

FROM THE BOARD ROOM.

Burnley's visit to Coventry cast rather a damper on our hopes and ambitions, but it must be conceded that our visitors showed themselves to be a very sound combination, and played some first class football. Our own display, however, was far below what we expected, and experience tells us that our boys are capable of something much better than they showed us in this match. Our defence and half-back line are not included in this criticism, for there was little fault to find with their display.

Our indifferent display against Burnley, however, and the loss of a home point, was quite compensated for by the valuable point won at Sheffield against the United, and although we failed to score, our re-organised forward line gave a much better account of itself than was the case in the first home game. Many who witnessed the game are still convinced that the goal scored by MacDonald should have been

allowed, but be that as it may, the work that led up to the final shot was football at its best. The movement was started by our centre-half, and the ball was passed and re-passed by at least four other players before our inside left put it into the net, without a Sheffield player touching the ball. It was sheer bad luck that our players did not reap the benefit of their splendid efforts.

The season is still too young for the results so far registered to cause anxiety or optimism by respective clubs, but a good start is always a big asset, for lapses later in the season prove less disastrous. A glance at last season's second division league chart will show that apart from the promotion winners, the top four teams were Sheffield United, Coventry City, Tottenham Hotspur and Burnley, and it is singular that we should be opposed to these three teams in our first three games. Early results may therefore not be a good guide.



TO-DAY'S VISITORS.

Our friends from Luton opened their season with what was generally regarded as a very tough match, and on their journey to test the strength of West Brom, on return to the Second Division, they were beaten 3-0.

This evening we find changes in the Luton team compared with the day last February when they gave us such a shock at home, and changes also compared with that which did duty against West Brom.

Humphrey Dolman contests with Joe Coen for the position in goal, and the former has been in first class football since February, 1929, with Chesterfield, Bristol City and Luton, and claims Bloxwich as his birthplace.

At the time these notes were

written it was not certain whether Tom Smith and Jack Finlayson would again be associated at full back or whether Bob Carte, a strongly built Yorkshireman would be on the right. Smith plays on either flank, and has also had a run as centre forward; and Finlayson is better known as a right half.

Jack Nelson, of long service with Preston and Wolverhampton, plays in any of the half back positions as wanted; and Jow Loughran, who was with Birmingham for a time, is also two footed in his half back duties.

Charlie Ferguson came quickly to the front as a scoring outside right on joining up from Notts County last year after gaining First Division imprint with Middlesbro'

One of the sensations of the close season was the amount Tottenham Hotspur paid to get Bert Sproston, from Leeds United. Huddersfield Town will think long and deeply about that. They had him on trial as a youth, and could have had him without any transfer fee, that is a few years ago, of course.

ITEMS OF INTEREST.

With three players christened Joseph, two Davids, two Samuels, and Reuben and an Adam, Southport certainly mean to take the struggle for promotion religiously.

Another indication which may or may not be worth something—Wolves started off last season by winning two games, this time it has been two draws. Last Good Friday they beat Leicester City 10-1, last Monday the meeting resulted in a goalless draw.

For seven years Hugh Foulkes spent his time with Birmingham, and though he gained Welsh International honours he was in the first team on only 15 occasions. That led him to seek a fresh berth, and he decided on Guildford, but the call of the League was still with him, and he has popped up again as full back with Darlington

In the very near future Foulke will probably find himself opposing an old colleague as Stanley Wood is in the ranks of Halifax after 255 games and 58 goals in the West Bromwich forward line.

Hull City are well pleased with the form of their new full back, Jack Dowen. Born near Coventry he spent over three years with the Wolves, was transferred to West Ham, went back to Wolves for 18 months, and in June this year was transferred to Hull. In the three Divisions of the Football League his appearances amount to but 14.

Surprising how six new men have put life into Bradford City. Almost straight away a bag of six goals was collected, or more than in any game during the whole of last season.

Remember Joe McGough who used to appear against Coventry in the ranks of Reading? He has found further congenial company at Chester, and is on the last lap towards his 150th League game.

Early season form is supposed to be misleading. Manchester City care nothing for supposition. They look at the concrete fact that within three days of opening out as a relegated side they had scored five goals against Swansea Town, three against Chesterfield, collected four points, and given away nothing at all.

Don't tell Harry Topping that it is difficult for a footballer to get a club. This full back, while playing for Horwich R.M.I., had trials with Reading and Charlton. Then in turn he served Swindon Town, Hull City, Crystal Palace, Bath City, Manchester City, Exeter City, and now New Brighton. You say you have never heard of him. Little wonder. Up to this month his total appearances in first class football had been—just one.

During the whole of the last campaign Blackburn Rovers won only one away game. On their first journey this season they claimed both points at the expense of West Ham.

Tom Waring scored his first goals for Tranmere Rovers from centre forward just on eleven years ago. Subsequently he had nine seasons with Aston Villa, passed on to Barnsley and Wolverhampton, returned to Tranmere to help them up into the Second Division, and there he continues his paying ways. He was on the mark against Millwall on Monday.

To some people relegation to the Second Division is a tragedy. To West Bromwich it is but the repetition of an experience which has come their way on three previous occasions. They should, therefore, know all there is to know about climbing again but the present struggle looks like being one of the toughest in history from the point of view of a number of clubs with big resources



FOOTBALL JOTTINGS.

Worthy of notice is the point that Bill Brown, a Brentford half back for 18 months, scored his first goal for his club against the club from which he had been obtained, Huddersfield Town.

Quite early on Manchester United appear to have come to the opinion that they have a defence good enough for the First Division, but that the forward line as a whole is either not settled down to its task or will need important changes to be made.

Bradford's only newcomer has been Hugh Paton, a dapper Scot recruited from Shettleston early in the close season, and his job is to settle the outside right problem which has disturbed Bradford for a year or two.

In mid-March Fulham created some controversy among their supporters by trying Ernest Hiles at centre half in place of Syd Gibbons. At the time he was obtained from Allansmore Ernest was a centre forward, but the conversion proved an immediate success, and now the son of Hertfordshire is firmly established as a fit and proper person in his position.

After Dick Rhodes lost his form Sheffield Wednesday last season tried five other players in the position without reaching finality. During the summer they have recruited a strongly built Scot for the same berth in Dave Russell from the team which created a Cup sensation, East Fife.

Indications are that Newcastle will have their expectations realised by the right wing composed of the former Arsenal players, Ralph Birkett and Ray Bowden. Strange, though, that in three games in which he has played against Plymouth Argyle, Bowden has not managed to score, and he would like to do so against the Argyle more than anybody, for that was the club with which he first started big football.

Little did Arthur Davies imagine he would so soon be back in Second Division football when he consented to rejoin Plymouth Argyle in July. No fewer than 14 years have elapsed since, as an overgrown youth he tried his prentice hand at goalkeeping with New Brighton, and 11 since he was with Everton in their championship year, and eight since he went into the Southern Third as a member of Exeter City. Since last he was with Plymouth he has had seven games in the Northern Section with Southport.


Tranmere Rovers surely had a novel experience for a club coming out in a new sphere. They missed a penalty and converted one, and lost by a goal after being at one time three goals down. It was Billy Eden, entering on his tenth season of League football who failed from the penalty spot.






