



WE welcome today our hosts of Saturday last West Ham United, and I trust they will find that the hospitality meted to them will not be lacking to that which they bestowed on us. Anyhow we shall do our best, although we cannot boast of the marvellous accommodation of the Boleyn Ground.

Last Saturday's game was the first occasion that the "Hammers" and ourselves had been brought together in the F. A. Cup and it is certain that it is one that will be talked about for many years to come. The football displayed was magnificent and the sporting spirit displayed by the two teams was no less congratulatory. It would have been indeed unfortunate if either team had been the losers.

West Ham United came into the football world on July 5th 1900, after Mr. A. F. Hills, of the Thames Iron Works decided that he would not run the works club any longer. The first three seasons in the Southern League were played at the Memorial Recreation Grounds, Canning Town, but the support was so bad, that at the end of April 1904, it was decided to find a new home, and eventually the Boleyn Ground at Upton Park was secured.

During the War the London Clubs played in the London Combination and the "Hammers" were favoured by receiving assistance from prominent provincial players.

When the League programmes were resumed in 1919-20, West Ham were elected to membership of the 2nd Division and in season 1922-3 occupied the second position with consequent promotion to the Premier Division. This same season proved to be the most successful in the annals of the Club for they also went to Wembley, where they were beaten by Bolton Wanderers in the most memorable and only Final not played according to rules, the crowd being yards over the touch lines all around the pitch.

West Ham, too, have had some wonderful experiences on Continental tours having played in Austria, Hungary, Germany, Czecho Slovakia, Switzerland, France, Spain, Holland, Denmark, Sweden, Norway and are the only Club to have played the British Army at Cologne in 1925, and again at Wiesbaden in 1928.

They have been honoured by King Alfonso in Madrid, King Christian in Copenhagen, King Haakon in Oslo and the Regent in Budapest.

In January, 1913, they were concerned in what was then a sensational transfer, Danny Shea going to Blackburn for the record sum of £2,000 and later, in 1921, Syd Puddefoot went to Falkirk for another record fee of £5,000.

During last season West Ham United suffered a double loss through the unexpected passing of their Chairman and Vice-Chairman, Messrs W. F. White and G. F. Davis. These gentlemen had been connected with the "Hammers" almost since their inception.

We are presenting at each match, to two holders of programmes, a ticket which will enable them to obtain free admission to the Grand Stand at the following match (Cup ties and Special Matches excepted) that is to be played on this ground.

A board will be taken round the ground during the interval intimating the numbers that have been selected, and holders, who have in their possession programmes bearing these numbers, are requested to make personal application at the office of the Club immediately after the termination of the match, in order to claim these tickets.

CLUB NOTES by "Hatter"

Our League success at Southend last Saturday week, appeared to be unfavourable with the Press as a whole. Practically without exception we were dubbed as fortunate and I did not notice any report that gave mention to the fact that we had the ball in the "Shrimpers" net on three occasions. Then again marked notice was made of the poor shooting of the Southend forwards, but no one made mention of the fine positioning of our defence, which forced the opposition into unfavourable positions in which to shoot at goal. No it is not always advisable to take too much notice of football reports as they appear in the press. It is true however, that Southend had more of the game territorily than ourselves, but it is goals that count, and if a club possesses defenders who can prevent forwards from scoring, surely it is not playing the game to belittle their display. To us in Luton, however, we know the capabilities of our team and it will need a lot of adverse criticism before we lose faith in our boys. That's enough of that.

I should think practically all Luton made the trek to Upton Park last Saturday, and if statistics were possible I should think the number was in the region of 9,000. The attendance, too, of over 40,000 was magnificent and I think the West Ham Officials were frankly amazed, as well as delighted, with the number of spectators. The game was played in the

traditional British spirit and many supporters have informed me that they have never seen such pleasing football displayed in a Cup Tie before. It was indeed a fine game, both as regards finesse and temperament and it would have been unfortunate if either Club had retired as losers when the final whistle blew. Today both Clubs live to fight again. May we have another fine game with the laurels going to the most deserving Club.

Today's Cup Tie means a further postponement of our League game with Torquay United. At the moment no new date has been arranged.

On Saturday we receive a visit from our old friends and rivals the "Cobblers." The Northampton Club have shown a marked improvement of late and this will only aid them to intensify their efforts to lower our colours. **Supporters are kindly asked to note that the Kick-Off will be 2.45 p.m.**
