some subscribers to journalism who should be sitting in sackcloth and ashes, in fearful contemplation of what the future may hold for them! How anyone with two eyes and a modicum of understanding, flavoured with the merest splash of a desire to tell the truth, could cold-bloodedly state that during the whole ninety minutes of last Saturday's game Aldershot never had a look in, is beyond my comprehension!

players, was scored while two of our players—rightly or wrongly—were in attendance on the seriously injured Summerbee. Another was scored from a penalty, the justification for which there are two opinions.

I am not grumbling at our being knocked out. It would be childish to suggest that the better team lost. To assert that the only things worthy of mention were done by the winners is equally childish!

Still dealing with our retirement from the Cup business I foster yet another thought. Out of evil there often cometh good! To the keen follower of Aldershot's fortunes—or misfortunes—as you will, it may appear difficult to associate the evil that befell us last Saturday with good, even remotely. But the good was there, just the same.

On the 12th inst., the day of Cup Round No. 2, we are booked to play Cardiff City at Ninian Park, and had

we still been in the Competition and unable to keep our League appointment, the compensation due from us to Cardiff would have been very considerably more than we could afford to pay. The fact of their being unable to receive us because of their continuance in the tourney—although reducing our liability—would not have entirely disposed of it.

The amount we were compelled to pay to Cardiff in 1934 was quite sufficient to rob the Cup of much of the sweetness we had found in it. To have had to compensate them again this season, when they are drawing Saturday "gates" almost treble the value of those in 1933-34, would have rendered the Cup, to us, almost one of bitterness! With the entire camp practically destitute of troops and our home gates suffering in consequence, the Club could not face heavy "compensations" unperturbed—believe me.

labours last week-end and should be in particularly good fettle as a result. Their away record this season shows wins against Walsall, Exeter and Millwall; a draw at Torquay, and losses of both points to Cardiff, Queen's Park Rangers, Brighton and Northampton.

Luton are represented by the side that defeated Millwall at New Cross a fortnight ago.

DOLMAN, W. (*Goal*).—Was secured from Bristol City last February, and went into the first eleven straightway owing to Coen being indisposed. Did so well that he could not be displaced until last month, when he missed a couple of games through illness. Was first with Blakenhall, then with Willenhall as a youngster, and then went to Chesterfield, where he remained several seasons and was a member of the promotion side. Was then transferred to Bristol City, where he had a couple of seasons. Was a furnaceman before being a professional; is a very clever table tennis player. Height, 5 ft. 11½ ins. Weight, 13 st. 10 lb.

MACKEY, S. (*Right back*).—Originally a centre-half for Hartlepool United, and later with Sheffield Wednesday three seasons. Now in fifth season at Luton, where within a month of arrival he became a full-back. Until last season occupied the left berth, but is a two-footed player, and took over the right position when Smith became his partner. Strong enough to hold his own with any player, but is sportingly averse to using his weight against little men. Height, 5 ft. 10½ ins. Weight, 12 st. 10 lb.

SMITH, S. (*Left back*).—Third season at Luton, where he follows his profession as a school teacher. Played for Higham, and then for Nelson, before going to Leeds Training College, and while at college played for Rochdale as a centre-half. Tried at Luton—was good at half, but better at full-back, and has never lost his place except, occasionally, through scholastic duties. Is of the Corinthian type; plenty of dash, strong with either foot, and enjoys a good charge. Height, 5 ft. 10 in. Weight, 12 st. 4 lb.

FINLAYSON, J. (*Right half*).—Played as a forward for Motherwell and Cowdenbeath before coming south to Clapton Orient four years ago as a half-back. Later he became a full-back, and was signed as such by Luton last season. Was quickly restored to the half-back position. Is an attacking half, and has a powerful shot. Height, 5 ft. 11 ins. Weight, 12 st.

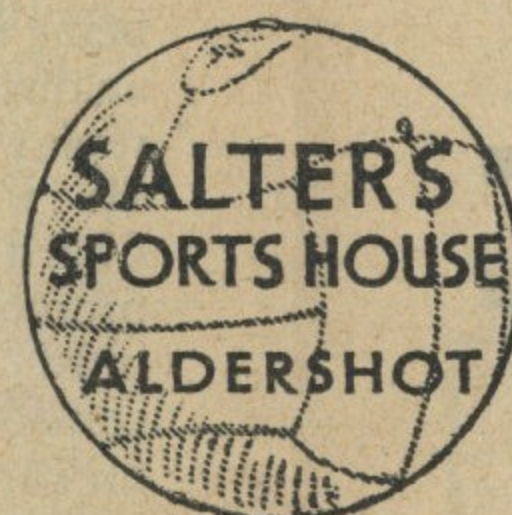

NELSON, J. (*Centre-half*).—From his local Club at Chorley went to Preston North End and rendered such service that he was coveted by Wolverhampton Wanderers, with whom he stayed nearly four seasons. Was secured by Luton at the beginning of last season, and after a moderate start settled down and is, undoubtedly, unsurpassed by any pivot in the Third Division. Captains the Hatters now, and it is worthy of note that Bert Lutterloch, our old player, has become an understudy to the tall Nelson. Remains cool in the hottest of games, and is an inspiration to the side. Ht., 6ft. 1½ in. Weight, 12½ st.

FELLOWES, W. J. (*Left half*).—Last but not least important of the three half-backs who played among them over 100 League games for Luton last season. Was born at Bradford, but in early years moved to Tavistock, where he now is in business as a sports outfitter. From Tavistock Town went to Plymouth Argyle for three seasons, and then to Clapton Orient for a couple of seasons before joining Luton last term. Originally a centre-half, has been just as successful as a flank half, and, like Finlayson, is a strong attacker. Height, 5 ft. 9½ ins. Weight, 12 st.

RICH, T. (*Outside right*).—One of the six players now at Luton who have worn the green shirt of Plymouth Argyle. Rich went to the Argyle from Torpoint as a centre-forward, but became a winger, and was playing on the extreme left when Luton fancied and paid for him last February. Played on either extreme, according to the requirements of the Club, and has just won his place in the first eleven again this season. Speedy and a good shot. Ht., 5ft. 9½ ins. Wt., 11st. 4lb.

PAYNE, J. (*Inside right*).—Secured by Luton as a centre-forward three seasons back, and placed in a nursery side. Returned to Luton as a half-back, and showed his versatility by playing any position at half, also at back, and sometimes forward. Tried again at centre-forward last Easter Monday, and created League goal-scoring record for an individual player by getting ten of the dozen registered against Bristol Rovers. This season has played inside right, and scored in every game but one in which he has played; scored in that also, but goal disallowed because of a colleague's infringement. Grand shot, and strong driving force in the attack. Is also a fine all-round cricketer. Ht., 5 ft. 10½ ins. Weight, 12 st.

BALL, J. T. (*Centre-forward*).—Played in Southport's League side when he was sixteen years old, after having performed scoring feats for Banks. From Southport

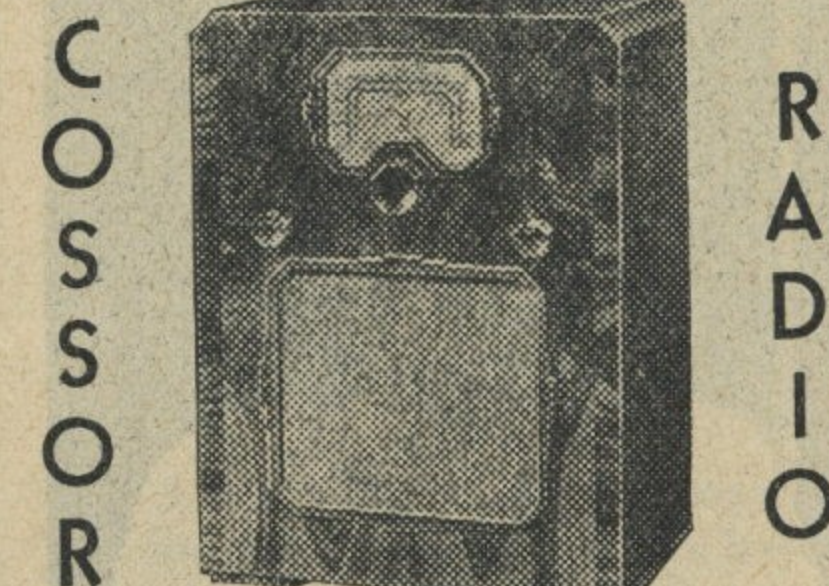

ROBERTS, F. (*Inside left*).—Joined Luton from Birmingham about the same time as Ball arrived. Had previously served with Birmingham's League side, who had secured him from Piggott's, a Birmingham Works Club. Strong and energetic player, going all out for the full ninety minutes. Chiefly a grafter for others, but has such a powerful shot that it is remarkable he has not a big tally of goals. Scored for the first time this season when at Millwall a fortnight ago. Height, 5 ft. 8 ins. Weight, 11 st. 10 lb.

STEPHENSON, G. (*Outside left*).—First came into prominence with Durham City seven years ago when quite a lad. Aston Villa secured his transfer and he remained at Villa Park three seasons before joining Luton for season 1934-35. Not always consistent, but a brilliant player when in the mood, and capable of winning games "off his own bat." Very strong and speedy. Height, 5ft. 9ins. Weight, 12 st.

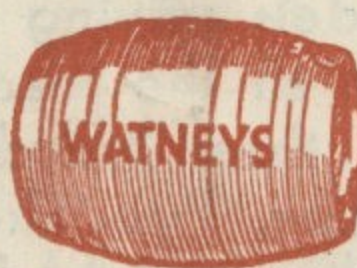
