F.A. Cup Replay—Round III

January 16th, 1935.

LUTON TOWN v. CHELSEA

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with Long Standing Experience.

WE welcome to Hatopolis this afternoon, for a continuation of our Cup Tie encounter, the Pensioners from Stamford Bridge, when once again both Clubs will endeavour to wrest from each other, the right to meet Burnley at Turf Moor in the Fourth Round.

First of all we should like to thank Chelsea for the kind hospitality extended to us on Saturday last, and hope that today we shall be able to return the compliment, by our attempts at reciprocity. We, unfortunately, cannot boast of such palatial premises as those habited by the Pensioners, but we will try to make up for this deficiency, by the warmth of our welcome.

The Chelsea Football Club was inaugurated in a saloon bar of a small West London Hostel. At the termination of the L.A.C. summer meeting in 1904, the ground at Stamford Bridge was purchased by Mr. H. A. Mears, who on meeting a number of friends in the "bar" explained his intentions to them, with the result that the promotion of a new Club called "Chelsea" was begun. A scheme for the transformation of the ground was entered into with the result that a Grand Stand with seating accommodation for 5000 was erected, and the banks extended and built up to house another 60,000 people. A Manager was then engaged and the choice fell on John Tait Robertson, the Scottish International, who at that time was playing for Glasgow Rangers, and the task of the signing on of the team was left to him. At this period Mr. Claude Kirby was elected the Chairman of the Club. He holds this position today.

In less than four months for a sum not exceeding £500, a team had been obtained, and this included four internationals, amongst whom was the redoubtable Billy Foulkes, whose transfer was secured from Sheffield United for a fifty pound note.

Application was then made for admission to the Southern League, but an unexpected rebuff awaited them, as they failed to gain admittance. This, however, proved to be a blessing in disguise, as admission was at once sought to the Football League, and they were elected to the Second Division.

The best achievements by the Chelsea Club was in season 1914-15, when they reached the final of the F.A. Cup, whilst they were third in the League five seasons later.

Chelsea have selected the following team for the game today and we have pleasure in giving herewith a short biography of each player.

John Jackson (goalkeeper) Kirkintilloch Rob Roy was his first club of note, to whom Partick Thistle negotiated for his transfer. Two years ago Chelsea paid a very large fee to the Thistle for his services. Was selected as Scotland's custodian in the match against England, last season.

George F. Barber (right full back) George is a familiar figure at Luton, for besides spending the season here in 1929-30, he often accompanies Charlie Fraser on the latter's many pilgrimages here during the summer months. Another Fairburn House boy who has made his mark in football.

Robert MacAulay (left full back) A Scot who once left his native land for a brief sojourn in U.S.A. but soon returned to join Glasgow Rangers. Joined Chelsea in 1932, but only secured a regular place in the team this season. Another Scottish International.

Jack Allum (right half back) Was discovered playing for Maidenhead United in 1931-2 season, and was quickly given a place to earn his spurs in League football. Is playing exceptionally well this season.

Alan Craig (centre half) Played for Motherwell as far back as 1924 and stayed there until 1932, when Chelsea paid a big fee for his transfer. Represented Scotland against England in 1932.

Harold Miller (left half back) Is one of the veterans of the side for prior to joining Chelsea in 1923 had seen service with Charlton and St. Albans City. Has also played frequently as an inside forward.


Robert Spence (outside right) An acquisition since the season commenced, being secured at a "fee" from Barnsley. Is very speedy and possesses a shot with a cannon ball effect.

James Argue (inside right) A Scot whom Mr. Knighton brought with him from Birmingham last season, where he had figured with frequency in the Reserve side. Played with Chelsea Reserves at Luton earlier in the season.

James Bambrick (centre forward) An Irishman who in 1930 set up an Irish goal scoring record of 90 for the season when playing for Linfield. Was transferred to Chelsea at Christmas. Has represented Ireland on many occasions.

George Gibson (inside left) Another Scot who has played for Dundee, Hamilton Academicals and Bolton Wanderers, in that order. Transferred to Chelsea in 1932. Obtained a Cup Medal with Bolton in 1929.

William Barraclough (outside left) Has already played at Luton in a Cup Tie as he was a member of the Wolves' side in 1932. Played as an amateur for Bridlington and Hull City before joining the Wolves in 1928. Chelsea secured his transfer after the present season had commenced.

CLUB NOTES by "Hatter."

Heartiest congratulations to our boys on the marvellous and magnificent performance at Stamford Bridge on Saturday last. The result of one goal each is another milestone in the history of the Club, for never before have we been able to admit anything else but defeat when engaged with a Club from the First Division in a Cup Tie encounter.

The game itself was exceedingly exciting, attacks on each goal being made with extraordinary frequency, culminating with either a shot that ricochetted against the framework, a shot that was brilliantly saved or a spectacular defensive clearance. Both goals had miraculous escapes in the opening minutes when Chelsea struck our cross-bar whereupon play was immediately transferred to the other end for Sam Bell to hit the upright. Thereafter end to end play continued and just before half time Sam Bell again shot in from a corner kick well placed by Crompton and had the satisfaction of seeing the ball hit the inside of the framework and go behind Jackson's prostrate body. Much has been said in the press, without need for comment here, regarding this goal. Let it suffice for us to say that the referee was right on the spot and had no hesitation in awarding a goal. Where the writer sat in the stand it was impossible to say whether the ball was over the line or not, but considering the verdict of the official in charge and also the fact that George Stephenson gained possession, and with nobody near him dribbled it away, it seems hardly creditable that he would have done such an amazing thing if he had not been absolutely certain that the ball was over the line.

The second half was a repetition of the first and with the breeze now in their favour the Pensioners made desperate endeavours to get on level terms. But at no time did our stronghold look like capitulating, so well did the defence counteract every move of the Chelsea vanguard. Nine minutes only remained for play, when a free kick was awarded Chelsea for an infringement by Bill Brown. This was well placed by Barraclough, and George Barber, who had come up, headed it goalwards. Joe Coen fisted it out, and in the scramble that ensued Argue pushed it into the net. After this Chelsea made desperate efforts to obtain the winning goal but it was not to be and one and all gave vent to their pent up excitement in a deafening roar when the final whistle blew.

To attempt to discriminate amongst the players would not only be impossible but also suicidal for all played heroically, the team spirit being always predominate. It was a great achievement and can easily be classed as the best performance of the day,

as well as confound those critics who were loud in their dissent on account of our exemption until the Third Round of the Competition. Although optimism at Luton was rampant as regards the result of the match I wonder how many of these optimists, at the bottom of their hearts, really expected anything else but defeat. The following of supporters was great, and, if as the Railway Company informs us 8,000 people travelled by their route, we must have been over 10,000 strong when the road traffickers are "roll called." Truly remarkable, and also thank you very much.

Today we renew our struggle and if a definite decision is arrived at the winners have the pleasure of meeting Burnley at Turf Moor on Saturday week. Dare we hope it will be us. Our team today is uncertain for Bill Thayne received a leg injury on Saturday, whilst on account of his scholastic duties Tom Smith's appearance is doubtful. The culminating point is Tom Mackey's suspension for fourteen days through his indiscretion at Southend on December 29th last. Never mind we shall have a good try whoever is chosen to play, and if we fail we shall be the first to congratulate our victors.

Tomorrow, after two blank Saturdays, the Reserves travel to Leicester in search of Combination points. Leicester are one of the aspirants for the Championship and if the "Stiffs" do manage to draw or win they will have achieved something of an high order.

On Saturday, our League III team journeys to the Valley, to meet Charlton Athletic, the present leaders of the League. When they visited us earlier in the season, Charlton inflicted upon us our only League home defeat of the season, and we shall use every endeavour to make amends. The Reserves have a visit from Southampton, and perhaps our former Manager, George Kay.

On Wednesday, February 6th, we have been invited, and have accepted, to play a trial game at either Amsterdam or Rotterdam against the Dutch International XI. This is an honour indeed, and was communicated to us via our own Football Association. It means that Luton Town will represent England on that occasion, and it is needless to say that we shall use every endeavour to uphold the traditions of our country in Holland.

Supporters are kindly asked to note that should a definite result of our Cup Tie today be arrived at, we shall play a League III game with Gillingham here on Wednesday next, January 23rd. The Kick-Off will be 2.45 p.m.

Jack Ball was given the credit of one of the goals scored at Southend. This however is wrong as the player who did actually score was Fred Roberts.
