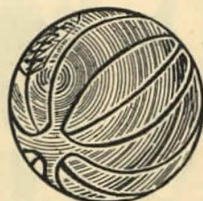

A very happy Christmas to all our Supporters. May you all have dined wisely and well before turning up this afternoon and so be in a mood to impart that festive spirit and good cheer to the players, who have to wait until tomorrow evening before they can begin their celebrations.

For a Christmas Day fixture what opposition could be more pleasing, attractive and appropriate than a visit from our old rivals and friends, Brighton and Hove Albion. The happy relationship between our respective clubs has a long unbroken chain, first begun many years ago, to which a link has been added annually. Our Brighton friends have a very formidable team this term and are almost invincible on their Goldstone Road turf, having had only one goal registered against them, and that by Bristol Rovers in the opening match of the season. Their away record also enhances the reputation of their defence, for of ten matches played, only fifteen goals have been scored against them, and four of these were by our neighbours at Northampton. We can therefore expect a thrilling tussle here today, which whatever the result, will doubtless be continued at Brighton tomorrow.

Brighton and Hove Albion, once Brighton and Hove Rangers, grew out of a Brighton United F.C., a club formed in 1898 that died in its second season.

After the death of the United, Mr. John Jackson formed the Brighton and Hove Rangers, and they were elected to the Second Division of the Southern League in the season 1901-02. The wages of the Club then was £11 a week. How many times greater is it today? This however was considerably increased a season or so later when the Albion, which had by that time been reconstructed under

the title of Brighton and Hove Albion, moved into Division I after beating Watford by three goals to one in a "test" match. Although being entitled to promotion the Club had a difficult problem to solve before accepting. Could they afford it?

The general consensus of opinion was that senior football presented difficulties which could not be overcome, and although the men who wanted to move on admitted they were more or less in agreement with the people who advocated waiting until the Club was more firmly established, they talked over the waverers and the Albion became members of the First Division.

The first season was a failure from a playing point of view. The Albion finished at the bottom of the table but were fortunately voted back. The following season the tide turned and a very respectable position was achieved.

Since those days the position has improved considerably. In the season of 1909-10 and again in 1920-21 they won the championship whilst a further honour to befall them in the 1909-10 season was the acquisition of the F.A. Charity Shield.

In the Third Division Southern Section Brighton have always commanded respect, whilst their reputation as Cup fighters is widely known. Whilst on the Cup here's wishing them luck against the Arsenal. If they have as fine a match as we did against the "Gunners" in the identical round last season they will be doubly compensated (the other compensation is the "gate.") Doubtless on this memorable occasion their ground record of 32,310 in 1933, when West Ham provided Cup opposition, will be broken.

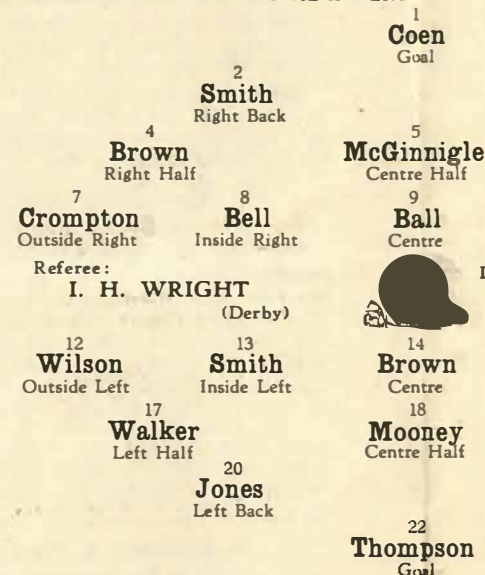
