

WE extend a hearty welcome to our visitors, Walsall, this evening, for they provide League III (Southern Section) opposition once again after a lapse of five seasons, during which period they have been members of the Northern Section. We wish them everything they wish themselves during their return stay with us.

The Walsall Football Club was formed in the year 1892 and is one of the oldest League clubs in existence. They were first known as the Walsall Town Swifts, and in their earliest days were proud members of the Birmingham and District Football League. The "Saddlers," as they are nicknamed, joined the Football League in 1892-3 and their title was changed to its present form in 1896.

Their first domicile was on a pitch in the West Bromwich Road, but a move to their present quarters was effected in 1900.

The position of the Club has been very precarious on a number of occasions, but always at these times loyal support from a number of local interests has allowed them to keep the flag flying when it has almost been a foregone conclusion that the Club would have to disband. Foremost amongst these loyal supporters is their present Chairman, Mr. H. L. Fellows, who, by the way, we hope will have a speedy recovery from his present illness, and what greater honour could the Walsall Club bestow on him, than by calling their ground after his name. Fellows Park and Walsall are synonyms.

Walsall lost their place in Division II of the Football League in 1901, but played in the Northern Section of Division III from 1921 to 1927 when they were transferred to the Southern Section for four seasons. At the end of season 1930-1 they were re-transferred to the Northern Section, only to make a welcome re-appearance amongst us this term.

Their highest victory is their 8 goals to 1 defeat of Mansfield Town, whilst their largest defeat was administered at the hands of Northampton Town, who scored ten goals without reply in November, 1927. In season 1922-3 they occupied the third position in the Northern Section Table, whilst in season 1933-4 they were one place lower.

Among the other notable achievements accomplished by the "Saddlers" was their defeat of the Arsenal in a Football Association Cup Tie in January, 1933, whilst it is also recorded in the Club's history that when they played Aston Villa at Villa Park in 1930, the match drew an attendance of 76,000. Another milestone dates as far back as 1897, when they played on the same ground just after the Villa had beaten Everton in the Cup Final and had also won the League Championship. Even the most ardent Walsall supporters regarded this game as a foregone conclusion, but the Villa included a number of reserves and the match ended in a draw. For the replay the Villa had learned their lesson and the full team were turned out, but this did not bring any compensation, for the "Saddlers" eventually came out winners by the odd goal in three.

Newcomers to the claret and light blue colours this term are Kenneth Tewkesbury, goalkeeper, late of Aston Villa, Birmingham and Bradford, I. Harwood, inside left, who has been with the Wolves and Bristol Rovers, J. Bell, the West Ham United forward, and J. Leckie, a goalkeeper from Cardiff City.

We are presenting at each match, to two holders of programmes, a ticket which will enable them to obtain free admission to the Grand Stand at the following match (Cup Ties and Special Matches excepted) that is to be played on this ground.

A board will be taken round the ground during the interval intimating the numbers that have been selected, and holders, who have in their possession programmes bearing these numbers, are requested to make personal application at the office of the Club immediately after the termination of the match, in order to claim these tickets.

As there seems some little amount of controversy regarding the inclusion of the number of Season Ticket Holders in the attendance figures, the Editor wishes to state that the total number of Season Ticket Holders (whether present or otherwise) **IS** included in the League III attendances but **NOT** in the London Combination attendances.

### A SHORT HISTORY of the BIRTH of FOOTBALL

By whom, and when, football, or soccer as we now call it, was first played has never been definitely decided by historians. It is one of the many games that grew out of a ball: a ball that people found enjoyment and pleasure in either kicking or passing from hand to hand. If, however, football historians are unable to inform us definitely of the birth of football, there are records, more or less authentic, which show that the Roman legions used to play a handball game, which might have been football in its primitive form.

Tradition states that football was played at Derby in A.D. 217 for in that year the men of Derby were supposed to have defeated a company of Roman soldiers, driving them out of town, afterwards celebrating the event by a football carnival. This developed into an annual affair, Shrove Tuesday being chosen as the day of festivity. Later on these Shrove Tuesday battles (?) ceased to be soccer carnivals, eventually becoming faction fights between the dwellers of the parishes of St. Peter's and All Saints, at which the point of contest was the boundaries of the respective parishes. The last Derby game was played in 1846.

A victory over the Danes was celebrated by a game of football, the venue being Chester, and the ball being the head of a defeated foe. In the Hareian collection of manuscripts it is recorded that: "Time out of mind it hath been the custom for the shoemakers yearly on Shrove Tuesday to deliver to the drapers, in the presence of the Mayor of Chester, at the Cross of the Rodehee, one ball of leather called a foote-ball of the value of three shillings and fourpence or above, and to play at from thence to the Common Hall of the said City."

In one of the early decades of the fourteenth century Edward II forbade football because of the "evil that might arise through many people bustling together." However, in spite of this prohibitive measure football was still played by the common people, and sides were made up of unlimited numbers of players, whilst there were no restrictions as to tripping, hacking or charging. It was the law in those days that an opponent had to be brought down whether legitimate or otherwise, was never enquired into or remonstrations made thereon. Then, as now, there were individuals who voiced their objections to rough play. One such individual was Sir Thomas Elyot who is reported to have said, the year being 1531, "Footeball is nothing but beastlie furie and extreme violence deserving only to be put in perpetual silence." Another critic was one named Stubbs, an outspoken historian of the Elizabethan period, who in his "Anatomic of Abuses in the Realme of England," published in 1583, said: "As concerning football playing, I proteste unto you that it may rather be called a friendlie kind of fight than a play or recreation, a bloody murdering practice than a fellowly sport or pastime."

Another town to express its disapproval of football was Manchester, for it is recorded in the records of the Court Leet holden in the year 1608 that football be prohibited in the town under a penalty of twelve pence because of "ye glass windows broken yearle and spoyled by a companie of lewd and disorderly persons using that unlawful exercise of playenge with ye footballe in ye streets, breakinge many windows and glasse at their pleasure and other great enormities."

During the time of Cromwell football was severely frowned upon by the Lord Protector and his fellow Puritans, but at

the Restoration, it was again indulged in, being played in all manner of places, including the streets. The game too, at this period was favoured and patronised by King Charles for it is a fact that he witnessed a match between his servants and the retinue of the Duke of Albemarle.

In the year 1793 a match was played at Sheffield which lasted over a period of three days. It commenced between six Sheffield men dressed in red and six Norton men who favoured green, but on the third day hundreds of extras joined in and gradually the match developed into a free fight.

According to Montague Sherman in his "Football History" (Badminton Library), "The game of Football is undoubtedly the oldest of all the English national sports. For at least six centuries the people have loved the rush and struggle of the rude and manly game, and kings with their edicts, devines with their sermons, scholars with their cultured scorn, and wits with their ridicule, have failed to keep the people away from the pastime they enjoyed."

And as we trace the game of football throughout the ages we see the marvellous and extraordinary development that has occurred right up to the current period. In the infant years of 1800 football was assuming some sort of recognised form for it was played in schools, whilst clubs were formed in certain towns and cities, matches being played twice or thrice a week. It is a matter of curiosity however, that many of these matches took place in the early summer, chiefly it is safe to presume because the light allowed the game to be played when the business houses and the factories were closed. Football actually became a recognised winter sport in the early forties and progressed

rapidly ending in the formation of the Football Association, which organisation gradually has placed the game on the sound footing that we know it today.




