## NOTES FROM THE HIVE

News not so good this time—one point from last two games! Furthermore the Bees have at last been beaten away from home but there is no need to panic.

For a London "Derby" our game with West Ham United, at Griffin Park, a fortnight ago was a grand spectacle; in fact almost a classic. The Bees might well have clinched the show with a win for undoubtedly our boys had more real scoring chances than fell to the Hammers but the game was so full of incident, played at such a fast pace and more important still in such a magnificent sporting spirit that even the most rabid Brentford supporter must have felt satisfied with the result. The critics, too, wrote up the match in glowing terms one going so far as to say that "the Bees were the most improved team of the day."

Certainly our boys put up an excellent show and gave hopes of better things to come, and with Peter McKennan and Jackie Gibbons included in our side it was fully contemplated that our "goals for" would improve and it was little short of surprising that we drew a blank in the matter of goal-scoring. Still, that's how it goes sometimes and don't forget that some "sitters" were missed. Both teams were certainly amiss in the art of goal-getting which was the only blot on an otherwise great show. Even so, it was certainly the most entertaining game seen at Griffin Park for a long time.

The vagaries of the game are always with us and just when the Bees seemed to have run bang into form we sustained our first away defeat of the season. That happened in another London "Derby" game, against Queen's Park Rangers, at Shepherd's Bush, on Saturday last. The small Loftus Road playing pitch is always something of a handicap to visiting clubs although we are not offering that as an excuse for our 2—0 defeat, but as a spectacle it bore no comparison to the show of the previous week. True, the Bees did not play anything like so well although putting up a fairly good show in the first half. The big turning point came when the Rangers got a quick goal in the second half to take the lead and after that the Rangers proved the better side to eventually finish deserved winners by virtue of



their superiority during the homeward journey. For some unknown reason the Bees seemed to lack fire after the Rangers had got in front which was rather surprising in view of the magnificent fighting spirit which our boys have generally shown this season. Perhaps it is best to treat this game as a closed book and forget all about it.

To-day we have the pleasure of a visit from old friends in Luton Town who beat us twice last season by the decisive margin of three clear goals—the first games between the two clubs for many years.

So far this season Luton has only collected three points from six away games but curiously enough they were two splendid performances which gave it those precious points—a 2—1 win at Barnsley—the only team to win on the Yorkshire club's ground this season—and a 3—3 draw at Cardiff, being the first club to take a point from Ninian Park until the 'Spurs won there last week-end.

The Bees will undoubtedly have to recover their best form to finish ahead of Luton to-day and we all hope the game will be as thrilling as the last home match—or is that expecting too much?

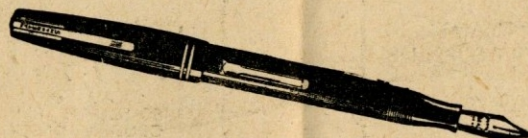
