WELCOME TO . . . Luton Town

We have to go back seventeen years to find the last and only time Luton Town, to-day's visitors to Old Trafford, were in League opposition to United. That was in 1937-38 when United went on to finish Second Division runners-up.

Luton sealed a fine Cup and League campaign last season by winning a First Division place for the first time in their history. And they have gone on to make an impressive opening in senior football.

The "Hatters", whose manager is "Dally" Duncan, the former Derby County and Scotland left-winger, lost 2-4 here in 1938, but triumphed by the only goal on their own ground.

These were the teams at Old Trafford on 15th January, 1938:

United: Breen; Redwood, Roughton; Savage, Vose; McKay; Bryant, Baird, Bamford, Carey, Rowley.

Luton Town: Coen; King, Smith; Finlayson, Fellowes, Loughran; Ferguson, Redfern, Vinall, Roberts, Stephenson.

Bamford, Bryant, Carey and McKay scored for United. Ferguson and Redfern for Luton.

Luton Town playing personalities:

Bernard Streten (goalkeeper).

Former amateur with Notts County and Shrewsbury who made full England grade in 1949. Now returns in place of Ron Baynham, who gets his first cap for England (v. Denmark) to-morrow. Born at Gillingham.

Seamus Dunne (full-back).

Eire international, previously with Shelbourne. Joined Luton in 1950, made his debut the following season and was ever-present in the Hatters' promotion effort last season. Hails from County Wicklow.

Tommy Ahearne (full-back).

Many times capped for Ireland since 1946. Has also given fine service and like his

partner never missed a League game last season. Signed in 1949 from Belfast Celtic and previously with Linfield. A native of Limerick.

Bob Morton (wing half-back).

A local product who had a successful spell at centre-forward last season. Comes from Aston Clinton (Bucks.) and signed as a pro in 1946. Hit 14 League goals last term.

Sid Owen (centre half-back).

Signed at a modest fee from Birmingham City in 1947 and won England honours against Yugoslavia and Uruguay last year. Originally a wing-half, but has really hit the heights since Luton converted him to pivot. Born, Birmingham.

Wally Shanks (wing half-back).

Born at Valetta (Malta) of Scots parents and joined Town as a winger after a spell with Chelsea. Is a versatile player, signed after a months' trial at Kenilworth Road.

Michael Cullen (outside-right).

A Scottish junior product introduced to English League football at outside-left. Discovered with Douglasdale Juniors (Glasgow) in 1952 and has since figured on both wings.

Roy Davies (outside-right).

South African, born at Port Elizabeth. Returned home after a spell with Manchester City, but subsequently went to Clyde, who transferred him to Luton in 1951. At home in most forward positions.

Gordon Turner (inside-forward).

Son of a former Hull City winger who topped the goals list with 37 last season. Made his League debut in 1950-51 as a right-half, but now bang in the limelight at inside-forward. Born at Hull.

Peter McEwan (centre-forward).

Another South African who jumped straight into Town's first team on arriving in this country last year. Took his chance well in helping in the side's last-lap promotion effort. Comes from Transvaal.

George Cummins (inside-forward).

Cost a five-figure fee when signed from Everton in 1953. Is an Eire international (born at Dublin) first capped in 1952. Noted as a clever ball-player and forward schemer.

Jimmy Adam (outside-left).

Came to the fore in North-eastern League football with Spennymoor United. Is a Scot, hailing from Blantyre, Lanarkshire, who has now become first choice on the left wing.

John Groves (outside-left).

Son of Arthur Groves, the old Derby County inside-right and team-mate of Dally Duncan. Won Derbyshire schoolboy honours and signed by Luton at 15. Plays either inside or wing-forward.

CASUAL COMMENTS

He's eighty-three years of age, but you would not believe it. He has spent a great deal of his life as a director of the club he loves so much. Name is Mr. Tom Clegg, of Burnley. I talked to him after our game at Turf Moor last week-end. We always delight in remembering the "old" days because Tom Clegg and myself have been friends for thirty years. In the days when Scott Duncan was manager of United we three used to meet in a restaurant in Manchester on many Saturday evenings and have supper together. Tom Clegg, in those days, used to travel away nearly every week-end "scouting" on behalf of his club. And, when he reached Manchester in time to see Scott Duncan and myself, he always knew where to find us.

We talked again about the old times together and then he told me a story I did not know. It concerned Tommy Lawton, who, you will remember, was first with Burnley, then Everton and eventually to his present club Arsenal. In between he also lined-up with Chelsea, Notts County and Brentford.

Tom Clegg told me that he signed on Tom Lawton for Burnley, and was also "in" the deal when he was transferred to Everton. And do you know where he "found" Lawton? At The Cliff, Lower Broughton, now the United property, but at that time the home of Broughton Rangers Rugby League club.

"I had been tipped-off about this young boy playing for a youth team and I went to watch him. I was satisfied immediately and he signed amateur forms for us," said the genial Tom. Indeed, when Lawton joined Burnley it was director Tom Clegg who used to take him out on the ground and watch him "shooting-in" at specially prepared targets on the concrete terracing round the enclosure.

"But there came a time when we had to part because of our big bank overdraft," added Tom, "and I had the rather painful duty of seeing him sign on the dotted line for Everton."

Well it was good again to meet Tom Clegg, one of the friendliest men I have met in football over the years. I was glad to see him looking so well after a serious illness a couple of years ago.

The match between Burnley and United was keen enough — they usually are — but not a goal was

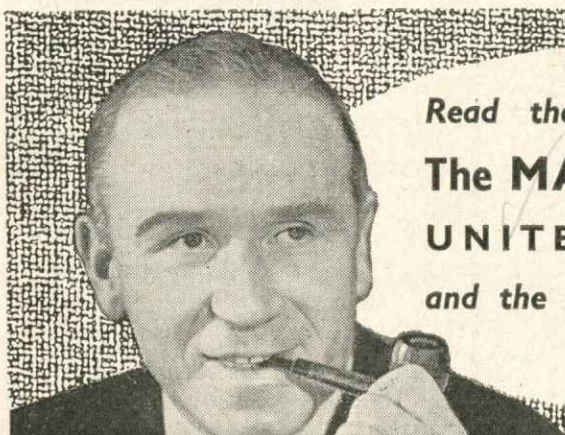

UNITED TOPICS

There's always a hearty welcome for United when they go "over the Border", and even that big reverse at the hands of Hibernian under the Easter Road floodlights last week shouldn't lose the club a single Scottish friend.

Naturally, it was a real disappointment, just as much to the hospitable Hibs folk as to Matt Busby, that owing to a persistent crop of injuries and illness, United were forced to field well below normal first-team strength.

Yet this much can be said. Against a powerful Hibs side liberally sprinkled with internationals and possessing one of the most experienced forward lines in club football, the United youngsters often delighted with some copy-book stuff without getting the goals their efforts deserved.

The Scots know their football and you can take it from me that any team which has disappointed them would not be immediately sought out for another game. Yet before United left Edinburgh, Mr. Harry Swan, the Hibs Chairman and President of the Scottish F.A. and manager Mr. Hugh Shaw joined in extending a firm invitation for a return match, either at Easter Road or Old Trafford.

Mr. Swan told manager Busby and directors Mr. George Whittaker and Mr. Bill Petherbridge, who accompanied the party, that considering United were without so many of their regular players he thought the team had played remarkably well. But it's goals that count, of course, and whereas United's approach play invariably broke down within sight of goal, the Scots revelled with every shooting chance. In other words, experience told its tale.

The absence of Tommy Taylor, Dennis Viollet, Johnny Berry and Roger Byrne, all down with injuries,



was a real body-blow. Things became even more crucial with Colin Webster having to miss the match because of a sudden chill — an emergency which resulted in reserve winger Johnny Scott having to make a six-hour car trip from Manchester to reach the ground an hour before the kick-off!

So Hibs were able to avenge that 3-1 defeat by United on the same ground last November to bring the record for the six post-war games between the rivals to two wins each, and two draws. These were the teams:

Finally, good luck to Roger Byrne, chosen at left-back for England against Denmark in Copenhagen to-morrow, and hard luck for Duncan Edwards, who had to miss last Wednesday's "B" international with Denmark at Portsmouth, following a heavy chill.

In the second half with the wind in their favour our boys pressed repeatedly and made several good openings which were not accepted.
