the Spurs, Leicester City and Arsenal. It may have been on account of the desperate methods employed by the "Cobblers" in attempting to capture the points, for after a team has lost five matches in succession, they do become desperate, but the game never arose above average entertainment. Preedy had quite an easy time in goal being well covered by Smith and Reece. The half backs all did well without providing anything of the spectacular, but the forwards as a whole were much below standard. Many scoring openings were provided, before "Spud" Murphy opened our account just before the interval, and although two further goals were added the final score should have been somewhere near double figures instead of the three registered.

The "Stiffs" have a hard task at Reading this afternoon, for the young "Biscuiters" are doing

exceptionally well this term and hold only a slightly inferior position to ourselves in the Combination table. The team selected is slightly changed from last week Harford supersedes Preedy in goal and Beck returns to the half back line vice McGinnigle. In the forward line Cook is given a chance at inside right, Hackett being a "flu" victim.

On Wednesday, November 28th, we are being favoured with a visit from the A.I.K. Football Club from Stockholm. Never before has a match with a Continental Club been staged at Luton and the Directors sincerely hope that their enterprise will be rewarded by an excellent attendance on the part of our supporters to give a welcome cheer to our Swedish visitors. The A.I.K. Club is looked upon as the Arsenal of Sweden, and can boast of no fewer than seven Internationals in their team. The prices of admission will be the same as those operating in our League III matches. Centre Stand Season Ticket Holders will have the privilege of occupying their usual seats providing application for ticket is made not later than Saturday, November 24th.

Since Tom Mackey joined us at the commencement of Season 1932/3 he has played in 104 Division III and Cup games. In 1932/3 he made 46 appearances, in 1933/4 43 appearances and this season has played in all the 15 matches to date. Truly a wonderful record.

At our match today we have two celebrated Continental visitors well known in Scandinavian football circles. They are Mr. Tore Nilsson, the son of the Manager of the A.I.K. Club of Stockholm, and Mr. Jorgen Juve, the Captain of the Norwegian International Team.

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
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
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
