

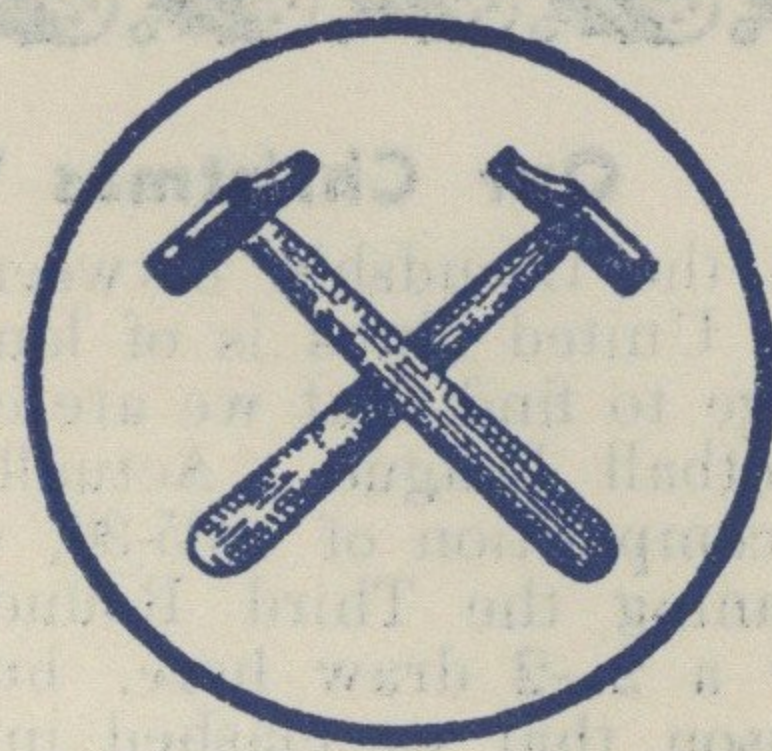

## Our Christmas Visitors

Although the friendship between the Luton Town and West Ham United clubs is of long standing, it is somewhat strange to find that we are comparatively new rivals in the Football League. Actually we had met in the F.A. Cup competition of 1935-36, when the Hatters shook us by winning the Third Round replay by four clear goals after a 2-2 draw here, but it was not until the 1937-38 season that we clashed in Division II.

The Hatters entered the League as founder-members of Division III (South), but their earlier attempts did not meet with a great deal of success, and it was not until the 1935-36 campaign that they came into the League limelight by finishing as runners-up to Coventry City, following this by going one better in 1936-37.

It is, however, rather interesting to look back over the comparatively short spell to March 5th, 1938, and note the teams which appeared in the programme of the Bedfordshire club's first League visit to Upton Park. They were: *West Ham United*: Conway; Bicknell, Walker (C.); Fenton (E.), Walker (R.), Cockcroft; Kirkaldie, Macaulay, Foxall, Goulden, J. Wood. *Luton Town*: Coen; Smith, Lutterloch; Finlayson, Lewis, Loughran; Ferguson, Payne, Vinall, Roberts, Stephenson. The result was a goalless draw—a not uncommon result in our subsequent meetings, as the following table of League results will show (the Hammers' score is given first in each case):

Our Upton Park meetings have brought two successes to each club with three drawn games, and at Kenilworth Road we have two wins to Luton's one and four games tied. It is a most noticeable fact, however, that neither team has ever succeeded in netting more than twice in these encounters.

There was a slight exception to this rule in the Football League South competition which occupied the transitional period between war-time soccer and the resumption of "full combat" in the League, when in 1945-46 we lost here on Christmas Day by the odd goal in seven, but gained ample revenge on the Boxing Day by a 4-1 margin in the return; and the Hatters' 3-1 F.A. Cup win three seasons ago made a break in the usual run in the series of low scoring. But in the main our duels have usually been dour struggles with little to choose between the sides.

However, Christmas has a reputation for football surprises, and we are hoping that today we shall make it a notable one for the Hammers by making the most of our scoring chances. Undoubtedly our visitors will endeavour to do the same, for their position in the table is a good one and reflects well the high standard they have set this season, so we can be fairly certain that this morning's tussle will provide you with plenty to talk about for the rest of the festive period.

## HANDOUTS ON THE HAMMERS : Steve Forde



Steve Forde's birthplace was South Kirkby, near Pontefract, but he has lost most of his native Yorkshire accent through being at Upton Park since 1937.

Although captaining his school team from the right-back position, Steve found mining left little time for football after he had ended his schooldays. However, he later played for Comar Road Old Boys in a junior league, and whilst there was spotted by Sheffield Wednesday.

The Wednesday converted Steve into a centre-half before transferring him to Wolverhampton Wanderers, from whom he went to Rotherham United. At Rotherham his displays as a full-back attracted the Hammers, and he joined us in January, 1937.

After a few games at centre-half in the Reserves, Steve became one of the second-string's regular full-backs, and many will recall his partnership there with Alf Chalkley.

When Steve made his First Team debut in April, 1938 (against the Spurs), he soon showed that he was likely to become a regular in the League side, but the outbreak of war cut down his hopes, and Army service soon claimed him. However, he was able to play for the Hammers in the semi-final of the War-Time Cup at Stamford Bridge in 1940, and helped us to a 4-3 win over Fulham that put us in the Final against Blackburn Rovers at Wembley.

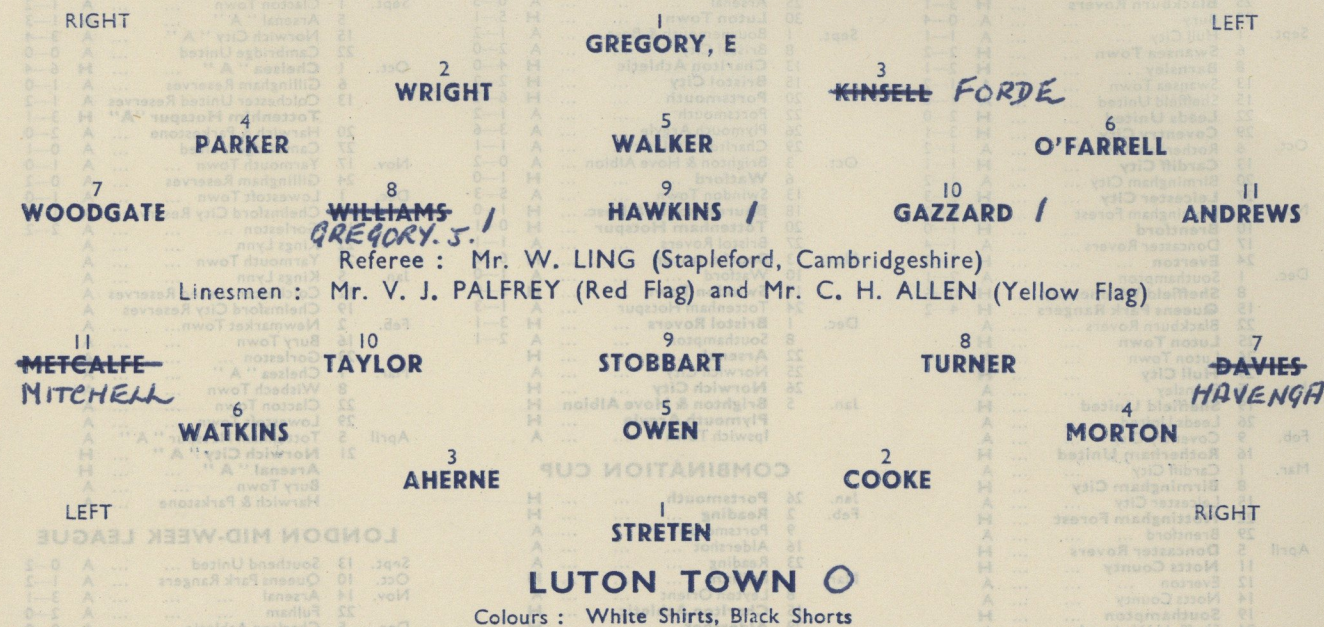
Steve played for several teams during the war, including Sunderland, Hartlepool, United and Swindon Town. Among his soccer feats in the Army was the scoring of eight goals in one game whilst playing for his unit team at centre-forward.

Steve returned to us in 1945 and as a member of our First Team gained an Essex Professional Cup Final medal last season to add to the two Sheffield County Cup runners-up medals he gained whilst in the north.

During the summer Steve's main occupation is cricket. He plays for East Ham Borough Officers, and in his appearances for our own cricket team during the early days of the present soccer season amply demonstrated why he is always selected as an opening bat. He is no mean exponent on the bowling-green, and in keeping with his quiet nature likes nothing better than to sit down with a good book to pass away a few hours.

## A Memory of the 'Eighties

It took one who was associated with the Hammers for a very long while to recall the first visit of Arsenal F.C. to West Ham, for it took place a little over 60 years ago.

At the time the Gunners were known as Woolwich Arsenal F.C. and their opponents were "Old St. Luke's F.C." Old St. Luke's and Castle Swifts F.C. were the forerunners of the Thames Ironworks F.C. which was formed in the early 1890's and later became West Ham United.

The match in question was played on a ground near the present West Ham Stadium, and later became part of Beckton Road Park. In the West Ham goal was Mr. J. W. Y. Carns (grandfather of two of our present Directors), who later became one of the first Directors of the club; whilst a member of the forward-line was Mr. W. F. White, who later became our President and Chairman.

The result and other details of the game are not known, but it is interesting to recall these known facts and to reflect upon the beginnings of two of London's league sides.

## Answers to Soccer Quiz

1. Sheffield F.C. This club was formed in 1855, and the Minute Book for 1857 is still in existence. The Sheffield club had a very good run in last season's Amateur Cup competition, and are exempted till this season's First Round Proper. They beat Ealing by 3-1 in the 1903-4 Final.

2. Notts County F.C. was formed in 1862; Nottingham Forest in 1865; Sheffield Wednesday in 1866. The County were one of the original twelve that formed the League in 1888.

## A Referee's Christmas

The Christmas soccer programme usually provides many surprises and strange happenings, and during the final holiday of the year many memories are recalled.

One which had a somewhat humorous twist is a recollection by our Secretary, Mr. Frank Cearns, who was in his younger days a Football League referee.

It was in the early 1920's that we met Bristol City here in a Division II match on Christmas Day. Mr. Cearns, who had no refereeing appointment that day decided to visit the Boleyn Ground to see the match, but upon arriving just before the kick-off found himself literally "grabbed by the scruff of the neck" by one of our officials and asked to act as linesman in the game due to the illness of the appointed referee. Protests that he was in his best attire and therefore not dressed to act as linesman were speedily overcome by the "scrouning" of the necessary equipment, and Mr. Cearns found himself "running the line" with the senior appointed linesman acting as "ref." But the advent of rain during the match naturally damped his ardour to some further extent.

The same officials had also been appointed for the return fixture and the problem thus arose—who would fill the vacancy at Ashton Gate on the Boxing Day (Friday)? After further persuasion by our officials (backed by the City's chairman), Mr. Cearns again agreed to stand in,

and he thus entrained for Bristol with our team the next morning.

Although more suitably attired for the occasion it was no joke to the willing (!) substitute to find that rain was again falling, and with the downpour continuing unabated throughout the match he became thoroughly damp in company with the players and other officials. In fact, they were all so saturated that it was decided to dispense with the interval and change straight over. Then, to further add to the "tale of woe," Jack Tresadern sliced his kick whilst attempting a mighty clearance—and the heavy ball caught Mr. Cearns behind the ear to crown his succession of mishaps!

It is, however, a fine tribute to all those much-maligned "men in the middle" that this did not deter Mr. Cearns from fulfilling his engagement to officiate at a match in Birmingham on the following day (Saturday), and we feel that too often the sacrificing of their holiday periods by the match-officials is one of the things that go unappreciated by the average followers of the game—although, needless to say, the officials who are married doubtlessly find themselves reminded of this from another source!
