LUTON TOWN v. READING

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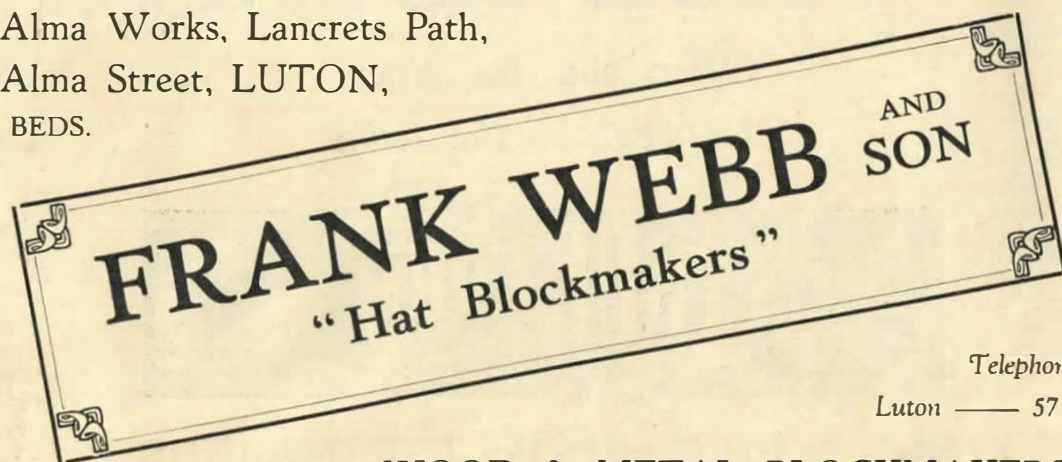

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TODAY'S game with Reading is expected to produce something of the "needle" variety for although there is but faint hope of either Club ousting Charlton from the leadership of the Division, a victory for one or the other will prove of vital importance in the final placings for the runners-up position. Coupled with this interest in positional advantage is the fact that in the "Biscuiters" eleven appear two ex-Luton players in Tom Tait and Albert Hayhurst, and doubtless they will be all out in an endeavour to lower our colours. League positions today find the Berkshire Club one rung higher than ourselves, being one point to the good for the same number of matches played. Of recent weeks Reading have shown a tendency towards failing to maintain their performances in the earlier part of the season and last week, when playing at home to Southend, had to go all the way to be successful by the odd goal in five.

The Reading Club have a history of sixty-four years and successive decades have always provided some remarkable achievement. Formed in 1871, they carried off the Berks & Bucks Cup, the first year it was offered for competition, in 1878-9, a performance that was repeated in 1891-2. Professionalism was adopted in 1895 and membership to the Southern League obtained. In this competition they proved to be runners-up in 1902-3 and again in 1904-5. In 1910-11 relegation to the Second Division of the Southern League was their only consolation but after only one season in this lower grade a return was made to the senior division. On the formation of the Third Division after the War membership to this body was secured and promotion to the Second Division gained in Season 1925-6. The following season they appeared in the semi-final of the F.A. Cup, but 1930-31 again found them relegated to the Third Division.

When we met Reading at Elm Park earlier in the season the "Biscuiters" were successful by the only goal scored: on that occasion the two teams appeared as follows:—

Reading. Whittaker, Gregory, Robson, Johnson, Hayhurst, Wright, Butler, Chandler, Tait, Barley, Fielding.

Luton Town. Coen, Mackey, Reece, Brown, Thayne, Fraser, Martin, Bell, Ball, Rennie, Stephenson.

The "Biscuiters" team today is as follows:—

Frank Wildman (goalkeeper) Secured from Wolverhampton Wanderers in February, following a serious injury sustained by Whittaker, their regular first team goalkeeper. Was himself injured in the League match against Queens Park Rangers and today resumes his position for the first time.

Michael Boyle (right full back) A Durham lad born at Bearpark and played for the village club before signing for Bolton Wanderers in 1929. Was transferred to Reading in 1933.

William Robson (left full back) Another Durham lad, who hails from Castletown, playing for Hylton Colliery. Was signed by Derby County in 1927 and transferred to West Ham United in 1933. Recruited by Reading this season.

George Johnson (right half back) Still another Durham native being born at Ashington. Was playing for Ashington Welfare before being snapped up by Ashington, when that club played in the Northern Section. Went to Sheffield Wednesday in 1930-31 and two seasons later to Reading. Was originally an inside forward.

Albert Hayhurst (centre half back) Really needs no introduction as his career is well known to all Luton followers of football. Born at Birdwell, near Barnsley, and was playing for Frickley Colliery when we signed him up. Was not retained by us at the season's end and was signed up by Joe Smith in the June.

William Wright (left half back) A Yorkshireman first seeing the light of day at Sheffield. A real football veteran, who played for Southend United in 1920 and was signed by Bolton Wanderers the following season. Remained with the Lancashire Club until last season when he was signed up by the Berkshire Club.

James Liddle (outside right) A further native of Durham being born at West Stanley and was playing for the local club when Reading discovered him last season. Has shown such exceptional ability that has won a regular place in the premier team.

Joseph McGough (inside right) Was secured by Reading in season 1932-3 and has been something of a utility man. Has only secured a regular place in their League team this season.

Thomas Tait (centre forward) Another player who needs no introduction to Luton supporters. Was with us for three seasons being secured from Bolton Wanderers in 1931-2 along with Fred Kean and William Miller. Was born at Hetton-le-Hole, Durham, and played for Southport and Manchester City before having two seasons at Bolton. Was transferred by us to Bournemouth in exchange for Jack Russell, but after about ten weeks was again transferred to Reading.

John Barley (inside left) A Derbyshire product and first played for Staveley Town. Had a season with the Arsenal in 1928-9 and then joined the "Biscuiters." Is also a useful half back.

Fred Chandler (outside left) Born at Portsmouth, but played most of his football for Newport, the Isle of Wight Club. Occasionally assisted Portsmouth but Reading stepped in while the Hampshire Club were making up their minds. Was originally a half back, but is at home at either of the left forward positions.

CLUB NOTES by "Hatter."

For the ninth League match in succession the "boys" remained immune from defeat but the match at Gillingham on Saturday last, as supporters who made the journey will testify, was no sinecure and it was only after a ding-dong struggle both against the Kentish players and the elements that the spectre of defeat was eliminated. The Gillingham players appeared to revel in kick and rush methods which, coupled with offside tactics on the part of the defence, practically devoided the game of all skill. The men of Kent too, were not averse to using their weight and in view of these happenings together with the struggle against a boisterous wind, in the first half, it was some time before our "boys" could get settled down. Quite early in the game Fred Roberts was badly fouled by Lister and this injury had its effects for the duration of the game. In consequence the left wing was not so effective as usual but George Martin and Wilf Crompton rose to the occasion and the latter gave his old team mates a real worrying afternoon. It was from his centre that Jack Ball headed a brilliant equaliser early in the second half. After the change of ends our "boys" put on full steam and with any luck, and also if Holland had not been so brilliant (is it not curious that all Watford or ex-Watford goalkeepers always play a brilliant game against us?) in the Gillingham goal we should have won with ease. Anyhow a point away from home is always a good achievement and we congratulate all the team on their fine performances of recent weeks.

The "Stiffs" had a sad afternoon at home to Fulham Reserves and were defeated by two clear goals. The "Cottagers" fully deserved their victory and but for the sterling resistance of our defence in which Reece, Payne, McGinnigle and Taylor were outstanding, the score might have been much greater. The forwards had a very sorry afternoon and could do nothing right. It was very unfortunate for Joe Payne that he should be instrumental for Fulham's first goal for he played a great game throughout, tackling with shrewdness, besides positioning and kicking well. Harry Reece, too, on a resumption after several weeks injury, kicked and tackled well, his recent cause of indisposition at no time presenting itself.

Today we entertain Reading and a thrilling tussle should ensue, whilst the "Stiffs" visit Coventry.
