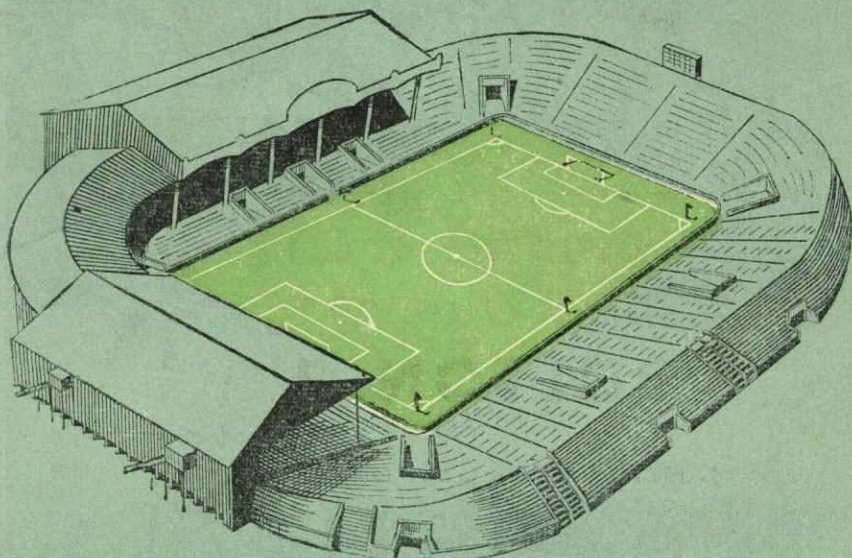

THAT ELUSIVE AWAY WIN

CITY's first away win of the season is indeed elusive. Certainly it is not for want of trying, but opponents seem to have a knack of equalising or winning in the closing stages, and so poor City come home frustrated!

Consider some of the results this season. Stephenson equalised for Burnley at Turf Moor in the 85th minute; Harris did the same for Everton at Goodison in the 87th; Boyd scored Birmingham's winner at St. Andrew's in the 88th; and Connor got Huddersfield's equaliser in the 70th.

Carrying the frustration story still further, there was Dunmore's winner for Spurs at Maine Road in the 89th minute, and Queen's for Rangers in the floodlit game at Maine Road with only five minutes to go. Definitely instances of better late than never so far as opponents are concerned, and it is to be hoped they won't carry on indefinitely.

Thanks to a splendid rally in the second half, City last Saturday seemed assured of their first away League win since they were at Old Trafford last February. Then an unfortunate lapse by Bill Leivers led to Burnley's belated equaliser which, incidentally, took them through their eleventh consecutive game without defeat.

Leivers nevertheless need lose neither heart nor sleep over the lapse. He has more than justified his promotion, and has played a leading part in recent defensive improvement.

Transfer news again has figured prominently in City gossip this week, and the requests of Ken Branagan (refused) and Bill Spurdle (granted) following upon that of Don Revie have given the critics plenty to "chew over."

Transfer stories inevitably make news—of varying importance—and there is nothing wrong in that provided they are presented in the proper perspective and are not exaggerated to suggest wholesale dissatisfaction "below stairs."

Good team spirit

Collectively, the team and club spirit is as good as ever it was, and that point cannot be stressed too strongly. Players who have grievances are no more unique than employees in industry, and if for any reason they are dissatisfied or unhappy, then the request for a move is a natural sequence.

Sometimes the player changes his mind—which is a good thing—but if he insists, then the club have no alternative but to grant the request. A player who is not content is of use neither to club nor himself.

But no useful purpose can ever be served by exaggerated rumours of trouble where no trouble, in fact, exists.

I NEVER see the name "Luton Town" these days without recalling, with a mixture of pleasurable and painful memory, Manchester City's fifth round F.A. Cup victory at Luton last season.

The whole of Britain at the time was locked in an icy grip, but I'll swear there was no colder spot in the country than Luton.

Snow had been falling throughout the night and it was with no high hopes of City's chances that I drove to the ground with manager Les McDowall early on that bitter Saturday morning to inspect the pitch.

RIDING HIGH

Luton were riding high on a Second Division success wave. They had not been beaten at home for months and had already virtually reserved that place in the First Division which they now so deservedly occupy. In addition, the ice-rink conditions seemed all against City's precision-passing plan.

But although playing conditions were bad, there was no doubt that play would be possible and so manager McDowall and myself returned to the hotel. By this time City fans were making their presence felt in the town and it was from one of them that I heard a blindly optimistic remark typical of the faithful club supporter.

I was standing next to a group at the bar when a Luton man said: "I believe this match is being broadcast today." Quick as a flash the City supporter replied, "You want to watch the television on Cup Final day—you'll see Manchester City at Wembley."

I glanced across to see if he meant it. He did. He was deadly serious. As a Mancunian myself, I wished I could share his confidence, but under the circumstances I could

only see City's Wembley trail ending at frozen Luton.

It is history now that the Blues justified that faithful fan's optimism to the hilt. A brilliant defence withstood an opening thrill-packed 30 minute blitz by Luton, then gradually the plan began to click and carve holes in the home defence for City to run out winners through two goals by Roy Clarke.

This was revenge in full for the 5-1 Cup drubbing received at Luton in 1953. Luton will be looking for their revenge today, but this time, whatever the result, I hope it keeps fine for all of us.

"WHERE'S t' Cup?" suddenly exclaimed Frank Swift, interrupting our teatime tete-a-tete with the matron of a hospital for Services' patients at Portsmouth. After a lengthy argument as to which of the pair of us had had it last, and where, Frank and I retraced our tour of the wards in search of the "Owd Tin Pot."

Just as we were reaching the mental state of imagining headlines like "International loses F.A. Cup" an attractive A.T.S. lass in a fetching pink bed-jacket, from the other end of the ward, shouted: "Don't leave me, Frank. It's here, under the bed."

Any Cup-winning medallist has dozens of F.A. Cup adventure stories to tell, but here are a few to illustrate the tremendous amount of good the Cup radiates long after its cash-and-glory departure from Wembley.

The year Derby County were successful I was given permission to take the trophy to a Leeds hospital for ex-Service lads who had lost limbs. On arrival I discovered that although operations on two Derby fellows had been delayed to give them an opportunity of seeing the Cup the surgeon couldn't hold up proceedings any longer and one was already under the anaesthetic.

The lucky one—if you can apply that word to a fellow about to have his leg lopped—wore a broad smile as he caressed the Cup and when finally they wheeled him in, he said, "Good old Raich, Peter and Jackie. Now they can take my ruddy head off."

Later that afternoon I waited for the other Derby chap to come round, but he didn't seem in any hurry, so the up-and-about patients stood the Cup on his tummy, placed the lid at a rakish angle on his head, and with due ceremony crowned him "King Unconscious."

At another hospital I visited, a charming blonde radiologist thought up the idea of having the F.A. Cup X-Rayed. Back came the photographs with a typed report, which read: "Organically sound, but slight traces of alcohol."

Yes, the Cup has given considerable pleasure to many in adversity. It is giving pleasure to many thousands watching today's struggles to be included in the big draw on Monday.



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Maine Road Gossip

WELL DONE LUTON!

IN welcoming Luton Town to Moss Side today, I feel we should congratulate them on the splendid show they have put up this season. They have more than justified their promotion to the First Division for the first time in their history, and their current form and League position suggest they may not be far from the top at the end of the season.

BUT City need not be pessimistic about today's meeting since most of Luton's "plundering" has been done on their own ground, where Sunderland were hit for eight and Wolves for five—amazing results judged by any standards.

ON tour, Luton won at Everton and Huddersfield, and drew at Portsmouth, Birmingham and Charlton.

LAST time the clubs met in League football was in the Second Division in 1950-51 when the result was 1-1 at Main Road, and 2-2 at Luton but, of course, they are almost "old enemies" in the F.A. Cup.

IT was 2-1 for City in the fifth round at home in 1935-36; 3-1 for City at Luton two years later; 5-1 for the "Hatters" at Kenilworth Road in 1952-53 after a 1-1 draw at Maine Road; and, of course, City won 2-0 at Luton last year on the road to the Final.

LUTON certainly have come a long way since the old Southern League days. They became a Football League club in 1897-98, but soon returned to the Southern League and it was not until the Third Division was formed that they again found a "place in the sun," although it took them until 1936-37 to again win promotion.

* OUR VISITORS *

TODAY we welcome Luton Town whose team probably will be selected from the following players:—

RON BAYNHAM (goalkeeper).—Signed from Worcester City for £1,500 in 1951 on a recommendation by Sid Owen, the Luton captain. Selected to play for England against Denmark without previous representative match experience. Goalkeeper of all-round ability.

SEAMUS DUNNE (right back).—Ire international signed from Shelbourne, and made his League debut in 1951. Very fast and a determined tackler who distributes the ball well.

BUD AHERNE (left back).—Has played for both Ire and Ireland. Represented the Irish League whilst playing for Belfast, from whom Luton signed him in March, 1949, for £8,000.

JIM PEMBERTON (right half).—One of the longest serving players on the books. Joined the "Hatters" from Stourbridge in 1947. Has appeared at full back and in the forward line.

SID OWEN (centre half).—Joined Luton from Birmingham City in 1947 as a wing half back, but since then has become one of the outstanding centre-halves in the country. Toured Australia with the F.A. in 1950, and graduated from the England "B" side to full honours against Yugoslavia and Uruguay in 1954.

WALLY SHANKS (left half).—A Scot who crossed the border to join Chelsea. Was not long at Stamford Bridge before Luton signed him in 1947.

MICHAEL CULLEN (outside right).—Another player from across the border recommended to Luton by a Scottish scout who found

him playing with junior Glasgow side in 1949.

BOB MORTON (inside right).—A Luton product from local football who has hit the tops. Once rated as a half-back of international class, but centre forward problems at Kenilworth Road caused manager Duncan to move him into the attack.

PETER McEWAN (centre forward).—Born Roodeport, Transvaal. Went straight into Luton's first team on arrival from South Africa last year. His goals towards the end of the season helped considerably in gaining promotion.

REG PEARCE (inside left).—Signed from Winsford United, the Cheshire League side, in November 1954. Since his recommendation by Luton's Northern scout, he has developed into a utility player.

JIMMY ADAM (outside left).—Fast and clever Scottish player who joined Luton from Spennymoor United in 1953. Has been in good form, and is a regular scorer.

JOHN GROVES (inside forward).—Son of Arthur Groves, who played for Derby County with manager Duncan. First watched by Luton in a schoolboy game for Derbyshire, and was signed directly afterwards in 1950.

GORDON TURNER (inside right).—Has scored many goals for Luton, and played a major part in the club's promotion to the First Division last season.

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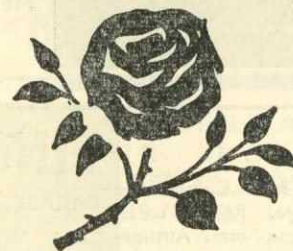

FORD HIT CITY FOR FOUR

CAN you tell me, please, if Trevor Ford ever scored four goals in a match against City at Maine Road?—P.D., Moss Side.

We can—he did! On November 1st 1952, when Sunderland beat City by 5-2; Ford scored in the third, fifth, 30th and 50th minutes, the last from a penalty. Kirtley scored the fifth five minutes later.

HAS Jimmy Meadows played in more positions for City than Billy Spurdle?—DENIS COGHILL, Higher Blackley.

Jimmy has played in seven positions to Billy's six. Jimmy, signed from Southport in March, 1951, was originally an outside right and was subsequently tried at centre forward, centre half, left back, inside right, inside left and finally right back. And look what happened in the end—an England cap. And he'll get some more when he's fit again.

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IS the Jimmy Gunning who signed for Stockport County recently the old Hibernian player?—EXILED SCOT, Wythenshawe.

He is, but it was more or less a flying visit to Stockport since he joined Buxton shortly afterwards.

I NOTICE than when the draw is made for the various rounds of the F.A. Cup, details are always given of previous meetings between the clubs—if any. Are there any clubs in the First Division this season whom City have never met in the Cup?—CURIOUS, Davyhulme.

Only Blackpool. And to settle one or two other similar queries City have yet to meet Liverpool in the competition. But who knows what will happen on Monday when the draw is made for the third round?

ARE you allowed to answer a question that isn't about football? If you are, could you tell me who played the title role in "The Hunchback of Notre Dame" many years ago?—GEORGE WILSON, Ardwick.

I think we can stretch a point in your case, George, but don't make a habit of it! We're still young enough to remember that great actor Lon Chaney playing the part—and what a part!

AS a Westcountryman now living in Cheshire, I'm pleased to see Bristol City doing so well. How long is it since last they were in the First Division?—F. R. TOMLINSON, Stalybridge.

Welcome to the frozen North! You may yet see Bristol City at Moss Side! They were relegated from Division I with Nottingham Forest in 1911, and have never been back.
