LUTON TOWN v. ALDERSHOT

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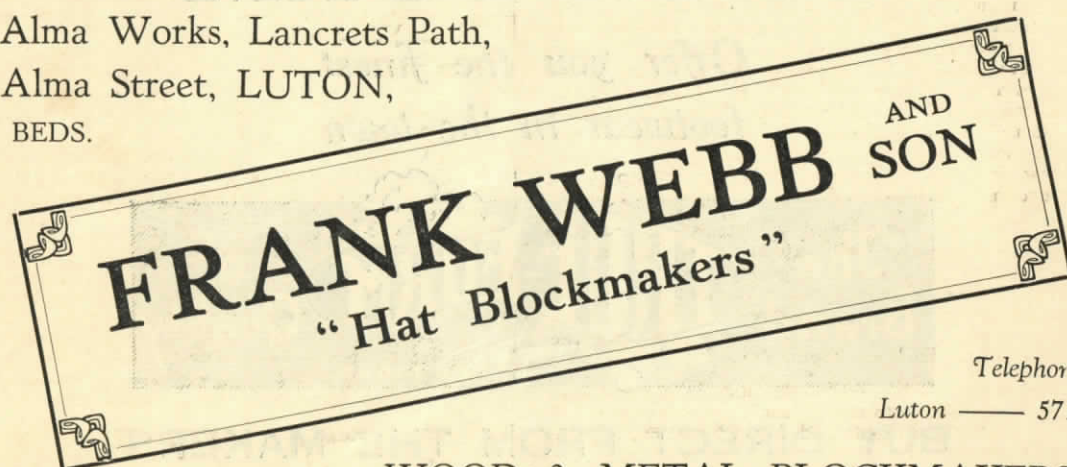
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TODAY, we have the pleasure of welcoming the youngest League Club in the country, as our opponents from Aldershot can only claim eight years of existence, as they came into formation in the year 1927.

In spite of having only a short record it is, however, an enviable one, and especially so when one also takes into consideration that £ s. d. has always been on the scarce side, when the necessity for team building has arisen.

Mr. Angus Seed, Jimmy Seed's brother, who was appointed Manager when the Club was formed, deserves every credit for his work in getting together a side that has accomplished such splendid performances as the army town has done since its inception.

In the first five years the Club distinguished themselves by first being runners-up of the Southern League and then going on to win the trophy outright whilst in addition they carried off the championship of the now defunct Second Division of the London Combination. These facts eventually had effect and subsequently they were elected to the First Division of the London Combination and thus gained the reputation of being the first non-League Club to obtain entry. Soon after this, in 1932-3, they were elected to the Southern Section of the Third Division, and the same season also made history by reaching the Fifth Round of the F.A. Cup before succumbing to Derby County by two goals to nil.

Considerable improvements have been made to the ground since the inception of the Club, and in addition to a stand with a seating capacity of 1,500, the whole of the opposite side has been terraced and covered for the accommodation of the "Bob" Supporters. The ground capacity is 25,000 but the record attendance is only 10,181.

A feature of the Wiltshire Club has always been its formidable defence, and such is the case this year. In Robb, McDougall and Wade they have three defenders of the highest class, and it is certainly not their fault that Aldershot occupy a lowly position in the table. Their goal average of 26 for and 38 against speaks for itself as to where the weakness lies. The team at Luton this afternoon will be as follows:—

William Robb (goal) Height—6 feet. Weight—12 st. 6 lb. Birthplace—Rutherglen, Scotland. Robb is one of the few who have been able to continue in League Football for more than 20 years. Commenced with Birmingham in 1912-13. Prior to joining Aldershot, for whom he has now played for 5 years, was with Hibernians and Glasgow Rangers. A Scottish International.

Reginald Thomas Wade (right back) Height—6 feet. Weight—12 stones. Birthplace—Ilford. Played for his native town as an amateur and gained Amateur Cup Medal. Turned "pro" when signed by West Ham with whom he remained three seasons. Now in his "third" with Aldershot.

Hedley Horace Sheppard (left back) Height—5 ft. 11 in. Weight—11 st. 2 lb. Birthplace—East Ham. Originally played as an amateur for Ilford and Barking and has gained representative honours, as well as London, Essex County, Isthmian and Athenian Leagues, F.A. XI. Is also Amateur Cup Medallist. Last two seasons was with West Ham and was signed up as a half back.

Edwin David Gerrard (right half) Height—5 ft. 11 in. Weight—11 st. 6 lb. Birthplace—Aldershot. First attracted attention of more than one club when in the Royal Tank Corps, but was prevailed to throw in his lot with his native town. Now in his third season with the Wiltshire Club.

Jack Middleton (centre half) Height—5 ft. 10½ in. Weight—12 st. 10 lb. Is the biggest surprise packet since the formation of the Club. Was considered to have been finished five years ago but since having occupied the centre half berth appears to have took on a new lease of life. Is a perfect skipper and a good Club man. Now in his eighth season.

Gordon Charles Summerbee (left half) Height—5 ft. 11 in. Weight—11 st. 1 lb. Birthplace—Winchester. Formerly played as an amateur for Basingstoke in the Hants League, but has developed immensely during his two seasons of professional football with Aldershot. Has been played in various positions to give him experience and shows promise of a great future.

William George Izzard (outside right) Height—5 ft. 9 in. Weight—11 stones. Birthplace—Hitchin. Another product of the Royal Tank Corps. Was signed on from amateur ranks last season, making 26 first team appearances. Would improve his play if he would "cut in" more frequently.

Bert Richard Lutterloch (inside right) Height—5 ft. 10½ in. Weight—12 stones. Birthplace—London. Secured last week from Wolverhampton Wanderers. Played as an amateur for Tuffnel Park before turning "pro," and proceeding to Lille (France). On his return from the Continent in August last was expected to sign for Crystal Palace but the Wolves "nipped in."

John Oakes (centre forward) Height—5 ft. 11½ in. Weight—12 st. 8 lb. Birthplace—Winsford, Cheshire. Has seen service with Notts Forest, Southend and Spennymoor United. Many good judges say his best position is centre half whilst others plump for the right half berth. The fact remains however that he scored 41 goals for Spennymoor last season.

James Black (inside left) Height—5 ft. 9 in. Weight—11 st. 8 lb. Birthplace—Motherwell. Has seen service with Cowdenbeath, Charlton and Burton Town. Charlton paid a good round

sum for his signature. Is not content only to do the foraging but has a crack at goal as well.

Leonard Stanley Williams (outside left). Height—5 ft. 10 in. Weight—10 st. 7 lb. Birthplace—Cefnybedd, Denbighshire. The county only is pronounceable. His first club of note was Bournemouth with whom he played for four seasons. Was later transferred to Portsmouth at a substantial figure. Can play on either wing but would do better if he "cut in" with more frequency.

CLUB NOTES by "Hatter."

It was a great performance to bring back the spoils from Swindon, and the victory was all the more sweeter (now let us be candid) because it was unexpected. The elements were atrocious and in addition to a wind with the velocity of a gale, there was also a torrential downpour of rain throughout the match. To give one two illustrations. It is only in test questions that we even find asked of what decision would be given if a goal kick is taken and the wind blows the ball over the goal line etc., but this happened with frequency at Swindon. Then again Referee Carnwell freely admitted that if the ground had become waterlogged during the match he would have abandoned the game.

The game commenced with a rush on the Swindon left, our defenders having difficulty in getting the ball away, and it was five minutes before the seige could be raised. Then the forwards put on pressure and after several shots had been put in Sam Bell scored from 15 yards out. This goal came after 7 minutes play. From the kick off the forwards again made ground, but even although they had the majority of the play until the interval nothing further was added to the score. On the resumption with the wind in their faces, the forwards again made tracks for the Swindon goal, but further success eluded them. Much more was seen of the Railwaymen this half, but Joe Coen was not seriously troubled, although he made one great save, when he fell at the feet of Bowl after the latter had broken through. Tom Mackey and Tom Smith put up a sterling resistance as also did the halves, although Bill Thayne was not seen at his best until the second half. The forwards played well, and with any luck would have scored several goals, but the elements generally put paid to their final intentions.

In the Swindon "Football Pink" there is rather humorous reading in the report of the match by the local scribe. During the progress of the first half he writes "The wind was playing queer tricks with the ball and the wonder was that the football was of such excellent character." In his commentary of the game after Swindon had lost he writes "Swindon failed dismally with the conditions in their favour, but a draw would have been a fairer result to an extremely poor game. Good football was out of the question." Isn't it funny how some reporters change their minds so quickly?

The Reserves eventually easily overcame Queens Park Rangers Reserves, but the game itself was not very inspiring. The opposition proved to be about the weakest seen on the ground this season, and probably this fact had something to do with the

display of the Stiffs. In the first half chances galore went a-begging before the Rangers were allowed to open the score, the result of seemingly half-hearted tackling by our defence. After the interval other chances presented themselves some of which were accepted and we eventually proved victorious by five goals to one. The defence with the exception of McGinnigle and Joe Payne (in the second half) appeared unsteady, whilst with the chances that came their way, the forwards should have trebled the score.

I am indebted to Mr. J. Oudheusden, the Treasurer of the Ajax F.C. of Amsterdam, for the translations of the following press report of our match against the Dutch F.A. In the "Sport Kronick," the official paper of the Dutch F.A., it says "Luton Town played splendidly and won 3-1. The English opponents showed such good quality against this rather weak Dutch team that there was little question of a fight. It is not intended that these trial games should provide merely spectacular football, but Luton gave a brilliant demonstration, and all the more so as they were playing on a slippery ground and against a cutting North-Easter. The English team did their best to leave a good impression behind them, and besides showing good technical play, were possessed of such a speed that clean positional play was executed like lightning. The defence of the Luton team was not so safe—open play by the Dutch front line would have led to success. In the middle line Thayne caught the eye and of the forwards, all of whom combined splendidly, the outside left, Stephenson, played brilliantly. He would be received with open arms in the Dutch International Team." So that's that.

Don't forget the Reserve Match on Monday afternoon next, when Clapton Orient provide the opposition. Kick-Off 3.15 p.m.
