CLUB NOTES

This is Charlton Athletic's Golden Jubilee Year, and it is with pride and thanksgiving that we celebrate this great landmark in the club's history. When the little band of Charlton lads founded the club 50 years ago on a spot not a quarter of a mile from the Valley, the never dreamed that the Athletic would one day become world famous as members of the First Division Football League, or that the title of their club would one day be engraved on the F.A. Cup.

These pioneers surmounted tremendous obstacles in order that the club should become established, and within a few years, the name "Charlton Athletic" ranked high in their sphere of football.

The story of our ancestors is one of delightful comradeship, good sportsmanship, tremendous personal sacrifice and a steadfast determination to improve their game. They started the club as Charlton Athletic, and it has always been Charlton Athletic, building up a tradition which we, who follow in their footsteps, must always strive to cherish.

WELCOME TO LUTON TOWN

To-day, our visitors, Luton Town, are making their debut as a First Division club. Readers will recall that Birmingham and Luton earned promotion last season after one of the most exciting finishes on record. Three clubs concluded the season with 54 points each, Rotherham United proving the unlucky club, missing promotion through inferior goal average. Luton Town's advance was thoroughly deserved, however, and we feel sure they will give a good account of themselves in top class football.

Luton's manager, Mr. "Dally" Duncan, needs no introduction to Charlton, for he was Derby County's outside-left in the side that beat Charlton 4-1 after extra time in the F.A. Cup Final of 1946. Dally was a great player, and many times played for Scotland.

ANOTHER CUP-TIE

The last time Charlton played Luton Town was in a third round F.A. Cup-tie at Luton on January 12, 1952, and the 3,000 Charlton supporters who made the trip had little to enthuse over, for the Robins gave a surprisingly moderate display and were beaten 1-0. Full credit went to Luton, and particularly to their international goalkeeper, Bernard Streten, who brought off some amazing saves. We recall two in particular—

one from Benny Fenton and another, in the dying minutes of the game, from Riley Cullum.

Charlton's team that day was: Bartram; Campbell, Lock; Fenton, Ufton, Hammond; Hurst, Cullum, Vaughan, Kiernan and Duffy.

In the League, Charlton and Luton have met 20 times in all, most of them in the 1920's when both clubs were in the Third Division.

Luton's first visit to The Valley was on April 22, 1922, towards the end of Charlton's first season as a Football League club. It proved a most un-happy day for the Robins. It poured with rain and scarcely 3,000 people braved the elements to see Charlton beaten 1-0 after having by far the better of the exchanges. The goal was a tragedy for Charlton. Barnes, the goalkeeper, slipped in the mud in making a save, and the ball slithered to the feet of Higginbotham, Luton's inside-right, who had the simplest task in scoring.

REMEMBER THESE NAMES

For the benefit of old supporters of both clubs, the teams in that 1922 match were: **Charlton:** Barnes; Burton, Goodman; Dowling, Whalley, Dunn; Castle, Bailey, Filliston, Thomson, Wilson.

Luton Town: Bailey; Lennon, Tirrell; Foster, Walker, Roe; Hoar, Higginbotham, Reid, Butcher, Bookman.

J. W. Filliston, who led the Charlton forwards in that match, was an amateur signed just previously from Redhill.

Charlton's last League match at Luton was at the beginning of the Robins' promotion-winning season in the Third Division in 1934-35. It was on September 8, 1934, and the fixture recalls the tragic death of Charlton's goalkeeper, Alex Wright. On the day before the match at Luton, Wright was fatally injured while bathing in the sea at Babbacombe. Harry took the place of his namesake in goal at Luton, and Charlton won 2-1.

SAM COMES IN

Within a week of poor Alex Wright's death, Charlton manager Jimmy Seed signed Sam Bartram, and before the end of the year, Sam made his League debut, and on January 19, 1935, was in goal for the return game with Luton, in which Charlton won 4-2 and gained two more promotion points.



ECHOES ACROSS THE VALLEY

Gordon Hurst, our outside-right, is now lighter in weight than at any time since he joined Charlton in 1946. By paying a little attention to his diet, Gordon has got his weight down to 11st. 5lb.—nearly half a stone lighter than last season. During the summer, Gordon attended an F.A. coaching course at Lilleshall, near Shrewsbury.

Supporters who like to have the Football League fixtures always handy cannot do better than obtain a copy of the F.A. Diary for season 1955-56 from The Football Association, 22, Lancaster Gate, London, W.2, enclosing a postal order for 3s. 3d.

Derek Ufton was a big success as Kent's wicket-keeper. He played in 13 county games, and many shrewd followers of cricket declared that Derek did well enough to have been selected for England in the final Test at The Oval. Charlton's popular skipper was in the Kent side that beat Surrey at The Oval, and in the match against Hampshire at Canterbury during holiday week, Derek and Stuart Leary figured in quite a stand.

Stuart Leary also did well in the Royal Air Force cricket XI and was selected for the Combined Services XI. Up in the north, Freddie Lucas, our reserve half-back scored over 400 runs as professional for Whitburn in Durham Senior League cricket. Freddie, who is now married, tells us that the standard in League cricket is pretty high, the bowling especially.

Lucas was not the only Charlton player to join the wedded ranks during the close season. John ("Buck") Ryan and Eddie Marsh have informed the income-tax man that they are now entitled to married allowance, while John Hewie married a Plumstead girl at the end of last season and spent his honeymoon in his native South Africa.

Reserve full-back Ken Gower is now quite a family man. Ken, who married last year, is now the father of a bonny daughter (Alyson) born on June 26. The Gowers live at Brockley in a flat which Ken decorated himself.

Malcolm Morris, another of Charlton's young full-backs, hopes one day to build his own house. Before he became a full-time professional, Malcolm was apprenticed to the building trade for five years, so that he knows the drill. An adaptable young fellow, Malcolm worked as a baths attendant at Ladywell during the close season.

Jimmy Gauld, our new inside-forward who last season broke all League of Ireland scoring records with 45 goals, is a Scotsman from Aberdeen. As a schoolboy he played for Scotland and was also in the Scotland Youth XI. He later became a part-time professional with the Aberdeen club, usually playing at centre-forward, and after three seasons went to Elgin City, from which club he joined Waterford just over a year ago.

Coach to the Waterford Club is Eddie McIlvenny, a much-travelled Scotsman who skippered the American team that knocked England out of the World Cup some years ago. Jimmy Gauld tells us that football draws big crowds on a Sunday in Eire. His old club, Waterford, several times had gates of 40,000 last season, when they finished runners-up in the League of Ireland championship and semi-finalists in the Irish Cup.

One evening in July there was an electricity power breakdown in the East End of London, and in a certain hall, Sam Bartram was about to address a audience of football enthusiasts when the lights failed. Sam wasn't upset in the least. Having broadcast to unseen audiences on many occasions, he was able to deliver his talk in total darkness.

Eddie Werge, one of Charlton's youngest professionals, is now serving in the R.A.O.C. at Leamington Spa. Recently, he utilised a spot of leave to train with his clubmates at The Valley. An inside-forward from the Blackfen district of Sidcup, Eddie joined us straight from school, and worked in the offices here.

Edward Robinson, the young inside-forward from Silksworth Colliery, Co. Durham, who signed for Charlton in April last year but was unable to play for us regularly owing to his apprenticeship in the building trade, will be seen in our colours more often in future. His apprentice indentures have been transferred from Durham to a South London firm.

Of the reserves, Ron White, Ken Chamberlain, Eddie Robinson and Syd Ellis showed good form in the trials, so that we have useful cover for emergencies, provided we do not suffer unduly from the injuries in the start-of-season rush of fixtures.

As a long term talent-providing plan, we have started a Charlton Colts team, which, from all accounts is building up nicely with young local talent.
