

CLUB NOTES

IT was a very valuable and pleasing point we brought away from Filbert Street last Saturday, and all the more so because on form the final result was a foregone conclusion. For our defence to hold at bay until only three minutes from the end before capitulating against a forward line which had previously scored twelve goals in four games before its own customers, was a great performance, and while perhaps a draw was a fair result taking the whole game through, the Leicester fans were very relieved when Rowley notched his usual goal to save them from their first home defeat. This match had not the colour expected when our two teams now meet but it was hard graft all the way through and our boys never gave up trying. A very well-earned point.

Those of you who came down to Kenilworth Road on Wednesday evening last, must have thoroughly enjoyed the very nice football both the Shelbourne lads and ours played when they met in a Friendly. There was some lovely football most of the time with never a nasty foul right away through and not once were either of the Trainers called into action. The game was fairly even until the last twenty minutes, when the full-time training of our lads showed against the part-time only of the Dublin lads. Added of course to this was the journey the previous day by air of the Shelbourne players which, while not exhausting, was nevertheless a further advantage to our boys. At the Dinner afterwards the Shelbourne Vice-Chairman remarked that if more such games could be arranged with other countries, and particularly behind the Iron Curtain, a much more friendly atmosphere would be felt throughout the whole world, a sentiment we all heartily endorsed. We live in hopes such fixtures will one day really come to pass. Thank you Shelbourne for a most entertaining evening in every sense of the word, and Good Luck to you in your future endeavours.

It gives us much pleasure in welcoming once again to Kenilworth Road that very colourful Club, Notts. County. Somehow we know that when we meet them it is not going to be just an ordinary game, and this feeling has persisted for years. Despite their six to nothing defeat at Fulham a week last Wednesday, which incidently was their lot when they have visited us twice recently, the result of today's match is by no means a foregone conclusion, for it is noticed they beat Birmingham City at Meadow Lane, last Saturday, by two clear goals, no mean performance. They have selected

exactly the same team which beat Birmingham, so we can expect a very hard game. We are continuing with the experiment tried out last Wednesday evening of playing Charlie Watkins in the forward line. It was quite a success then, and although we recognise that the opposition this afternoon will be a little stiffer, nevertheless we are continuing with the idea for Charlie is no stranger to this position and we feel he could make it his own. If he can find the touch he showed on Wednesday night when he scored two lovely goals, then the experiment will not have been in vain.

The Reserves maintained their unbeaten record when defeating Aldershot Reserves here last Saturday by two goals to nil, but it was not the kind of game we have come to expect from this young side, and, in fact, it was a disappointing game. Some credit however must be allowed the Aldershot lads for the very stern fight they displayed, which our lads had the greatest difficulty in overcoming. The Stiffs are now the only unbeaten team in the two Sections of the Football Combination, and besides this honour have scored more goals than any other team, no other team in the two sections having scored more than twenty goals to date excepting Leicester City. The match at Leicester this afternoon therefore should be worth seeing, and if our lads can maintain their unbeaten record there it will indeed be a grand performance.

Our Youth XI have been drawn at home in the First Round of the F.A. Youth Challenge Cup Competition, Eynesbury Rovers providing the opposition. This match will be played at Kenilworth Road on Saturday, October 11th, kick-off 11 a.m., and if the two previous appearances on this ground of our Youth side are anything to go by, then those of you who will attend are sure of enjoying this Saturday morning's sport. Further details of the match will be given in next Saturday's programme.

The injuries position we are glad to say is very much easier than it was a fortnight ago, but Gordon Turner has now joined the list with a pulled muscle which prevents him from appearing here this afternoon. We were hoping the muscle would respond to treatment but yesterday it was found further treatment is required. We hope to see Bernard Moore, selected to fill the vacancy, will play as well as he did here on Wednesday evening last, when undoubtedly he had a very good match. Bernard, like Hugh McJarrow, are what we term "wet ball players," and their time will come when we have the wet grounds. It is a matter of "horses for courses."

On leaving school Bernard Streten joined the Royal Air Force and during his service career he represented them in Soccer and Athletics. Signed amateur forms for Notts. County, our opponents here today, in 1941. During the war guested with Walsall, Crewe Alexandra, Port Vale and Wolverhampton Wanderers. Later

signed as an amateur for Shrewsbury Town. During 1947 was capped for the Football Association Amateur XI six times and in 1949 gained his first professional cap playing for England v. Ireland when England beat Ireland by nine goals to two. Joined Luton as an amateur in January 1947, signing professional forms exactly twelve months later. Is without a doubt one of the leading custodians in the country.
