## CLUB MATTERS

The last home match certainly provided a feast of good football, and although we suffered our first home defeat of the season, our friends Notts County were the first to admit that the score flattered them. We certainly put up a good display and did not deserve to be beaten. I feel sure that all who saw the game thoroughly enjoyed it despite the disappointment felt in defeat. Saturday's game at Bury was another disappointment in more ways than one, and the injury to Neil Franklin turned the scale in favour of the home side, the positional changes necessary upsetting the balance of the side which had, up to that point, served up some wonderful football. Neil will probably be out of the team for a week or two.

### Our visitors

A very hearty welcome is extended to our friends Luton Town. I know it is trite to say that much of the appeal of the Football League lays in the unexpectedness of its results, yet the truth of that statement is proved week by week. For instance, at this time last year it looked as though our visitors today would not be with us now; they seemed heading for the Third Division. That is not said slightly, they ended an anxious season in 19th place, only two points better off than Chesterfield, who were relegated. Things just would not go their way. They played attractive football but the other sides got the goals—ourselves included, for we scored seven times against them and won twice. Now here is the point which brings me back to the opening comment.

Luton, with very much the same team, are now third from the top of the Second Division table with 12 points from nine matches

to compare with the tally of Notts County, who are in second place, of 13 points from 10 games. To stress that football is stranger than fiction, Luton possess the distinction of being the only Club who have defeated Sheffield United this season and yet last Saturday Blackburn visited them with the unhappy record of having gained only one point from eight games—and returned to Lancashire with a point, the result of a 1-1 draw.

Luton possess the distinction of finding Amateur goalkeepers of International class. Until a short time ago they had two on their books, Streten (England) and Hughes (Wales) who had played for their countries in both Amateur and Professional International games. Then along came Cardiff City who found themselves short of a goalkeeper and hoped to take Streten back with them to Wales, but instead they returned with Hughes.

Streten is one of the most agile goalkeepers in the country with a style not unlike the Middlesborough player, Ugolini. Our forwards will have to be alert to score against him today. Left back Aherne has been a stalwart of many Irish teams since the War; in the half back line, Owen is one of those grand players every manager wants, happy to stay with the Club, untiring, a 90 minute man and consistently safe. Few players in the League have stayed with their Clubs longer than Owen has with Luton.

There was a time not long ago when nearly every Club in the country wanted to sign Stobbart from Newcastle. Luton were successful and he has played many fine games for them either at centre forward or in one of the inside positions. Since their promotion from the Southern Section in 1936-37 Luton have made many friends in the North. Let us hope that for the rest of the Season they escape the anxieties that beset them throughout the whole of the last League programme.

### **October Programme**

Our Football League programme for next month appears most attractive and we have some stirring struggles in view. On the 6th we visit Southampton, then on Hull Fair Saturday, the 13th, we have a big attraction in our friends Sheffield Wednesday. On the 20th we visit Leeds United and on the 27th entertain Rotherham United who are doing so remarkably well these days.

The Intermediate League side had attractive visitors in Huddersfield Town and drew 1-1 after having had most of the play. Huddersfield had a very strong side on duty.


The Minor League side had a field day, and piled up 12 goals against Cottingham Old Boys without reply. These youngsters are a very strong combination.
