

CLUB NOTES.

By "CHARLTONIAN."

AN UNEXPECTED BLOW.

While the majority of the League clubs in England were directly concerned with the F.A. Cup on Saturday last, Charlton supporters had to be content with the more sober fare of League football. Not that our followers minded one little bit for the simple reason every game, more or less, resembles a Cup tie when a club is making the bid for promotion which Charlton are doing this season.

At the top of the Southern Section table, Charlton had a fine chance to consolidate their position at the head of affairs with a rousing win over Bournemouth at the Valley last week-end.

That such a thing would happen was generally agreed, and passed unanimously, by everyone concerned with the welfare of Charlton Athletic. We really did visualise our favourites "sitting pretty" with a four points lead last Saturday evening. Unfortunately things did not work out like that, for Charlton were actually beaten by the only goal of the game. Yes, the lowly placed Bournemouth team came along and had the honour of being the first club to win at the Valley this season. Thus the much cherished unbeaten home record of Charlton went by the board in most unexpected fashion.

UNDESERVED DEFEAT.

We would like to be able to say that the visitors deserved their victory but that would be a gross exaggeration, for it was actually a game which Charlton should have won comfortably. Just how Charlton came to be beaten after enjoying so much of the game will ever remain a mystery. But we cannot disguise the fact that our team played well below their usual form, and without making any attempt to offer excuses it must be said that the playing pitch was not in a condition which helped the players to play good football. It was holding without being what one might

term really wet, but even so we do not offer that as an excuse for our defeat. It may certainly have been an indirect cause of our team's failure to produce their best form, but however one cares to review the game there can be only one conclusion—Charlton should have won easily.

**BIG TERRITORIAL ADVANTAGE—
BUT NO GOALS.**

Charlton definitely had the better of the play in the first half without being really convincing, especially as a finishing force, but the advantage so enjoyed could not be compared with the persistence of our attacks immediately following the change of ends. Attack after attack was launched on the Bournemouth goal; in fact it was an almost incessant bombardment for a period of twenty minutes. The visitors simply refused to capitulate. True, the Bournemouth defenders enjoyed some good fortune at times. A goal must come! thought the onlookers. It did—to the visitors. That was the real tragedy of the game. Here was Charlton pressing strongly for a lengthy period without reward, then the ball is punted down the field on the visitors' left wing and in turn is sent over to the right where Richie, in an unmarked position, secures possession and takes deliberate aim to beat Bartram with a really finely placed shot. That was enough to take the heart out of any side but Charlton, to their credit, never gave up. Turner joined the attack and everything was staked on an equaliser—and then perhaps a winning goal. No such luck, for it was simply not Charlton's day. Nothing would go right near goal. It happens like that sometimes in football and we have to take our dose of medicine, like all other clubs have to in turn, when ordered by the Goddess of Fate. It was our turn last week to fail when least expected and Charlton's promotion prospects have been clouded by this setback, but it is a long way to go

yet and if our players are wise they will forget all about that first home defeat, or at least not let it worry them, but rather redouble their efforts to win the championship and so bring Second Division football to the Valley next season.

There is a very old and true saying that "Half our troubles never happen," so if there are any pessimists among the Charlton supporters after last Saturday's defeat I would ask them to put on a brighter front. Think of Charlton's achievements and fine football this season and let us all take on the role of optimists. It costs nothing to be an optimist and one gets heaps of fun and a long run for your money. It is highly probable that the question of promotion will not be settled until very near the end of the season and quite likely there will be half a dozen clubs in at the death. That Charlton will just pip all their rivals is what we all hope and you can all help by your support, which will be more especially needed when things are not just going right. The fact that Charlton have lost two successive League games for the first time this season should call for praise rather than condemnation. Most of Charlton's rivals for promotion have yet to visit the Valley, so there should be some fine treats in store for our supporters, for remember, better the opposition—better Charlton play.

TO-DAY'S IMPORTANT GAME.

Our game with Luton Town this afternoon is a very important, and probably vital, one for both clubs, for both have designs in the championship. Watford are having a fine run of immunity from defeat but Luton are the most improved side in the Southern Section, many believe. Their record would seem to indicate as much for they only collected five points from their first eight games and yet stand fifth on the League table with 27 points from 23 games. On Saturday last they drew with Chelsea, at Stamford Bridge, in the F.A. Cup.

In the replay, however, Luton produced a type of game which highly astonished not only Chelsea, but also their own supporters. To beat a First Division side by two clear goals was indeed a fine performance and clearly indicates the strength of the opposition to-day. It may be assumed that because Luton had a hard cup-tie on Wednesday that they will be leg-weary and not a 100 per cent. fit for this important League match to-day. While there may be a certain amount of truth in this in theory, one must not lose sight of the fact that nothing succeeds like success and whether it is Cup-tie or League football, the team spirit of a winning side can make up for any defects which may arise.

The Luton team has been attracting quite a lot of attention for some little while. They have a young goalkeeper, Coen, who has been showing brilliant form and cannot be displaced by such experienced players as George Harford and Charlie Preedy, who are on the Luton staff. Curiously enough, both the two last named are ex-Charlton players.

Unfortunately an incident in a recent game has robbed our visitors of their captain and clever full back, Mackey, who has been suspended for a period of two weeks from Monday last, but the defensive resources of Luton from a reserve viewpoint are so good that there should be no appreciable weakening of the team in the absence of the skipper.

Half-back strength has always been a feature of Luton's play and the advent of Thayne, a hefty centre half from Hartlepools United, has added strength in a most vital position.

If both teams produce their best form this should be a thrilling game for with the two clubs making such a strong bid for promotion it is like playing for "double" points. It is surely Charlton's turn to win and this is a game in which we particularly want them to finish in front. But Luton, too, will be desperately anxious to collect the full spoils and so continue their good run of success and furthermore have probably not forgotten that Charlton won at Luton early in the season. That fact will make the visitors go all out to try and get their revenge.

AT SOUTHEND ON SATURDAY.

Our League side are due at Southend on Saturday next, when we are hopeful that Charlton will regain their winning ways away from home. The Essex Club, who were beaten at the Valley by three clear goals last September, have not enjoyed a very successful time this season, but after the Bournemouth surprise it behoves our boys to treat the lowly placed clubs with every respect. They no doubt will.

RESERVES AT BRISTOL.

The reserve team were well beaten at Bristol on Wednesday, the team on duty was as follows: Owen, Forster, Williams, Simpson, Rist, Doherty, Smith, Tann, Prior, Boulter, S. Thomas. The outside-left was on trial from South Wales and while showing promise did not reveal any outstanding ability. The other newcomer to the side was Simpson at right-half, who is on trial with us. He worked very hard for the full ninety minutes and when he has settled down to his new surroundings, should be an asset to the side. The defence played well and Owen, especially deserves mention for a brilliant exhibition.




