LUTON TOWN v. BOURNEMOUTH

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

FOR the second week in succession we have Bournemouth and Boscombe as our visitors, but on this occasion it is the League III team that we have the pleasure to entertain.

On Saturday last, during their match with Swindon Town at the Dean Court Ground, the "Cherries" suffered a severe blow and one that will handicap them seriously. In a collision their centre half, Pincott, received an injury and had to be escorted from the field, later being removed to hospital suffering from concussion.

Bournemouth and Boscombe was originally formed in the year 1890 and was known as Boscombe St. John's Football Club, but nine years later through the ambitions of the inevitable local enthusiasts the present club was formed under the name of Boscombe. In these early days in junior football the club played at Castlemain Road, Pokesdown, and had for a coach, that redoubtable player, Charlie Stevenson. It was not before 1905-6, however, that the club first began to make a name for itself, but in this season practically all honours possible in both junior and senior circles in Hampshire and Dorset were gained.

The F.A. Cup Competition was entered for the first time in 1913-14, and the season following the club adopted professionalism and entry obtained to the now defunct South Eastern League. So far as playing results were concerned this venture proved disastrous, as the club finished in the lowest position.

The war brought a cessation of activities so far as League Matches were concerned and on a resumption in 1919, a season was spent in County League and Cup Football, but the year following, competition in the Southern League was sought. It was not until 1923 that Boscombe were admitted to the Football League, and in order to commemorate this unique occasion, the title of the club was changed to Bournemouth and Boscombe Athletic.

When the Dean Court became the domicile of the club in 1910, it proved to be a piece of waste ground, and the Club were indebted to the late Mr. J. E. Cooper Dean, a former president, who rented it to them on favourable terms. Much voluntary work had to be put in to make the ground in a proper playing condition, and with the growth of the club the accommodation has had to be enlarged—the original stand held 300—and the facilities increased.

When we met the "Cherries" at Dean Court earlier in the season, a very enjoyable game resulted in a victory for us by three goals to one. On that occasion the two teams were as follows:—

CLUB NOTES by "Hatter."

Many of our supporters must have had another surprise when they read in the papers last Friday week that Sam Bell had been transferred to Tottenham Hotspur and I expect too, that many supporters when they did read this item of news, were to say the least, a little annoyed that another of their favourites had been allowed to leave for pastures new. On the face of it, it does appear that the Directors are going back on their word—that nothing but the best is good enough for Luton—but I can assure you however that such is not the case. The fees received for Bill Brown and Sam Bell were such that it would have been a bad policy to have turned them down, but in both cases before the ultimate transfer was effected the decision to remain at, or leave, Luton, was left entirely to the players themselves. And who blames them for showing a preference for First Division Football? After all soccer is their profession and it is everyone's ambition to reach the pinnacle of their profession.

At the same time as Sam Bell was transferred to Tottenham we concluded arrangements for the transfer from the Spurs of David Wilson Colquhoun, their right half back. It is the wish of the Directors that any idea amongst the supporters that this transfer was in the nature of a part exchange for Bell should be squashed. Before any mention of Sam Bell's pending transfer was ever made negotiations had been opened for the acquisition of this player. David is a very versatile player and was secured by the Spurs at a substantial fee from St. Mirren just over four seasons ago. He is 5ft. 9ins. in height and weighs nearly 12 stone. He appeared at right half in our team against Bristol City last Saturday and made a very successful debut, his splendid combination with George Martin and Wilf Crompton often evoking applause.

The match at Bristol was great, our boys if possible, surpassing all previous performances given. Joe Coen kept a great goal whilst Tom Mackay and Reg Kingham put up a sterling resistance. The halves too not only defended well but ably assisted their forwards, Tom Smith playing finely in the unaccustomed role of left half back. The forwards gave a great exhibition and George Stephenson was always a thorn in the flesh of the Bristol defence. George Martin too played finely and the combination of the right flank was equal to previous games when the personnel was different. The two goal scorers, Jack Ball and Fred Roberts again showed their abilities, the two points scored being both great efforts.

The Reserve game with Bournemouth was not too brilliant but considering the severity of the day and the boisterous wind the "Stiffs" did extremely well to notch two points. Criticism of the individual players is not possible as the elements were atrocious. Harrison, the outside left from Blackpool who is on trial, had few opportunities, but from the little he did have to do there are quite good possibilities in him.

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
