OUR VISITORS

At the Baseball Ground today we have as opposition Luton Town, and to all our visitors we extend a hearty welcome.

The most interesting feature about Luton to local fans here is, of course, that they are managed by a great Rams favourite of some years ago—"Dally" Duncan. Many will remember his brilliant displays on the left wing which earned him numerous International honours, and to set the seal on a wonderful playing career with the Rams he was a member of our Cup-winning side in 1946. Strangely enough his present club were our first victims in the Cup tournament that season which was on the home-and-away aggregate goal basis, the Rams winning away on 5th January 6-0 and at home on 9th January 3-0.

During the same season we also met them twice in League fare at Luton on 30th March which ended in a 1-1 draw, and what was their last appearance at Derby on 3rd April 1946 which after a close game the Rams just won 4-3. As a point of interest, our team on that occasion lined up as follows: Boulton; Nicholas, Parr; Bullions, Howe, Musson; Simpson, Carter, McCulloch, Doherty, Morrison. Scorers: Doherty 2, Simpson and opponent own goal 1 each.

During recent seasons Luton's astute team building has brought about a great improvement, ample evidence of which can be noted in the last three seasons, for in 1951 they finished 19th; in 1952 they went

up to 8th position, and last year were always challenging for promotion, eventually finishing in third place behind Sheffield United and Huddersfield. There is little doubt that their success last year was due mainly to this shrewd team building, a typical example being the signing of Jesse Pye from the Wolves. This player certainly had a lot to do with their great bid for promotion and from centre-forward equalled the club's goal-scoring record with 28 goals in League and Cup games.

Other players we shall probably see today include Streten, goalkeeper, who in addition to his six Amateur International Caps was awarded full International honours when he played for England v. Ireland in 1950.

Full-backs Dunne and Aherne, at right and left respectively, hail from Ireland and both have been honoured with International games on several occasions. Right-half Morton is a local lad signed in February 1946 and was a model of consistency last season being an ever-present.

Skipper Owen at centre-half is rated one of the best pivots in the game and has been a great asset and club man since signing from Birmingham City in 1947. He has been most unlucky with injuries this season, but we understand he is now fully recovered and will in all probability be playing today. On his left the usual selection is Watkins, a Scot, who signed from Glasgow Rangers

in 1948; has played at inside-forward, but wing-half is his best position.

The usual wingers, Davies and Mitchell, at right and left respectively, both joined the 'Hatters' in 1951. The former is a native of South Africa and first played with the Scottish club Clyde prior to joining Luton. Mitchell has previously played for Stoke and Northampton, and last season proved a great opportunist, netting 13 goals from the wing in Cup and League games.

Despite their success last season it is rather significant to note that during the close season they made two important captures, signing Downie, a Scot, from Manchester United, and Cummins, an Irishman from Everton. The latter, by the way, played for this Country last month against Luxembourg. Both are reputed to be great ball players, and with Downie on the right and Cummins on the left of Pye, the inside forward trio appears to be very formidable.

We understand that these players mentioned form their best available side and unless anything unforeseen happens it will be one of the few occasions this season when they have been at full strength, due to a succession of unfortunate injuries.

There can be no question that they are a more than useful side and we shall no doubt see a keen and exciting game.

PEN-PORTRAITS OF LUTON TOWN

STRETEN, B. (goal)—Joined Luton as an amateur in January 1947. Was then serving in the R.A.F. Signed professional forms in January 1948 when he was demobilised. Has six Amateur and one full International caps to his credit. Is without a doubt one of the leading custodians in the country.

DUNNE, S. (right-back)—Born Wicklow, Eire. Secured from Shelbourne in May 1950. Gained two Eire caps this season bringing his total to four.

AHERNE, T. (left-back)—Signed from Belfast Celtic in March 1949. Has played for his country Eire in every International in the past three seasons excepting the last match when he was unfit.

MORTON, R. (right-half)—Local boy who signed professional in February 1946. Was freely tipped for International honours last season through his brilliant displays at right-half. An ever-present last season.

OWEN, S. (centre-half)—Captain. Sid has been very unlucky this season with injuries, today's match being only his sixth League game. Toured Australia with the F.A. two years ago and was a member of the Football League team in May this year. Secured from Birmingham City in 1947. Made 38 appearances last season.

WATKINS, C. (left-half)—Came to Luton from Glasgow Rangers in 1948. Played with success at inside-forward for a large part of last season but is now back to his best position at half-back. Is a qualified physiotherapist.

DAVIES, R. (outside-right)—A native of South Africa. Came to this country to try his luck with Clyde from whom he was signed by Luton in May 1951.

DOWNIE, J. (inside-right)—Secured from Manchester United for a large fee during the close season. A brilliant ball player who also knows the way to goal. A Scot who came to the fore with Bradford Park Avenue prior to joining Manchester United.

PYE, J. (centre-forward)—Came to prominence with Notts. County before being transferred to Wolves and whilst with them was capped for England v. Belgium in 1945/6 and Eire in 1950. Had a lot to do with the Town's promotion bid last year when he equalled the club's goal scoring record with 24 goals in League and 4 in F.A. Cup.

CUMMINS, G. (inside-left)—Another Irishman. Secured by the Town during the close season at a five-figure fee from Everton. A brilliant ball player. Capped for his Country last month against Luxembourg.

MITCHELL, A. (outside-left)—Former Stoke player. Secured from Northampton Town two seasons ago. A strong raider with a powerful shot with either foot. Scored 13 goals last season, Cup and League.

CLUB NOTES

NOTTINGHAM FOREST v DERBY COUNTY

Our visit to Nottingham last Saturday was our first League game there for 27 years, and to celebrate the occasion a record crowd for the season to date of nearly 32,000 turned up to watch the encounter.

The Forest have, of course, the best home record in the Division and their ultimate 4-2 victory was their ninth home win in succession which gives them 19 out of a possible 20 points at home.

Taking all things into consideration, it is fair to say that the points went to the better side, but there was very little to choose between the two teams except in the all-important aspect of finishing. All the Forest forwards never hesitated when within shooting range to let fly at Middleton, and

the two terrific first-timers from Capel and Lemon which found the net were typical examples of their willingness to have a go. Nevertheless, if the Rams were in contrast usually inclined to make the one pass too many when near goal, some of their efforts certainly deserved a better fate. A typical example was early in the second half when the Rams were definitely on top and playing as well, if not better, than at any time this season. A shot from Dunn hit the inside post, trickled along the line to hit the other upright, and the ball was eventually scrambled away off the line by a defender. Had this scored it would have put them on equal terms and so well were they playing at this period that the whole trend of the game might have been altered.





The Forest, as if sensing that their slender lead was in danger, made renewed efforts and the subsequent exciting end-to-end struggle was much to the liking of the large crowd. To add to the excitement, five goals were scored in the last 25 minutes. Capel put the Forest two up after 64 minutes; Lemon made it three ten minutes later—both first-time efforts—and in the last few hectic minutes McLaren, Capel and Wilkins brought the final score to 4-2.

A most entertaining game throughout, particularly the second half with the Rams giving a general display which was a great improvement on recent games, and a repetition of this form, plus a little more first-time shooting, should soon see them in winning vein again. McLaren's goal, by the way, was his ninth in eight games, having scored in every first team game he has played except Leeds (away).


