



THIS afternoon we entertain old rivals in Bristol City, and accordingly give them a cordial welcome to Hatopolis.

The City have made a disappointing start this term, their opening nine games of the season having brought them only five points. The trouble has been the failure of the forwards—that weakness of last season—poor finishing again reasserting itself. When in the opening game of the season at Bristol the City beat Queens Park Rangers by the odd goal in five, after being behind at the interval, followers of the Bristol Club naturally expected to see better results than last season. So far this has not come about, but for the failures one cannot blame their defence.

The City's Directors, Manager, Players and Supporters were certainly entitled to a good grouse against the powers that be, over the arranging of the fixtures. After their opening game, to which reference has already been made, the Club had to play four successive League games on the grounds of their opponents—surely a hardship for any club. While they were doing this the Rovers of Bristol were playing four successive home League games! Such a state of affairs might surely be remedied for future seasons.

The City lost all their four away League games but the effect of continually playing on their opponents grounds had also an effect on the Bristol Club's players.

There are no newcomers in the City defence now that that department is at full strength. Brinton the Bristol captain has also had a slight loss of form but makes a welcome re-appearance today, taking the place of Hicks, a utility player who can fit in practically anywhere in the team. Now fully recovered from his injury, Pearce, a product of Army football, has given brilliant displays at centre half. He is a great defensive player but not strong in his constructive play. On his right, Morgan, a local—and a close friend of Jack Hodge, they spent their holidays together "down Devon way"—has recently been watched by more than one club. Roberts is still playing his dashing game at back, being brimful of enthusiasm from start to finish. Bristol "fans" want to see him as leader of the attack, and he might be given his chance shortly, perhaps next week. Bridge the partner of Roberts,

is doing better than ever, and by the way Mr. Clem Stephenson, the Huddersfield Town Manager, was once keen on Bridge.

Coming to the forwards, Bristol's most outstanding attacker has without a doubt been Dryden, their new outside left, who was with Sheffield United last season, when he made 19 appearances in Second Division games for the F.A. Cup Finalists, scoring four goals. He is an exceptionally clever winger who possesses a fine turn of speed. He was transferred by Exeter City to Sheffield United. The City's other winger, Frank Peters, is also a newcomer, but Luton supporters will remember him in the colours of Swindon Town, for whom last season he scored 19 goals. Peters has proved an able deputy to Jack Hodge, but like Dryden he has not been given much real support. This has been the big failure in Bristol's attack. Billy Lane has been a disappointing leader, whilst Heal (Liverpool) and Caldwell (Doncaster Rovers) the new inside forwards have not yet come up to expectations. White who was kept out of harness last Saturday owing to injury has been the most effective inside forward. With a view to improving their attack Peters was tried at inside right in which position he was quite at home. A trial was given to an amateur, Stanley Guy, at outside right. This youth who comes from Bootle and who was discovered by "Waddy" Wadsworth, the former Bristol City captain, showed promise.

Haycox who has been given a couple of trials at centre forward was with Newport County last season, when between February and the end of the season, he netted 22 goals for Newport's second string. When with All Saints Old Boys, a Cheltenham Club, Haycox scored 129 goals in two seasons, 70 and 59.

CLUB NOTES by "Hatter"

Many thousands of supporters made the journey to Ellerslie Road last Saturday and consequently the attendance at the Reserve match here was below the average. Nevertheless those who made the trek to London were repaid by witnessing a thrilling game in which the Rangers were ultimate winners by the odd goal in three. Taking the game all through, the homesters just about deserved their victory, even after making due allowance for the splendid fight our boys put up during the second half when facing a two goal deficit. Before the interval the Rangers played sparkling football, accurate first time passes finding their true destination, with the result our defence had their hands full. In spite of this however, the Rangers two goals were a trifle on the fortunate side, the first a penalty given for hands against Nelson was a doubtful decision, not in the actual handling, for all would agree that the ball struck his hand, but in the construing of the rule as to whether the ball rather played the man. In any case it was a slice of fortune for the Rangers, for there appeared no danger from the play leading up to this incident. The second point was hard luck on Tom Mackey. A high ball came over which he lost in the glare of the sun, and Bott with good opportunism took advantage of this and slammed the ball past Dolman. On the resumption our lads played much more openly with the result that after ten minutes play, during a scrimmage in the goal mouth, Joe Payne placed the ball goalwards where Vincent, the Rangers pivot, could only aid it to its destination. It was unfortunate for us that Joe was very seriously injured in obtaining this point or otherwise there might have been a different result. However our boys played up pluckily and with a little more punch an equaliser might have been obtained. It was indeed a thrilling struggle and we must content ourselves by endeavouring to turn the tables on our opponents when they visit us later in the season. A record crowd of 22,000 witnessed the match, the gates having to be closed—it thus goes to show what a tremendous "draw" Luton is becoming in Third Division circles. An interested spectator at the match was Mr. F. Rous, the Secretary of the Football Association. Was he running the rule over Joe for international honours? One never knows, for if Joe can keep up his goal scoring he will have to be seriously considered.

The "Stiffs" entertained the Rangers Reserves and eventually ran out winners by four clear goals. It was not a very thrilling match, mistakes on both sides being far too frequent. Doubtless the injury of Harry Gooney, who badly strained his back in the first ten minutes and did not resume at all after the interval, threw the team out of gear, but in spite of this the combination of the team should have been much better. Our opening goal was a very fortunate affair, Ashman in endeavouring to pass back to his goalkeeper, had the mortification of seeing the ball go into the net, Mason having advanced from his post. After the interval, with the Rangers halves and forwards endeavouring to neutralise the score, first Mills and then Rich twice added to the lead.

Congratulations to Joe Patrick in scoring on his first appearance for his new club the only goal recorded by Southport. Joe had a rush to play in this match for he did not leave Luton until Saturday

morning and had to get to Southport before 3 p.m. Congratulations also to Hugh Boyd on his assistance to the Orient Reserve side. Previous to Saturdays game the "O's" had lost all their nine matches, but the tenth resulted in a victory.


