

So, we will review our performance to date v. Walsall, and v. Clapton. At Walsall we lost by the only goal scored, and did what most teams who visit there will do this season. Over the past five years Walsall have an average of only 2 games lost per season, at home. It is a very keen pointer, therefore, that Luton beat them in their Monday night match.

As far as the Clapton match was concerned, well, we won. But only just! And the outstanding features of the match were the splendid City defence, Pugh's magnificent goal, and the elementary absence of marking man for man which culminated in the only Clapton goal. And what a snappy move?

To-day, we have the mighty Luton Town with us again. What a wonderful struggle they put up in the effort to beat Coventry for promotion last season. They have made a good start to achieve that ambition this time, and one or two new chums are all they needed to sign; they start off with a team which knows the real meaning of the word "Understanding."

The probable team here to-day will show only two changes from the team which beat us here last season. Dolman, in goal, and Hodge, outside right, both of whom were signed from Bristol City last season. Both these boys are well known to you, and are quite up to the standard the Strawplaiters have set for their players.

They have made a collection of first team centre-forwards in the person of Patrick, from Bury; "Ten Goal" Payne, who crushed Bristol Rovers last season, and one of the famous Mills family, but not the variety stars.

But, thanks to Mr. Secretary Wickson, I am able to give you pen-pictures of two of their most dangerous forwards.

most regular member of his side last year, and scored 10 goals from outside left. One we remember, at the start of the game down here. Is a keen Bowls player.

Martin, George Scott, inside right, a Glasgow toddler of 5ft. 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ ins., weighing 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ stone. Has travelled via Hamilton Accies, Hull City, Everton and Middlesboro, to Luton, where he is a popular member of the club. He is a fine Tenor vocalist, who has had a B.B.C. audition; swings a wicked 'ood for Bedfordshire Bowls' Association, and of course, being a Scot, is a keen and expert golfer.

Two regular fellows, these Georges, and the only "side" they have they use for Bowls.

And now a word on the topic which is the main conversational item amongst supporters in Cardiff just now. The centre-forward position . . . and Cecil Smith.

There has been a lot of back-chat about Cecil, but I would like to point out that he was the top scorer for Burnley last season, and made 29 appearances in the 1st team. Was in their Cup side which beat Birmingham, and scored 3 out of 5 goals by which they beat Swansea in the League match.

Cecil has not struck oil yet, but I think we are due to see things before long. After all, the team has to settle down, and get acquainted with one another's style. And while on that subject, I hope that the W formation is not here to stop; for the good of the side, and the centre-forward, 5 up should be the watchword.

After all, we have two fine attacking wing half-backs for contact purposes. Go to it, forwards!

I am told that Jock Leckie has captured the Walsall fans by his showing so far. His challenging dive to take the ball from Smithy in full cry was the sort of thing he only would tackle; no lack of courage here.

But one stormer which was beating him all the way was saved by sticking out his foot; which proves that only the brave deserve the luck.

And did you note that Jack Everest has opened his account with a penalty goal for Southend against Watford. He can certainly hit 'em.

Luton Town was the first all-professional side in the South. Formed in 1885. 1900 was the first hint of professionalism—three players receiving 5/- a week. On August 10, 1901, the whole team became professional—half-a-crown for a Home match and Three shillings for an away engagement. Local talent was payed double the ordinary wages.

Luton were one of the nine original members when the Southern League was formed in 1894. In 1897 they applied and were admitted to the Football League (Division II.). But the going was hard and finishing last but one in their third season, they returned to the Southern League. That League became the Third Division (Southern Section) soon after the War, and they are still battling valiantly for promotion to the League they left all those years ago. Last season were runners-up to Coventry.
