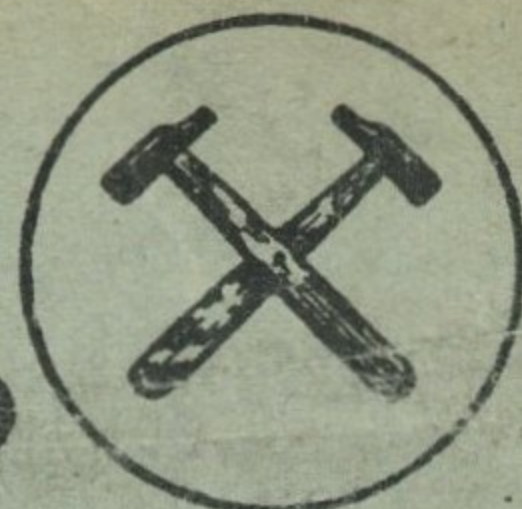

NOTES

OUR VISITORS

We accord to-day's visitors—Luton—the heartiest of Upton Park welcomes. They are indeed old friends.

Considerable time has elapsed since last our First XI's met, and to-day's experience is one entirely new to us, for the luck of the Cup Draw has never before thrown us together. Apart from our Reserve team associations we have not met here in senior and competitive football since December 2nd, 1916. That was in "war time" London Combination. The result of the match was 2-0 in our favour. Our previous visit from the "Hatters" was when, as Southern Leaguers we met here on September 12th, 1914. On that occasion the points were ours after a 3-0 victory.

Although generally regarded by most as Third Leaguers since the inception of their Division, it must not be forgotten that Luton were in the Second League a long time before we became members. In fact they joined that section in season 1896-7 and remained until 1899-1900.

Experience has taught us that League status is poor indication of likely Cup form, and prophecies in favour of members of higher Divisions have often gone astray. Even if one did rely upon League form in weighing up chances in to-day's game, the "Hatters" would receive a very strong vote, so we will be content with saying that we regard our visitors as most keen, attractive and forceful opponents, and trust that a good game and a fair result may ensue from this meeting.

NOTTS FOREST

A well-deserved and welcome pair of points was gained at Nottingham last Saturday. Our lads played delightful football, well worthy—as the "Forest" people put it—of First Division status.
