FOOTBALL LEAGUE—DIVISION II.

Luton Town, who visit us this afternoon, are always assured of a real Welsh welcome for our association goes back many years and the older generation of City followers will recall the struggles between the clubs as far back as the old Southern League days before World War I and after up to 1920. In those days the Bedfordshire club's supporters used to invade Cardiff wearing the team's colours on their strawplaiter boaters—the emblem of Luton's then main industry.

A Luton ground record crowd of 27,319 saw them run Tottenham Hotspur to a goal each draw last Saturday when George Stobart, secured from Newcastle United three weeks ago, who has taken over the leadership of the forwards, opened his goal scoring account for his new club. Big Jock Arnison, who registered 17 goals last season at centre forward, is now playing at inside left. B. Streten, the former amateur international goalkeeper, since joining the professional ranks has established himself as one of the best keepers in League football.

Last season's corresponding game resulted in a draw of three goals each.

All too frequently players stood about waiting for the ball to come to them instead of going to meet it. They did not work as a team and although we had the major part of the play during the first half we turned round two goals down.

Indecision and lack of thrust at inside forward cost us several goals. It must be said, however, that Ronnie Stiffall in the centre worked like a trojan and really deserved a goal.

Poor covering by our defence led to the two Coventry goals taken well by Jamieson and Murphy.

A general tightening up in all departments is necessary and we must produce at all times that will to win spirit as shown in the last five minutes after Doug. Blair's goal.

The Combination team had a grand game against Arsenal and were unlucky to lose by one goal to nil.

The improved form of the Welsh League side continued with a good 4-2 victory at Aberaman. Elvet Evans (2), Gordon Pembrey and Viv Howell scored our goals.

On Wednesday at Ninian Park they beat a strong Merthyr Tydfil Welsh League team by the only goal of the match scored when George Thomas, from a well placed centre by Bob Lamie, headed in.



SNAPSHOTS FROM SOCCERDOM.

Charlton Athletic are the youngest of London's eleven League clubs, but they are building up an astonishing record in the production of managers. All these present pilots were together as Charlton players in season 1936-37; George Stephenson (Huddersfield), Syd Cann (Southampton), Bob Wright (Bristol City), Don Welsh (Brighton), and Alec Stock (Orient). Bill Dodgin (Fulham manager), Albert Lindon (Merthyr manager), George Robinson (Charlton assistant-manager), and Norman Smith (Chelsea trainer) are other ex-Athletic players.

Many of the bright stars of the day in League life were the despised and discarded of other clubs in the past. Take Gateshead leader Eddie Passmore, first in the Football League to hit two "hat-tricks" this season and chief scorer in the whole country. Portsmouth first recruited him from Horden Colliery in June, 1939, but later let him go. Swansea Town signed him after the war, but they, too, gave him a "free." Both regret it now.

Not since Sheffield Wednesday first entered the senior grade way back in 1892-93 have Yorkshire been without at least one club in the first Division in any season. There is little danger of that 57-years-spell being smashed if Huddersfield Town and Middlesbrough, the county's two survivors up aloft maintain their present improved form and a bad early season start.

SOCcer QUIZ.

HERE ARE THE ANSWERS.

1. Yes, a fee of £200 has to be paid to the Football League by each such club.

2. The Luton Town team in season 1947-48 included Douglas (Dally) Duncan (player-manager), and Frank Soo (player-coach), yet the side was captained by Horace Gager, its centre half back.

3. The Football League receives one per cent. of the net gate and stand receipts of all First and Second Division matches, one and a half per cent. of those at Southern Section games, and two per cent. of those in the Northern Section.

4. 42 in the First Division, 77 in the Second, 38 in the Southern Section, and 38 in the Northern.

5. Only seven—R. H. Birkett, C. P. Wilson, and J. W. Sutcliffe (England), H. W. Renny-Tailyour (Scotland), R. D. Garrons-Williams (Wales), and the brothers Kevin and Michael O'Flanagan (Ireland).

6. Out-of-pocket expenses may not exceed £1 per day for each player. Players must not be allowed to make a profit over and above ordinary match bonus of £2 for a win and £1 for a draw.

WHO WOULD BE A LINESMAN?

HERE is one follower of the bouncing ball who cannot possibly do right, and who never by any chance receives praise. This is the man on the line. His position compares very unfavourably with that of the referee. For he has no power to enforce his decisions. And he is nearer the spectators. Should a loud-voiced crowd show over-much resentment against a referee's rulings, that individual—provided he be endowed with sufficient nerve—can soon put a stop to the display of animosity by stopping the game until things cool down somewhat. The linesman can stop nothing.

The roar of the crowd generally comes to the referee well away in the centre of the field as a dull murmur. The ejaculations of only a few exasperated spectators never reach him at all.

But they reach the linesman all right.

As he follows the run of the ball along his line he runs a continuous gauntlet of criticism. Should he award a doubtful throw-in to the visiting team a few thousand spectators implore him to "Get one of their jerseys on!"

He is besieged with inquiries as to whose side he is on, and his power of vision is the subject of pitying comments. He is told to "Get a pair of Bevan's specs., old man," etc.

He is snubbed by the players and very often ignored by the referee.

There is, for instance, the case of the tricky outside player who waltzes round and round with the ball until he is hemmed in by colleagues and opponents. There will be three of each team kicking at the ball at the same time. Suddenly the ball emerges from the confused ruck of feet and rolls out of play.

The linesman has no more idea as to who played the ball last than the man in the moon. Neither has anyone else. The players themselves don't know. But, of course, each team claims the throw-in. Well, it is the linesman's duty to decide.

To show his firmness and impartiality he gives a throw-in to the visiting team. An explosive yell arises from the spectators in the immediate vicinity and the poor linesman has to go through oftentimes much abuse.

In addition to giving out-of-play decisions he is supposed to call the referee's attention to any infringement of the rules which that official has missed seeing. Never a game passes but what the referee fails to see some glaring misdemeanour.

But the spectators never miss it. (If the visiting team is at fault, that is). Some of them may, but a great number are sure to detect it and object in the good old way.

The linesman waves his flag to attract the referee's notice. If the referee awards something to the home team the referee is duly applauded.

But sometimes he disregards the linesman's signal and allows play to proceed. This fact is audibly commented upon by sarcastic spectators and they ask the linesman what he is there for and what good is he?

Again, the outside man is dribbling swiftly along the line. A difference of a few inches and the ball will be out of play. The linesman dashes desperately in the wake of the winger. Suddenly the outside man's headlong career is stopped by the back who takes a flying kick at the ball which strikes the engrossed linesman and bowls him over. Immediately there arises a howl of rapturous delight. For the rest of the game the linesman sees nothing but grinning faces.

Where on earth is the attraction for any man to become a linesman? All honour to those men who take on this essential part in our great game.
