LINES FROM THE PAVILION

WE knew Christmas would be an arduous one for our team with the Yuletide programme consisting of matches with Birmingham City, last season's Second Division champions, and Luton Town, who won promotion along with them. Both teams have adapted themselves to the higher grade very well and, so far, have steered clear of those anxieties which attend those in the lower regions of the table.

Birmingham City had won four home matches off the reel as follows: Manchester City 4-3; Chelsea 3-0; Huddersfield Town 5-0 and Arsenal 4-0. And as St. Andrews could scarcely be called one of Sheffield United's lucky grounds hopes of a win there on Saturday did not run high. We hope, however, that if defeat was United's portion—this programme had to be prepared well before the match—your Christmas Day was not spoilt. Whatever the result the "boys" will go all out this afternoon to make your Boxing Day a happy one!

It was encouraging that Joe Shaw, our captain, and Derek Hawksworth were able to start training in earnest a week ago. We are not so well blessed with talent that we could lose two such men from the active list without feeling it. Derek has been off with a damaged shoulder for months. Indeed, he became laid up after the second League match of the season.

Again, Peter Wragg has been ailing with appendices suspected. That was why he missed the match with Newcastle on December 17th, though he did some training last week.

The victory over Newcastle was most welcome following the sequence of six matches which had produced only one point. It was deserved, no doubt about that, and it would have been more pronounced than by 2-1 if all scoring chances had been accepted, particularly in the first half during which our team held the initiative for long periods.

United made Newcastle look a very

ordinary side for quite an hour and when the attack tapered off our defence shouldered its tasks manfully and prevented Newcastle from snatching the point they strove so hard to get. Ted Burgin made some brilliant saves. Howard Johnson was a tower of strength against Keeble.

When Luton were here in March, 1953, the result was a 1-1 draw. Gordon Turner gave Luton the lead in the 79th minute, but five minutes later Harold Brook equalised. Our home record against the "Hatters" is useful. We beat them 3-0 here in August, 1951, Brook scoring twice and Hitchen once before half time.

Next Saturday, we end the old year with a home match with West Bromwich Albion and we hope there will be a big attendance to give United wholehearted backing. Albion are not the power of old and, prior to the holidays, had lost no fewer than six away matches in a row even failing to score in four of them. Their average goal concessions were two goals per match. So, if United can find punch to crown their rapid advances, they may well succeed.

We trust that they will because there is a hard road to travel before we reach safer quarters in the First Division. Every match is vital; goals, and plenty of them, a necessity.

The reserve team holds a useful position in the Central League despite the 3-2 setback at The Hawthorns against West Bromwich Albion Reserves. That well-known and experienced forward, Nicholls, twice put Albion in front. Twice United drew level through goals by Hawksworth and that promising forward, Woodcock. Two minutes from time, however, Williams placed Albion in front for the third time.

It is gratifying to see the Yorkshire League and Northern Intermediate League teams giving good accounts of themselves. Several of the youngsters suggest that they will become valuable assets so well are they responding to coaching and experience.

MEMORY CORNER

OUR picture today is of one of the most popular players Sheffield United have had on their books—Bernard Wilkinson. Alas! there has been only one Bernard Wilkinson. Indeed, you seldom come across the breed today. A centre half back of the Tom Thumb class, he was graphically described as a mighty atom. Bernard was a sportsman to the core, a

born fighter; a fighter on the cricket field as well as on the football field; a man, who by his intense loyalty, enthusiasm and outstanding ability was a great box-office attraction.

For a man of his limited inches he was really amazing. His fine judgment and timing when jumping to head a ball minimised his lack of height; his speed was striking. As strong as an ox, he was a formidable tackler and possessing expert ball control, he invariably used the ball to advantage.

He played in the days when centre half backs were not tied down as defensive units pure and simple but played their part as attackers. For 20 yards he was as fast as any half back the game has known. He played for England against Scotland in 1904. That was the year when Sheffield United had no fewer than 14 International players on the books, though they never actually fielded a team of internationals. Ten was the highest number to turn out together in a match. The twelve were:

We fear there are no survivors of that famous dozen. Bernard died a year or two ago; he was the last one remaining with us.

He joined United from Thorpe Hesley. As a cricketer for Sheffield United in the Yorkshire Council team, he played for many years as an all-rounder. As a batsman he was of the Gilbert Jessop school, a mighty hitter. No Council batsman drove the ball harder than Bernard, who often drove balls out of the ground. He once smashed a window in a large furnishing shop in Bramall Lane.

He was offered a place in the Yorkshire county eleven, but did not accept it as he had become associated with a successful business.

His brother, W. H. Wilkinson, played for Yorkshire for some years and was last reported to be well in health in Birmingham, where he went to play in League cricket after leaving Yorkshire.

OUR VISITORS

LUTON TOWN finished second in the Second Division table last season and won promotion to the First Division only by virtue of a goal-average superior to that of Rotherham United. They have proved, however, quite a potent force in the Upper House and, as we write, are among the first six teams. Consider some of their outstanding performances.

In October, they defeated the strong Blackpool team 3-1 at Kenilworth Road and a month later won their home match with Wolverhampton Wanderers 5-1. Then, a fortnight later, they trounced the mighty Sunderland by 8-2, Bob Morton doing the hat-trick and Gordon Turner collecting another couple of goals. Subsequently, they registered a good 2-1 win against Charlton Athletic.

Manager Dally Duncan—what a glorious left winger he was in his playing days!—has built up a formidable combination. It is true, they have had half-a-dozen or so reverses away; nevertheless, they beat Everton 1-0 at Goodison Park and they held Birmingham City to a goal-less draw at St. Andrews; also Portsmouth at Fratton Park.

The Luton club was founded in 1885 and in the early days the players wore blue and pink caps. They were an amateur organisation for five years and then it was decided to offer three players 5s. a week. In 1891, the whole team became professionals, 2s. 6d. being paid for a home match and 3s. for an away match. The players also received pay for lost time up to noon on a Saturday.

In that way Luton became the pioneers of professionalism in the South, though the distinction is often credited to Arsenal.

Luton were originally members of the old Southern League and of the Third Division (South). They had, however, three seasons in the Second Division, 1897-8, 1998-9 and 1899-1900, but then found the opposition too strong.

They returned to the Second Division when they won the Southern Section championship in 1936-7 and now are proud members of the First Division with every prospect of consolidating their hard-earned status. Lines on present players:—

RON BAYNHAM. Goalkeeper. Native of Birmingham, Baynham was obtained from Worcester City and soon proved his worth. He made his League debut in season 1952-53 and his claims were such that he eventually displaced International goalkeeper Bernard Streten. He attracted England selectors last season, got on their list, received honours and kept goal for England against Spain last month. He is 6 feet 1 inch tall.

SEAMUS DUNNE. Right back. Eire International, who has been a stalwart in Town's defence and did not miss a match in last season's promotion race. Native of Wicklow, he reached Luton in 1950 after having had experience with Drogheda United. Strong, challenging defender.

THOMAS AHERNE. Left back. Irish International, a man of Limerick, who played for Belfast Celtic before joining Luton in 1949. He, too, was an ever-present last season.

JIM PEMBERTON. Right half. Went to Luton as an inside forward from Stourbridge in 1949, but as a utility man has qualifications for he has played as a back, inside forward and winger.

SID OWEN. Centre half. Long a first-class pivot. Town got a bargain when the secured him from Birmingham City. First a wing half, he was moved to the middle with marked success. Toured Australia with the F.A. team in 1950 and subsequently secured England B honours, while last year he played for England against Yugoslavia and Uruguay. A six-footer.

WALLY SHANKS. Left half. Born in Valetta, Malta, of Scottish parents, Shanks is very versatile. He joined Luton as an outside right, but can play on the left and is a useful inside forward, though now a wing half. Previously on Chelsea's books, he went to Luton on a month's trial—and stayed. Helped them to reach the First Division last season.

ROY DAVIES. Outside Right. A South African, who was born in Port Elizabeth. Luton secured his transfer from Clyde in May, 1951. A winger of thrust and shooting ability, he scored 10 goals last season.

GORDON TURNER. Inside right. His father played for Hull City alongside Luton manager, Dally Duncan. Was born at Hull and was originally a wing half. But last season he made a big hit as an inside forward. An ever-present, he scored 32 goals—a very material contribution to Luton's promotion success. Has had representative honours.

BOB MORTON. Centre forward. A local from Aston Clinton, Bucks. Signed professional in 1946 and made the most of his big opportunity when Jesse Pye moved to Derby County.

GEORGE CUMMINS. Inside left. Native of Dublin, Cummins signed for Everton in 1950 and helped them to reach F.A. Cup semi-final. Luton obtained his transfer at a big fee in 1953. Another Eire International.

MICHAEL CULLEN. Outside left. Scot who threw in his lot with Luton in 1952 after having played for Douglasdale Juniors. Can play equally well at outside right.
