
## Finale

This is my farewell appearance. This is your 21st home game in the Second Division of the Football League and that's where my job ends. I'm not sorry. In the summer I fish, except that I'm taking time off this year to see the World Cup in June-July in Switzerland, and I'm sacrificing the fishing because I want to see such as Uruguay, Brazil, Argentina, Hungary, Italy and Tom Finney. I want to see teams who believe that you play football with two feet.

I want to see countries who say their skill is due (as do Austria) to "ball, ball, ball, ball, ball, ball, ball, ball," meaning

ball-practice everlasting. Yet when I reproduced those words of Walter Nausch, the expert Austrian team-chief, in a British newspaper they thought the word ball should be mentioned only three times. That's the difference between British and foreign football. They really WORK at it.

Sep Smith, Leicester City International between the wars, said "Billiards players don't perfect their touch by running round the table". See what I mean ?

Those words should be engraved over the entrance to the F.A. offices in Lancaster Gate and Football League offices in Preston. In capitals.

All the conferences of all the 92 League managers plus officials, all the Grand Inquests into English football, will amount to little or nothing unless they produce as verdict : "Ball, ball, ball, ball, ball, ball, ball."

#### STRAWHATTERS

Your last home League match is with Luton Town, where the straw hats (used to) come from. I played for them once when the name of Hawkes (Bob and Fred) was heard in the land. There I saw as a youngster the biggest forward line that ever took the field in a first class English match—Hogg, Gemmell, Someone, Holley and Bridgett for Sunderland in an F.A. Cup tie. And Gemmell was the biggest of the lot. John Charles would have needed a stone or more to equal him . . . in weight. Good players too, most of them.

Luton have been one of the progressive clubs. Salute them. They've had courage . . . courage to enter the Football League when all their neighbours for a hundred miles around were in the local and parochial Southern League. Courage to get on their feet at annual meetings of the Football League and say what they think—instead of whispering it into people's ears the night before and then sitting like deaf-mutes at the a.g.m.

Why are clubs feared of speaking their thoughts at the League's annual meetings ? Why ? Why ? Why ? What is there to be frightened of ? Who is there to be frightened of ?

#### SQUEALS AND FACTS

And while we're on this subject, why doesn't someone tell the truth and say the time has come for the Third Division to stop squealing and practice what it preaches ?

Each year it asks for four (instead of two) clubs to go up and down, so giving the big prize to the Third (weakest) Division, a mixed prize to the Second (average) Division, and a big HANDICAP with no prize at all to the First (and most attractive) Division. Each year the club says no, and they're right, because the Third Division Give and Take . . . Give nothing and Take all. They Give nothing because each year they bolt the door against

newcomers to their Division ( like Wigan, potentially the strongest club of the whole lot, and Peterborough). Yet want to take because they want to open the door to 4 clubs descending from the 1st to the 2nd and 3rd Divisions !

Four up and down is dead 'but it won't lie down. It deserves to be, because of this dog-in-the-manger policy.

#### NEW OR NOTHING

When the Third Division for the first time in history recommends for election a new club, instead of recommending for re-election clubs which have been re-elected two, three, four, five and even six times, then I will think about four up-and-down.

This would alter their fatal Theme Song of " You vote for me and I'll vote for you, even if you've only a hundred supporters ". All right. Let them begin to put themselves right with the First and Second Division voters this year by saying :

" We're at a deadlock. We're making no progress. We know the reason why. We've forgotten that we now receive (chiefly through the First and Second Division Clubs) £1000 a year apiece from the F.A. Cup pool and 10% increase free of tax on all our players earnings. So hence forward we will make no recommendation at all as to which clubs shall take the places of the bottom pair in each Section of the Third Division."

Then they'll make new friends. Then they'll get somewhere, or be more worthy of it.

## Pen Pictures of our visitors— LUTON TOWN

B. STRETON (Goal). Was serving in the R.A.F. when he joined Luton as an amateur in January, 1947. Was demobbed exactly a year later and signed professional forms. Six Amateur and one full International Cap to his credit.

L. JONES (Right-back). A young Welshman who has recently been watched by the Welsh F.A. Selectors, and we expect him to gain a place in the Welsh team in the near future.

T. AHERNE (Left-back). Signed from Belfast Celtic in March, 1949. Played for his country, Eire, in every International in the past three seasons, and has already played versus Luxembourg this season.

R. MORTON (Right-half). Local boy who signed professional in February, 1946. Was freely tipped for International honours last season through his brilliant displays at right-half.

S. OWEN (Centre-half). Secured from Birmingham City in 1947. Toured Australia with the F.A. two years ago and was a member of the Football League team which played in Copenhagen in May, last year. Is one of the 32 players nominated by the Football Association to take part in the Continental Tour of Europe about the middle of May.

W. SHANKS (Left-half). Was born in Valetta, Malta. Since joining Luton, after a month's trial, in January, 1947, has played in a great variety of positions. Is a full ninety minutes player.

R. DAVIES (Outside-right). A native of South Africa. Came to this country to try his luck with Clyde from whom he was signed by Luton in May, 1951.

G. CUMMINS (Inside-right). An Irishman secured by Luton from Everton for a five figure fee. Has played for his country, Eire, versus Luxembourg twice this season.

G. TURNER (Centre-forward). A Doncaster boy who was recommended to Luton whilst playing in Navy football. The son of a former Hull City player. Selected to play for F.A. XI versus Cambridge University last season, scoring three goals.

J. DOWNIE (Inside-left). Secured from Manchester United for a large fee during the close season. A brilliant ball player who also knows the way to goal. Previously with Bradford Park Avenue.

A. MITCHELL (Outside-left). Secured by Luton from Northampton Town two seasons ago. A strong raider with a powerful shot. Scored 13 goals last season and already has ten to his credit this season.

Without any doubt we have the most promising array of "up and coming" youngsters on our books at the present time than ever before. So here's wishing them all the best of luck in the future.



One of the few Scottish boys on our staff, being a native of Hamilton. They certainly do catch 'em young in Scotland, for Andy was only seven years of age when he was playing at inside-left for the Woodside School juniors, and continued playing for the school until he went off to work. As a member of the Bent Royal Oak P.S.A. team for several seasons in the Hamilton and District League, he won numerous medals.

Was only 17½ when he joined the Royal Navy, and after 2½ years spent in Combined Operations, chiefly in landing craft, was transferred to the Army. With the K.O.S.B. went off to India for three years playing in many representative games including the F.A. Touring Side led by Tommy Walker.




