We wonder if Cardiff will remember how a Birmingham back once kept out a shot that was going into the net with his fist and because Len Davies failed with the penalty kick, Cardiff missed a Championship!

Take stock as well of Nottingham Forest's two matches with Leeds United. In those sort of engagements the points are of double value.

Rotherham United could put the cat among the pigeons if they ran riot in the two matches with Leicester City.

THERE'S going to be plenty of excitement at Easter when it is possible that the promotion field might be thinned, though you never can tell. The heavy holiday programme will be exacting for clubs and players and there is ever the fear that the injury bogey will appear.

Clubs with good reserves will have an advantage should any stars be hurt. Wednesday, of course, go to Brentford on Good Friday, are at home to Swansea Town on Easter Saturday and have the return match with Brentford here on Easter Monday.

We hope that we shall find some points in our Easter eggs! We ought to get a couple from Swansea at any rate and while a point might be lost at Brentford we should manage to get a couple on Easter Monday. Wish us the best of luck. You can't do without it these days.

OUR friends from Luton today will not be an easy proposition. They have good players and are fighters. One of their number is our former player, Hugh McJarrow.

The match, however, has an individual point which we should be remiss if we did not mention it. We are not going to dwell on it exhaustively today, but as you know when Derek Dooley scored his two goals against Notts. County on March 22nd, he took his League total to 37 and thus equalled the League club record which Jimmy Trotter set up in season 1925-26 when the Second Division championship was won.

Therefore, if Dooley scores today he will set up a new Sheffield Wednesday record. In any case he should do shortly even if he fails to score today.

Considering the fact that he only came into the League side on October 7th, Dooley

has done surprisingly well. He needs two more goals to beat Trotter's aggregate of 39 League and Cup goals in season 1925-26.

We expect there'll be a shout if he sets up a record today.

WE should here pay tribute, too, to Jack Sewell, who has been scoring some great goals on this ground lately. In the last three home matches he has made spectacular dashes to finish with a perfect shot.

Sewell is playing very fine football. We suggest that he is playing better now than he did at the time he gained his international and inter-league honours. His total of over 20 goals is a jolly good one for an inside-forward, for don't forget he has not been neglectful of Dooley and his colleagues.

Unassuming Sewell is going to gain more honours, for he is bound to make progress in his ability as he gains in experience. He is still only young.

SUCCESSIVE away defeats at Wolverhampton and Aston Villa caused our Central League team to lose ground in the fight for that competition's championship and while we are only three points behind the leaders, Wolverhampton Wanderers, who have 50 points from 36 games, we have, therefore, lost the Championship chance, unless there are exceptional developments such as a collapse by the teams above us which is not at all likely. Apart from that, we are fourth and in second place there's Preston North End with 50 points from 36 matches; and third, Everton Reserves with 49 points from 35 matches.

It may be a little disappointing but after all considering the various team changes we have had to make, the record of the team is very good. We always have to bear in mind that the Central League team is more or less a feeder of the League side and also it is one of the teams in which the more promising of youngsters have to be tested after they have shown progress in the Yorkshire League team.

LUTON COMMAND RESPECT

LAST season Luton Town had to fight hard to escape relegation. This season they revived and for a few months figured so high in the Second Division table that they became talked about as possible candidates for promotion. But they had injuries and fell away, though they made up for that by having a good run in the F.A. Cup.

Luton sprang rather a surprise in the fourth round by holding Brentford to a draw on their own ground and then winning a passport into the fifth round by knocking out Brentford in the 2nd replay at Highbury. After that they defeated Swindon in the fifth round and came up against mighty Arsenal on their own ground, where they gave a good account of themselves, going down only by the odd goal of five, after leading 1-0 at half-time.

So it is clear that today they will be worthy foemen of Sheffield Wednesday. We would remind you that on November 10th when Wednesday visited Luton at Kenilworth Road, they beat us 5-3 after a level 1-1 first half. Davies, subsequently transferred to Huddersfield Town, scored for them after 17 minutes and Sewell equalised three minutes afterwards.

EXCITING SECOND HALF.

Dooley gave Wednesday the lead eight minutes after half-time only, for winger Mitchell to equalise within three minutes and soon afterwards Morton to give the Hatters the lead. Taylor put on another goal and while Dooley scored a second goal 15 minutes from the end, Mitchell bobbed up with a fifth Luton goal a minute from time. Pretty exciting.

Midway through March Luton sprang a surprise by defeating the much-improved Everton team by 3-1 at Goodison Park. So the warning cries out loud to Wednesday "Take Care!" And it must be heeded for home points are a vital necessity to the old club in the promotion push.

There are clever men in the Luton side. There's young inside-right Taylor, who played last week for England B against Holland in Amsterdam. This smart forward has scored 24 League and Cup goals this season. That

feat is sufficient to place the label "Dangerous" round his neck.

And that notable outside-left Mitchell is a forward who must not be allowed much room or he will either make or score goals. In League and Cup matches he has got 15. The old Northampton forward is pretty good.

There are other useful men in their attack. Whether or not he is playing today, we remember George Stobbart, the former Middlesbrough centre-forward who knows the way to goal. Moore has been leading the attack lately and very effectively, while at inside-left there is David Sexton, who made his League debut against Everton on March 15th. He is only 22, but he has good footwork, a keen sense of positional play and a shot which is generally on the mark.

FAMILIAR FIGURES.

There are familiar figures in defence. There's international Bernard Streten in goal and it is not surprising that they think a lot about Streten at Luton. They prize him so highly that when overtures for his transfer were made early in this season they would not consider any offer less than £10,000. Which is a big sum for a goal-keeper even in these days when they are not so scarce as they used to be.

Dunne and Aherne are two strong backs who do not stand on any ceremony. While at centre half-back is Syd. Owen, one of the finest pivots in the country. Although Dooley got a couple of goals at Luton, he knows he'll have his work cut out to repeat the feat today.

Wing-halves Shanks and Watkins are effective tacklers and give their forwards useful support.

It is possible that Luton may include Hugh McJarrow, our old centre-forward who was transferred to them some weeks ago. Anyway, Luton are good.

MANAGER—"DALLY" DUNCAN.

Their manager, of course, is Mr. Dally Duncan, the one-time outside left of Scotland and Derby County. Mr. Duncan was a grand forward, a most entertaining winger and there will be many spectators here today who will readily recall his prowess.

SHOTS FOR GOAL

It is probable that prices of admission to Football League matches next season will be higher next season. Ground charges may go up to 1/9d. This is a pity but it must be remembered that not only has the Entertainment Tax been increased but there is a prospect of players' wages being raised. Moreover the costs of everything is more than double what they used to be. The man in the street would be staggered if he knew how heavy charges are made for boots, shirts, stockings, etc., nowadays.

Tottenham Hotspur are again to propose that it be "Four up and Four Down" in the League's promotion and relegation system next season. It might be carried. There is promise of better support than last year, but what a mixture the Second Division would be with eight clubs moving out and eight new ones moving in each year.

Television now is so good and so widespread that it is easy to appreciate that the football authorities do not seem at all disposed to lift the television ban on League matches.

The new National Youth Cup competition proposed for next season in place of the Inter-County Youth tournament should be a big success and by developing young talent help in the fight to reduce transfer fees.

Stan. Mortensen has been a great goal-getter for Blackpool since the war. Here he is again this season as their leading goal-scorer. As we write he has scored 25 of their 54 League goals and the next highest scorer is Alan Brown, with seven and Ernie Taylor (ex-Newcastle) with six.

Will Huddersfield escape relegation? A few more feats like their victory over Manchester United could possibly extricate them. But they have played with fire an awful lot since the war and their top scorer this season is Vic Metcalfe with seven! And one of those was scored in a Cup-tie.

Arthur Rowley, the Leicester inside-forward is proving about as deadly a marksman as his brother Jack, of Manchester United. Prior to last Saturday he had scored 31 goals. He needs only three more to equal the Leicester club record of 34.

In the Football League First Division list of leading goal-scorers the only Liverpool forward named is that grand Scottish international winger, Billy Liddell, with 17.

Young Rutter, the Cardiff City back, who played for England B against Holland last week at Amsterdam is the first English player of a Welsh club ever to play in a representative match for England. Looks as though the F.A. Selectors have turned over a new leaf. How many recall the brilliant Hardy, wing-half of Cardiff, who never got a cap because selectors would not consider an Englishman's claims if not associated with an English club.

How many remember that the Newcastle United trainer is Norman Smith, who used to be with Sheffield Wednesday and took part in Wednesday's amazing escape from relegation in 1928 and helped them reach the heights in the following season?

Young McMillan, who replaces Billy Steel in Scotland's attack, and will be Billy Liddell's partner, is one of the big "finds" of the season. An Airdrieonian, it is said that Derby County are among the English clubs keenly interested in him. In a recent trial match between the Scottish F.A. XI against the Army at Newcastle he was brilliant and did the hat-trick.

England must win the International match with Scotland at Hampden next Saturday to share the International Championship with gallant little Wales, celebrating its 75th year of existence? England has won the last two matches at Hampden.

Sheffield County Cup semi-finals are: Rotherham v. Doncaster; Sheffield Wednesday v. Sheffield United. Dates have not yet been arranged.

Poor old Ireland. The Football League team won the inter-League match at Belfast by 9-0 and never had to play more than at half speed. And we had thought that Irish football was on the upgrade. Let us heed the fact, however, that all the Irishmen are part-timers. Some were at work in the shipyards, factories, etc., until noon on the day of the match.

Jack Milburn, the Newcastle and England centre-forward, was presented with a baby son last week. He has two little girls.
