Tonight we entertain Bournemouth and Boscombe in a return League match, the first game at Bournemouth on Wednesday evening last resulting in a narrow win for the "Cherries" by two goals to one. Let us hope therefore that we can turn the tables on them tonight.

The "Cherries" have undergone a number of changes since last season, but greatest of them all is their appointment of that great international "Bob" Crompton to take charge of their destinies. This is Mr. Crompton's first experience of managerial control which is all the more amazing when one considers the great successes which crowded his playing career. He established an English International record on March 13th, 1911, when selected to play against Wales at Millwall he played in his twenty-fourth international match. This record was previously held by Steve Bloomer, who had made twenty-three international appearances. In the same season Bob brought his total to twenty-five and to commemorate this unique achievement he was presented by the Football Association with a photographic enlargement of himself. His final bag of caps was thirty-four. It may not be widely known that Wilf Crompton, our outside right, has the honour of proudly claiming Bob as his father.

Bournemouth did not have a too successful playing season last term and finished in the bottom half of the table. An improvement in this direction is expected this season, as several improve-

ments in the playing strength have been made. Newcomers to their ranks include that famous old "Pompey" stalwart and English International inside forward Jack Smith, W. Bucknall and J. King, two full backs from Wellington Town and Notts County respectively, M. Burgin, a centre forward who has a reputation as a goalscorer with Tranmere Rovers, and J. Riley, another forward from Bristol City.

The "Cherries" have commenced this season with a flying start for after drawing three goals all at Southend on the opening day of the season, they repeated their victory over us last Wednesday by scoring four goals without a reply from the Cobblers on Saturday. Thus they have obtained a possible five points out of six, which is remarkably good going.

We are presenting at each match, to two holders of programmes, a ticket which will enable them to obtain free admission to the Grand Stand at the following match (Cup Ties and Special Matches excepted) that is to be played on this ground.

A board will be taken round the ground during the interval intimating the numbers that have been selected, and holders, who have in their possession programmes bearing these numbers, are requested to make personal application at the office of the Club immediately after the termination of the match, in order to claim these tickets.

CLUB NOTES by "Hatter"

Yes we are disappointed, but let me assure you at the outset there are none more so than the players themselves. Nothing seems to go right, they try their utmost, but the run of the ball seems to go the way of the opposition. These are the times in the career of a Club when encouragement is most needed. We have all had those phases in our own lives when we drop to the depths of despondency, and we have appreciated that little bit of sympathy that has been extended to us in our ill luck by our neighbour, together with his assurance that there is always a silver lining lurking about somewhere. So therefore let us give encouragement instead of criticism to the players. They proved last season that they could deliver the goods, try then to aid them in finding their true form.

The game with Southend on Saturday was a typical example of the luck of the game. The boys started off in brilliant fashion, but in a Southend breakaway after ten minutes play, Bill Fellowes had the misfortune to slip down with the result that Southend obtained an early lead. I do not wish to belittle our opponents on this success for the shot that obtained the point was a brilliant one, which Joe Coen had no chance to prevent from entering the net. Not dismayed by this early reverse the team played harder than ever, but success did not come their way until Turner foolishly fouled Jack Ball in the penalty area, and the centre forward converted the spot kick. Elated with this success the boys fought to obtain a lead before the interval but in this they were denied. On the resumption the forwards literally bombarded the Southend goal, but all to no avail, and then another Southend breakaway brought a second goal, which ultimately proved to be a "decider." From now until the final whistle blew the Southend defence were literally kept on the run, but no one could force the ball between the goal posts.

We have seen better games than this one, but do not let us get downhearted too quickly. All must admit that the boys put out everything in an endeavour to win the match, sometimes it seemed that they were trying too hard and were too anxious, but all to no avail. Again I appeal to all supporters to give the lads as much encouragement as possible. A word of praise does more good than a page of criticism.

The Reserves game at Charlton was a curious affair. They too suffered the misfortune of the premier team and were decidedly out of luck. It seemed almost incredible that Charlton should be leading by four goals to nil at half time for the exchanges had been very even. Charlton opened the scoring three minutes after the start, following weak tackling on the right. From now onwards the Stiffs had a good share of the play, a brilliant run by Crook ending in Cook's shot hitting the post, and following repeated attacks both Crook and Cook shot over whilst the Charlton goalie saved in brilliant fashion when Cook and Beresford had cleared the defence. As so often happens a sudden breakaway on the Charlton left produced a perfect centre which was converted and shortly afterwards a defensive error produced a third goal. Charlton now put on pressure and a shot crashed against the crossbar. The Stiffs now had another spell and a shot from Colquhoun hit the side net, whilst a brilliant movement in which all the forwards joined ended in Taylor putting behind. Just before the interval Charlton obtained their goal. To describe the game after the change of ends all one needs to say is that

the Charlton goal was absolutely bombarded throughout the period. First Taylor scored a brilliant goal and then shots were rained in which either hit the woodwork or were diverted for corners. In a tussle Joe Taylor was injured and went on the wing George Turner taking the inside berth. The change did good for Turner soon scored a brilliant goal which was reminiscent of the point he obtained against Bournemouth and Joe Taylor added a third. Try as they would an equaliser would not come, and the final whistle found them undeservedly beaten.

T. P. King (Right or left back) 5ft. 9ins.; 10st. 3lbs. Born at Belvoir. With Notts County, his first professional club, last season.

G. A. Bellis (Left back) 6ft.; 12st. 10lbs. Born in India. Previous clubs, Southport, Wrexham, Wolverhampton Wanderers and Burnley. Originally a centre-half. Wolves and Burnley paid big fees for his transfer. With the Wolves when they won Division II. and Central League championships, 1931/32. Two and a half seasons with Burnley.

W. Smith (Right half back) 5ft. 10½ins.; 11st. Native of Cellardyke. Came to Boscombe from junior Scottish Club in 1933/34 season, as a centre-forward. League appearances, 33.

F. Pincott (Centre half) 6ft. 1in.; 10st. 11lbs. Native of Bristol. Joined the Wolves in 1931 and came to Dean Court last year. League appearances, 32.

W. Moralee (Left half back) 5ft. 9½ins.; 9st. 7lbs. Oldest player in point of service on club's books. Came from Huddersfield to Boscombe in 1928 after two seasons with Yorkshire club; formerly played for Crook, his native town. Originally an inside left. League appearances, 162; six goals.

W. Barrow (Outside wing man) 5ft. 5½ins.; 9st. 9lbs. Was with Southend last season, and formerly with Margate. Born at Cardiff.

J. W. Smith (Inside right) 5ft. 7½ins.; 12st. Native of Whitburn, and one of three brothers in first class football. Was Portsmouth's leading tactician for seven seasons; previously with South Shields. English International v. Wales, Ireland, and Spain, 1932.

J. Riley (Centre forward) 5ft. 8½ins.; 11st. 7lbs. Went to Goldthorpe United, a Sheffield junior club, to Bristol Rovers as professional in 1931. Stayed two seasons and then moved to Ashton Gate for couple of seasons with Bristol City. Born at Sheffield.

W. Chalmers (Inside left) 5ft. 9ins.; 11st. Two seasons with Raith Rovers before joining Boscombe in 1932, as outside left. League appearances, 61; goals, 7.

E. Parris (Outside-left) 5ft 9ins.; 11st. 3lbs. Native of Chepstow (Monmouth). Six seasons with Bradford Park Avenue, his only previous professional club. Welsh international v. Ireland, 1932.
