OUR first match of the New Year is against old friends and rivals in Bristol Rovers, to whom we wish everything of the best during 1935. Amongst these "old" friends are three who might be termed "bosom pals" for in Capt. A. J. Prince-Cox, the Rovers' Secretary-Manager, Harry Lake, the Trainer, and George McNestry, the outside right, we have names that have been very closely connected with our club in recent years. Only during last summer Capt. Prince-Cox gave great assistance to the Supporters Club in their promotion of the Boxing Tournament that was staged on this ground.

The Bristol Rovers Club was formed in the year 1883 and consequently can claim predominance over their neighbours, Bristol City, in the matter of being "first on the scene" in Bristol. Originally they were known as the Black Arabs, and their colours consisted of black shirts enlivened by a sash of yellow ribbon. From the Black Arabs the Rovers soon became the Eastville Rovers and remained as such until 1897-8. In this season they participated in the professional section of the Western League, but under the title of Bristol Eastville Rovers. The following season another change of name was effected, this time to Bristol Rovers, which has now become permanent.

At this time the President of the Rovers' Club was none other than the grandfather of the present Duke of Beaufort, and during his period of office the colours consisted of Badminton hoops of light blue and white.

Professionalism was adopted in the 1897-8 season, and admission was obtained to both the Birmingham and Western Leagues, but at a later date the Birmingham organisation was renounced for the Southern League. In season 1904-5 they experienced their most successful season, the championship of the Southern League being gained.

Although always redoubtable League opponents, the Rovers cannot lay claim to being Cup fighters, their most successful period in this competition being in 1901/2, when they figured in ten Cup Ties, accounting for Bristol City, Swindon Town, Millwall Athletic and Middlesbrough before succumbing to Stoke City at Bristol.

This season the Rovers have disappointed after a successful start, and their position at the moment is in the lower half of the League Table. Our match at Bristol early on in the season resulted in a draw of one goal each, and a Bristol newspaper reporter commenting on this match paid great tribute to the display of Ellis, the Rovers' custodian, who by a brilliant exhibition was largely responsible for the point the Rovers obtained. Our team on that occasion was Preedy, Mackey, Reece Kean, Mc-

Ginnigle, Fraser, Bell, Martin, Cook, Stephenson, Russell.

The Rovers' team selected to do duty today is as follows:

Jack Ellis (goalkeeper) Started with Wineford United, a Cheshire League team. Transferred to Wolverhampton Wanderers in October, 1931, and accompanied the Wolves on their Continental tour.

John McLean (right back) A Scot, he was with the Kirkintilloch Club for whom he was skipper, before going to Blackburn Rovers three seasons ago. Played in 24 First Division games for Blackburn the season before last.

Alec Donald (left back) A Scot, as he was born at Kirkintilloch. Played for Partick Thistle, then for New York Nationals, before returning to England to sign and play for Chelsea.

Syd Wallington (right half) Came to the Rovers at the start of last season, after having put in three seasons at Birmingham. A product of Birmingham junior football.

Walter McArthur (centre half) A native of the Sheffield district where he played for several junior clubs. Came to the Rovers early last year and was soon signed as a professional. Only 20 years of age.

William Murray (left half) Played for Barrow in F.A. Cup Tie against the City at Ashton Gate last season. Shortly afterwards was secured by the Rovers.

George McNestry (outside right) Was born at Chopwell in Durham. Has played for Bradford, Doncaster Rovers, Leeds United, Sunderland and Luton Town. Went to the Rovers from here.

James McCambridge (inside right) An Irishman and an International, he was born at Larne. Played for Larne Olympic and then for Ballymena from whom he was transferred to Everton. Left the Lancaster Club to go to Cardiff City for whom he was top goal scorer for two seasons.

Albert Taylor (centre forward) A product of the North Eastern League as he played for Bedlington. Became a "pro" for South Shields (later Gateshead) and then went to Chelsea.

Jack Allen (inside left) A signature since the season commenced. Is the old Brentford, Sheffield Wednesday and Newcastle player. Was transferred to the Rovers the same day as Jack Ball was transferred to us.

E. Wipfler (outside left) Was only recently obtained from Taunton Town and reckoned as one of the "young stars" of the Rovers. Has shown great promise.

CLUB NOTES by "Hatter."

How many supporters when seeing the half time score of the first team at Southend put on the Board on Saturday last, expected a favourable result to come through at full time? We must extend our heartiest congratulations to the boys on their wonderful performance for to finish on level terms after being three goals down, even to the wooden spoonists of the League, is no mean achievement. Furthermore, during practically the whole of the second half they were playing one short, for Tom Mackey had been given marching orders following an altercation with the referee. The Southend Ground was a veritable quagmire, so much so that right up to the specified hour of commencement it was doubtful whether the match would be played. When the team arrived at the ground they found a gang of about sixty men working feverishly in an endeavour to clear away the mud, and scattering load after load of sand, in an effort to make the pitch presentable, and it was only after many visits to the arena and several consultations that Referee Lewington decided that the game must be played.

The game itself was one of stamina, for a test of football skill was totally out of the question. It was on account of an endeavour to give an exhibition of good football that the boys found themselves two goals in arrears at the interval, for on occasion after occasion a splendid movement was nullified through the ball persisting to stick in the mud. Southend on the other hand gave the leather plenty of boot. After the interval and especially after the second penalty incident, the Town adopted other tactics, Joe Payne going full back and George Stephenson among the halves. So well did the boys fight an uphill battle that eventually they drew level, and with the slightest particle of luck whatsoever they would have collected both points. To comment on the display of any individual player would be suicidal as all gave of their utmost and never has the team spirit been more predominant.

The Reserves' "Local Derby" game with Watford fell below the average from a football standpoint, although there were thrills galore. The fortunes of the teams fluctuated frequently, and three times did Watford draw level after being a goal in arrears, but in the end we assumed the ascendancy by the odd goal in seven. Never before so much this season, as in this match, has our defence been so shaky and the understanding between the backs and halves was often sadly at fault. It was hoped that

we should have had the assistance of C. J. Walker, the Hitchin Town inside right, but on the Saturday morning a communication was received from him, in which he stated a preference to play for the Spartan League Club. In consequence of this an opportunity arose to give a run at outside left to Dick Conquest, who has been assisting our nursery club at Biggleswade, Joe Taylor filling the left half back position and George Martin resuming at inside right. Conquest created quite a favourable impression and although weather conditions brought to the fore his lack of training as the game progressed, he showed football ability and worthily earned a further trial. Another brilliant exhibition was that of Joe Taylor, who for the second match in succession filled, with great success, the left half back position.

For the match with the Rovers today we have practically a full team available, Bill Thayne and Charlie Fraser both having recovered from the injuries received during Christmas.

The Reserves were due at Southend today, but so bad was the condition of the ground after the match last Saturday that the Southend Management deemed it advisable to have the ground properly drained, and accordingly their pitch today is in a state of repair and no football is possible.

Dave Hutchison was operated upon on Tuesday at the Bute Hospital for the removal of an internal cartilage. As far as can be at present ascertained the operation was successful and Dave himself is very comfortable.

On Saturday next is our great event, the journey to Stamford Bridge being made in an endeavour to oust Chelsea from the Cup Competition. Let me say hear and now that both Directors and Supporters, whether the boys win, draw or lose, know full well that they, one and all, will go all out in an attempt to smash the Chelsea Vase. Here's wishing them the best. There should be a good following of Supporters at Stamford Bridge as there will be no match to be witnessed here. In the ordinary course of events we should have entertained Gillingham, but this fixture has had to be put off until the following Wednesday, January 16th, and even then only if we win or lose at Stamford Bridge. **In any case there will be a match here on Wednesday, January 16th, whether it be a replay with Chelsea or a League match with Gillingham.** If it does happen that Chelsea are our visitors on this date then the match with Gillingham will take place on Wednesday, January 23rd.

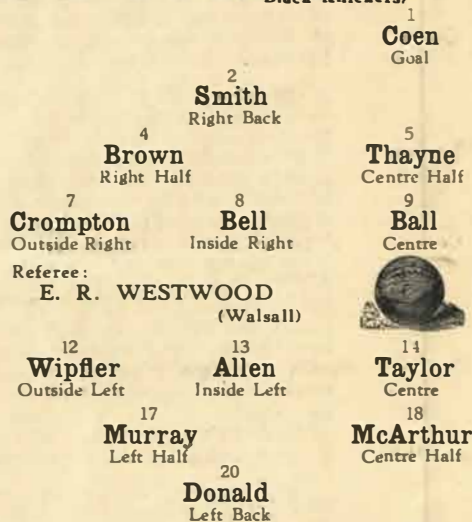

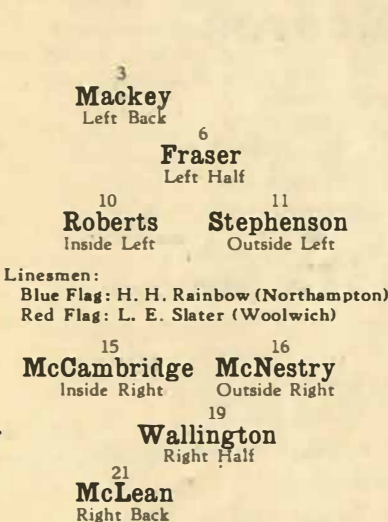
