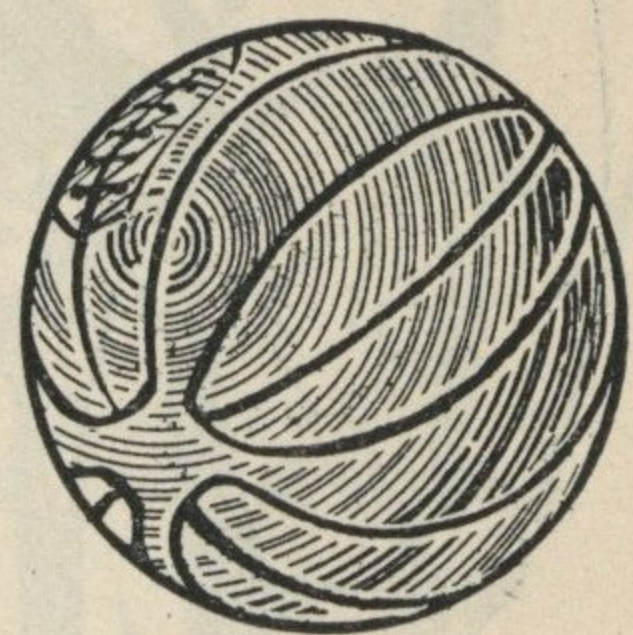

TO-NIGHT'S opponents are our old friends the "Cobblers" who return the visit we made to the boot town on Saturday last. The fixture itself is a re-arrangement as Northampton were due to play here on December 8th last; at that time, however, Cup Tie interests were playing a big part in the affairs of the "Cobblers" and of necessity the meeting between us had to be deferred. As we know our supporters always enjoy these "Derby" games, we suggested that the match should be played today, and to this our visitors readily agreed, as they did also to a suggestion that the match be deferred until the evening, when practically every supporter who desires, is able to be present. For these facilities, which were made without any demur, we thank the "Cobblers" and trust they will reap their reward by sharing in a bumper "gate."

Northampton Town came into being in the spring of the year 1897, its founders being a group of young assistant schoolmasters, most of whom were connected with the Northampton and District Elementary Schools' Athletic Association, which in those days was an extremely flourishing organisation as regards junior football. These young men met and discussed the possibilities of promoting a professional football club, and although money was scarce the necessary financial backing was ultimately found and so the Club started its career.

The first season admission was obtained to the Northampton League and the finances for this period showed a loss of sixty pounds. The Club, however, carried on and the backers instead of becoming dismayed, extended their activities with the result that membership of the Midland League, and subsequently admission to the Southern League, was obtained.

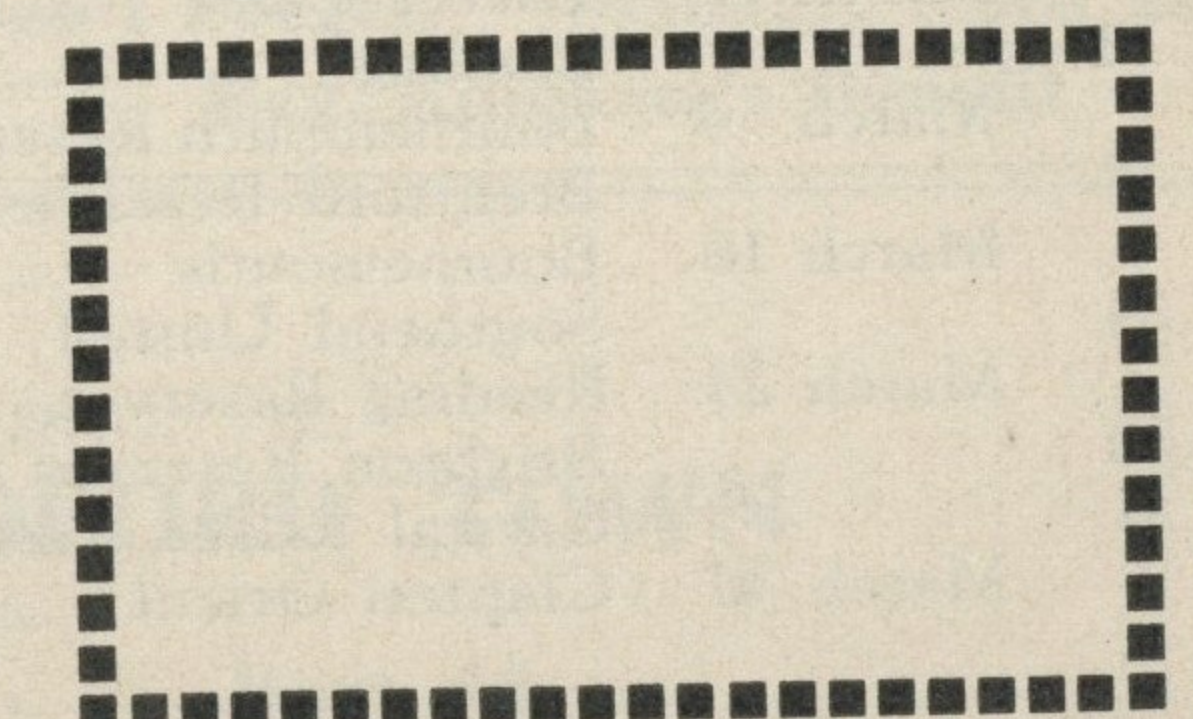
Strangely enough very few honours have come the way of the "Cobblers" and perhaps their best

performances was that of season 1927-8, when they were runners-up to Millwall, the champions of the Southern Section of the Third Division.

Our visitors have not had a very successful time this term, but of recent weeks, since the advent of Mr. Syd Puddefoot as manager, results have been greatly in their favour. Our old player, Tom Bell, now seems to have found his shooting boots and report states that he is quite a favourite of the local "fans."

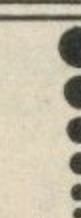
