






CLUB NOTES

AFTER a run of eleven League matches during which we gathered 18 points, scoring 30 goals against 8—promotion form if you like—we had to bow to defeat at Plymouth last Saturday when we were defeated—according to the score—by the odd goal in three. Apart from frantic activity Plymouth did very little towards obtaining their victory for the two goals credited to them would never be scored again in a month of Sundays. To enjoy such a superiority as we did and yet find ourselves down by two goals at half-time seemed fantastic, and yet there it was only too clearly Plymouth Argyle 2, Luton Town 0. It is instilled into our lads to "play to the whistle," very difficult at times when the Official has made a decision with which they do not agree and especially when the other side has had a decision reversed in their favour after almost pulling the Referee's shirt off his back. When the first goal was scored Ron Baynham definitely heard a whistle being blown. It apparently came from a match being played on a ground just outside where our match was being played, in fact some spectators inside the Home Park Ground could watch either that match or ours, whichever took their fancy, by merely turning round. Having heard a whistle—his was not to reason why—Baynham threw the ball forward to enable the free kick to be taken. Davis the Plymouth centre forward either did not hear the whistle or if he did realized it was nothing to do with the match in which he was taking part and promptly banged the ball into the back of the net. And there a goal was! Sad though it was we are not blaming anybody for it, but we are quite sure another goal like it will never again be scored against us. The second goal was as a result of one of those pettifogging decisions of which Referee Griffiths seems so fond. We had the same decision given against us three years ago by the same Referee in our F.A. Cup match with Brentford on which occasion we were enjoying a two goals lead and coasting along to an easy victory when Bernard Streten in clearing a ball took a fifth step and was penalised for carrying. How often do we see goalkeepers taking more than the recognised four steps and nothing done about it. Baynham at Plymouth was being hampered, obstructed if you like in trying to get rid of the ball and this factor should have been taken into consideration at the time. However an indirect free-kick was given against him and when Davis shot from the pass he received, Baynham seemed to have the shot covered but somehow or other it got behind him and over the goal-line for Plymouth's second goal. Most teams would have given up the struggle against such atrocious luck but our lads fought on, and although they reduced the arrears through Bob Morton shortly after the resumption the nearest they got to saving the game was when Jimmy Adam hit the crossbar. Defeated but not disgraced, our lads have already put this match out of their minds and are ready today to start another good run which would surely keep them at least in their present position in the League Table.

We have every prospect of a most interesting and exciting match here today when we have the pleasure of receiving our near-neighbours Fulham. Although they are not doing so well as was the case when we met them at Craven Cottage last October, they are still a force not to be taken lightly for once they get in front they take some catching up. The entry of Ron Greenwood into their ranks seems to have had the desired effect of stiffening the defence, but they are suffering a big blow in that young Johnny Haynes has not recovered well enough from an injury he received against Plymouth three weeks ago to yet take the field.

This is a great pity as we would have liked to see him in action this afternoon for he is undoubtedly one of England's cleverest inside forwards at the present time and no doubt the Londoners miss his scheming. We notice that Bedford Jezzard and Bobby Robson have been selected to join the F.A. party to tour the West Indies this coming close season together with our own Syd Owen, and Trainer Harry Wright. We congratulate them all on their selection and trust they will have an enjoyable as well as a very successful trip.

Another of our players whom we are very pleased to note has received honours this week is young Alan Collier, our third team goalkeeper. A few weeks ago he was selected to play for the Rest against England, at Leicester, in a Youth Trial, and although on the losing side did enough to impress the Selectors as to his capabilities. He heard yesterday that he has been selected to play for the F.A. Youth XI against Portsmouth Youth XI in a Representative Match to be played at Portsmouth, on Wednesday next, March 16th. At the same time he also heard he has been selected to play for England in the International Youth Tournament to be played in Italy between April 5th and 12th. We are very pleased to release him to take part in these matches and sincerely trust they are the fore-runner of many more honours.

On Monday night next, kick-off 7.30 p.m., we shall be playing at Watford in our Annual Floodlight Match for the Rigby Taylor Cup. The match arranged to be played at Luton, in November last, had to be postponed at the last minute because of bad weather. Watford have very kindly agreed to forego the match at Luton in view of our congestion of fixtures which have arisen due to the shocking weather experienced this winter and so Monday's night match will decide which Club will hold the Cup for the next twelve months. Although a Friendly it should provide some very interesting football and we hope quite a few of you will be able to spare the time to visit the Vicarage Road Ground.

On Saturday morning next, kick-off 11 o'clock, we are staging the F.A. County Youth Championship Match, Southern Semi-Final, between Bedfordshire and Sussex. When our lads played the lads from Middlesex in a Floodlight Match in the same Competition early last month, some very good football was seen and, if the weather is kind, we hope to see a continuation of this next Saturday morning. Stand and Enclosure only will be opened, admission charges being: Adults 1/-, Boys 6d.

Being unable to obtain tickets for the Manchester City match three weeks ago, was apparently a sore point with a few of you fans. Apparently we are supposed to have the "sense," the "foresight" and the "brains" for anticipating such a match as this one, despite the fact that only six weeks earlier we could not sell even half the reserved seats for the Workington match. Season Tickets to different parts of the Ground have been available in earlier years, but there was such a poor demand for them that it was decided not to continue with them. Suddenly because the tickets, so we are led to believe, all went to applicants who did not even know the shape of a football, we have had dozens of letters suggesting that season tickets for the Terraces and Bobbers Stand be made available. All the suggestions put forward will be considered, but the only practical one at the moment seems to be the issuing of such tickets. But already there has appeared a snag for we have had quite a few letters saying that if such a method is adopted how do people come on who cannot afford to buy a season ticket outright. If we go to the trouble of issuing season tickets they must be complete for the whole season for there can be no splitting up of a season book. An announcement will be made at a later stage upon the method decided upon.
