

# Between Ourselves



FOUNDED 1885

A few words regarding the new seats in the centre of the West Stand will, I hope, remove any feeling of complaint. To start with, we realise that additional gangways are required to ensure easy access to those seats, but obviously this cannot be dealt with until the end of the present Season as the seats have all been taken up, so that we are unable to do anything about it until the opportunity arises for their re-numbering. Then there are a number of seats in front of which the leg room is restricted. This again is due to the temporary nature of the seating and will be dealt with as soon as possible. On the whole the provision of seats seems to be greatly appreciated by our supporters, and after this explanation of the immediate difficulties I feel sure that those concerned will be patient and overlook any temporary inconvenience.

To-morrow night is Footballers' night at the Guildhall Rendezvous, and any of you who can come along will be assured of a hearty welcome and a grand evening's entertainment. The whole of the proceeds will be handed over to the Rendezvous to help along a really fine movement, and we hope to see a packed house.

Luton Town were formed in the same year (1885) as ourselves, but it is interesting to record that they are the oldest professional football club in the South of England. In 1890 an offer of five shillings per week was made to each of three local players, Frank and Harry Whitby and Read. At the end of that Season it was decided to pay the whole of the First Team—the agreed amount being two shillings and sixpence per week, with an extra sixpence for away matches

and payment for working time lost before twelve noon on Saturdays. The following Season, the 'wages' of

the local players were doubled and Julian, a half-back, was secured from Woolwich Arsenal and became captain. He, of course, received a higher wage. Another interesting item in Luton Town history is that in 1893 Alderman Harry Arnold became associated with the Club, eventually holding the Chairmanship for nearly forty years.

So far this Season, Luton have managed to pick up 27 points from 26 matches and have scored 33 goals for compared with 34 goals scored against them. This shows that they are certainly opponents which cannot possibly be held lightly. They will certainly be given a hearty welcome to the Dell and will just as certainly give us a good hard game.

We had an interesting match at Plymouth last Saturday, and our new men to the First Team gave a good account of themselves. Unfortunately, Ramsey was injured in this match and will not be able to turn out to-day, but I am pleased to say his injury is responding nicely to treatment and he is well on the way to recovery. It seems ironical, but a 'friendly' match always seems to be costly in the way of injuries.

Our old friend and former player Fred Titmuss turned up to greet us, and sends a cheery greeting to all his old friends in Southampton.

Incidentally, I received a letter from an old Supporter the other day and learned with surprise that 'Joe' Blake—one of the greatest outside-left players we ever had on our books is still in the land of the living. He sent a cheery message to his old friends in Southampton and asked us to send him a photograph of the cheery striped team to cheer him on his way. This will certainly be done.
