

BRADFORD v. LUTON TOWN Sat., Sept. 4th, 1948

OUR VISITORS

The Luton Town Club was formed in 1885 by the fusion of Luton Wanderers and Luton Excelsior.

Luton are the oldest professional Club in the South of England. In 1890 they paid three players 5/- per match, but at the end of the season it was decided to pay all the players in the first team, and the amount agreed upon was 2/6 per week with 6d. extra for away games, and time lost at work before 12 noon on Saturday to be made up by the Club. The following season the wages were doubled.

On the formation of the Club the colours adopted were navy blue and pink halves for shirts and caps. It was recorded on the minutes that "both shirt and cap be worn by each player on the field." Later, for one season the colours were "cochineal," whatever that might be, to be followed with sky blue shirts and white knickers. Then, in 1920, they adopted the present colours of white shirts and black knickers.

Luton played in the Southern League until the fusion with the Football League, when they became members of the Third Division (South).

They just missed promotion in 1935-6 when they were runners-up, a point behind Coventry City. The following season they made certain of promotion by heading the table, two points in front of Notts County.

Luton have finished above Park Avenue in each of the post-war seasons, but last season it was only a superior goal average that put them in front.

Famous players who have assisted the Club at various times include John McCartney (afterwards famous as a manager), James McEwen, F. W. Kean, Louis Bookman (the old Bradford City and Irish left-winger), R. Donaldson, Frank Soo and H. J. R. Billington.

The Luton manager is Dally Duncan, the Scottish international, who was a member of Derby County's cup winning side in 1946.

After to-day's game the first team will have two away games, Plymouth and Coventry, before we see them again at Park Avenue in the return game v. Plymouth Argyle, on Wednesday, September 15th.

LUTON TOWN

BERNARD STRETON (goalkeeper).—Was described as England's best amateur goalkeeper for 20 years, when he became an amateur goalkeeper international two seasons ago. Developed in Norfolk schoolboy play, was a war-time "guest" with Walsall, Crewe Alexandra, Norwich City and Notts County, and went to Luton from Shrewsbury Town in January, 1947. Now a professional.

H. W. COOKE (right-back).—A strong and stalwart two-footed defender of much versatility who can be utilised in a variety of positions with equal effect. One of the team's younger and most promising players, and had had experience with Bournemouth when Luton recruited him as a left-back late in December, 1945.

HUGH LINDSAY (left-back).—One of Luton's close season recruits from over the Border, where he had reached senior rank with St. Mirren, following outstanding work in junior circles. Polished and resourceful, and promises, with further English experience, to become an able successor to William Hughes, the Welsh international, who went to Chelsea.

DAVID GARDINER (right half-back).—Just as efficient on the right as the left flank, where he formerly operated before he crossed over to take the place of Frank Soo when that celebrity moved to Chelmsford. Clever and industrious, and regarded as one of the most serviceable of the club's local finds in recent years.

LESLIE HALL (centre half-back).—Formerly an amateur with St. Albans' City in the Isthmian League before Luton made him a professional in September, 1943, since when he has progressed well. Made big strides last season, when he displaced Gager (now of Nottingham Forest), and is a photographer by trade.

WILLIAM GRIPTON (left half-back).—Another of the summer's newcomers, after having spent all his previous career in his native Black Country, where he originally played with Dartmouth Victoria. Left Bush Rangers (Handsworth League) to become a West Bromwich Albion professional in November, 1937, at the age of 17.

SAMUEL NELSON (outside-right).—Little more than at the outset of his career, and is a fast and sprightly player who finishes well. One of seven Irish forwards now playing in the Football League who all used to be with Belfast Linfield, and had had a spell with Blackpool as Stanley Matthews' understudy before Luton recruited him last season.

ROBERT BRENNAN (inside-right).—Another Irishman who is just as able in either extreme wing position. Won Irish League representative honours against the Scottish League before Luton paid about £3,000 for him in recruiting him in October, 1947, from Belfast Distillery, of which club Alf Peachey, ex-Bradford City centre-half, is secretary.

WILLIAM ARNISON (centre-forward).—Costliest member of the side, Luton being said to have paid Glasgow Rangers £7,500 for him on August 16th. Big and strong South African who left his native land for Scotland in 1946 after he had won a big scoring reputation at home, and is studying to be a masseur. A dangerous opportunist.

EDWARD DUGGAN (inside-left).—A Londoner from Plaistow, and was taken to Luton from East End junior company. Had had two years on the ground staff before he was made a professional in August, 1939, a month before war began. Brother-in-law of "Ten-goal" Joe Payne, who also began his meteoric career at Luton.

WILLIAM WAUGH (outside-left).—Clever and purposeful Scot who ran his trials with varied minor clubs before he left Bathgate Thistle to become a Luton professional in September, 1944. Was then an outside-left of 22, but later made a successful switch to the right flank before returning to his original berth.
