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

LUTON TOWN v. TORQUAY UNITED

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THERE is a saying "The last shall be first" and what more apt description can be given to the efforts of Torquay United, our visitors today in a League III encounter. In their first season of League football, it was in June, 1927, that Torquay were elected in place of Aberdare, they found themselves the wooden spoonists of the competition, but fortunately for them they became re-elected, and from thence onwards a period of improvement has been enjoyed, culminating this season, from a playing and result aspect, as the best in the annals of the club. Today they hold the seventh position in the League Table, and are a team that commands respect, so that if we do lower their colours, it will only be after a strenuous tussle on their part to avoid defeat.

When the "Magpies" visited us in September, 1933, we inflicted upon them an overwhelming defeat by ten goals to two. This game will long be remembered by those who witnessed it, for at half-time the score of two goals to one in our favour, far from prophesied such an avalanche as the second half produced. It was a day when everything turned out right for us, our forwards could do nothing wrong, and every shot found its billet.

As if to prove they bore no ill feeling toward us for this drubbing, when we visited their ground at Plainmoor this

season, the Devonshire team endeavoured to turn the tables, and inflicted on us a reverse to the tune of six goals to two, our heaviest defeat of the term. That they possess forwards of marked ability is shown by their aggregate of goals scored. In a total of 26 matches they have collected 57 goals or an average of just over two per match. But for three lapses at home early in the season the "Magpies" would have been serious contenders for the Championship, but even now they have an outside chance. In any case Torquay deserves praise for their performances this season, especially as the team has had to be collected without any idea of spending money on transfer fees.

The origin of the Torquay United Football Club goes back several years prior to 1921 when entry was first made to the Southern League. Before this time two clubs, under the names of Babbacombe and Torquay Town, competed in minor football but eventually an amalgamation was made and professionalism adopted. Torquay have produced many players who have eventually found their destiny in higher circles. Bob Preston wore the black and white jersey before going to Plymouth, Varcoe was transferred to Aston Villa, whilst Leslie, who afterwards went to Birmingham, did yeoman's service for the Club.

CLUB NOTES by "Hatter."

When the result of the match with Queens Park Rangers was received last Saturday, disappointment could be seen written on all faces, as it was realised that a chance for promotion was further receding from our grasp. Somehow or another the Rangers always seem to do well against us, whether we, at the time, figure at the top or bottom of the League. They are, indeed, a "bogy" team for us. The Rangers were, however, good winners on Saturday last, for only on rare occasions did our boys show glimpses of that form of which we know they are capable. Joe Coen kept a splendid goal and could not have stopped any of the three goals that were scored against him. The backs were not so good as we have seen them, but both kicked well under pressure. The halves, too, were "off-song" experiencing one of those days when nothing would go right for them, and doubtless Charlie Fraser's injury hampered his display. The forwards appeared lifeless and their attacks were few and far between, and not at all reminiscent of their recent invigorating displays.

The Reserves match against the Palace was a surprising affair. One would have thought that with the position they hold, the Glaziers would have offered stronger opposition. As it was their defence was exceedingly poor, and doubtless it was because of this that their forward line, which was their greatest asset, moving at times down the field in perfect rhythm, had so much of their good work annulled, on account of the halves failing repeatedly to grasp their intentions. The start of the game was sensational. For the first ten minutes of the game the Palace panned us in and then five minunes later we were leading by three goals, a lead that was decreased by one before the interval arrived. In the second half we added a further two goals and the Palace replied a second time. The "Stiffs" have played much better games than in this match and have been beaten, so perhaps therefore they only received poetic justice. At times the defence was very shaky, and understanding between the backs and goalkeeper sadly at fault. The forwards display was patchy, but when opportunities did come their way they were promptly accepted. A phenomenon of the scoring was that the goals were recorded by each of the forwards individually.

On Wednesday we travelled to Amsterdam and engaged in a match with the Dutch F.A. team. The team that played was the same as at Queens Park with the exception that Reece was tried out at right back and Joe Payne appeared at left half in place of

Charlie Fraser, who was nursing an injury. Let me say here and now that our boys gave a marvellous exhibition of football, constantly bewildering the opposition by their skilful manipulation of the ball and if the score had been 10-1 in our favour it would only have justly represented our superiority. At the conclusion of the match the lads were the recipients of many bouquets from the Dutch Officials and the English trainers, who are attached to the Dutch Clubs, and Bob Glendennig, the ex-Bolton Wanderer player, who now fills the capacity of head trainer-coach to the Netherlands Football Association, informed us that our exhibition was the finest ever given by an English Club in Holland, and he could quite understand why we had beaten Chelsea. The only regrettable incident of the tour happened after two minutes' play when Harry Reece received a recurrence of his leg injury when tackling the Dutch left winger, who taking advantage of Reece's incapacity, middled the ball for Boerhout to score the only point recorded by the home team. Reece's place was taken by McGinnigle, a happening allowable in Holland where in the case of injury a substitute can be fielded, and Hugh put up a sterling resistance. As previously mentioned all our boys played marvellous, and none can be signalled out as being better than another. I have no fear in saying that Luton Town brilliantly upheld the traditions of England and English football in this match as well as earning the respect of the Dutch people on their sporting display (there were only three fouls throughout the match, two against ourselves and one against Holland, all of which were merely technical).
