

GIVE BERT A CHANCE

THE Christmas holiday football programme proved one of the worst of all time from a weather point of view. Attendances, already well down this season, took another plunge, and those clubs who have a good run in the F.A. Cup are going to find themselves with a congested fixture list. Dreaming of a white Christmas indeed !

In every respect, it was a most disappointing period for City. They got away to an unpropitious start on Saturday when they arrived at London-road station to witness a scene reminiscent of August Bank Holiday or, if history books be accurate, of the storming of the Bastille ! Hopes of train travel were out of the question, but City at least fulfilled their commitments by making alternative arrangements and arriving at Villa Park nearly an hour before the scheduled time for kick-off. It wasn't their fault there was no play. In view of the weather, they did well to get to Birmingham at all.

Loss of four points to Bolton Wanderers was unexpected, and was the more unpalatable in view of City's "double" twelve months previously. There was not much doubt about it at Maine road,

but at Burnden, City were a trifle unlucky not to share the points. They had their chances, and for long spells played the better football, although not for the first time their finishing was below standard, and Hopkinson in the Bolton goal made some first-class saves.

It was unfortunate that Bert Trautmann misjudged Stevens' shot on Boxing Day not so much because it cost City the match, but because it gave certain critics another chance to have a "crack" at City for bringing back Bert far too soon.

Why anybody should suppose Bert would be any different had he been re-called say in February is difficult to say. Obviously if he is passed fit, the best thing to do is get him back in action as soon as possible. A man of Trautmann's qualities and ability cannot expect to regain confidence by staying in the reserve side indefinitely. Nor can he be expected, having arrived back in the League side, to perform at once as if nothing had happened to him.

It is to be regretted, of course, that Bert has not yet been on the winning side, and that City are six points worse off than they were at the corresponding time last year. But are you going to blame it all on the goalkeeper ? I suggest he is entitled to a little more time and encouragement before being made to "carry the can."

WIN IS OVERDUE

WITHOUT a win since they beat Chelsea, City will be expected to make amends against Luton Town whose only away success this season was at Charlton. The Bedfordshire side have lost seven of their away games, in two of which they conceded five goals.

LAST season when Luton were at Maine-road, City won a hard game by the odd goal of five. Clarke put City ahead in the first minute, but Morton equalised before half-time, and then Ewing put through his own goal. City rallied and scored twice in as many minutes through Hayes and Spurdle.

PREVIOUS meeting between the two clubs was when they were in the Second Division in 1950-51. Luton scored first at Maine-road, but Paul equalised from a penalty. In the return game, Luton scored first again, but City managed to share the points.

CITY have met Luton twice in post-war Cup football. After a 1-1 draw at Maine-road in 1952-53, City were beaten 5-1 at Kenilworth-road, but they were avenged two years later when they won a fifth round tie at Luton by 2-0.

CONGRATULATIONS to City Reserves on their fine holiday successes. They are as now high up the Central League as they have been for a long time.

JOHNNY HART scored a goal on his come-back with the "A" team at Everton on Christmas Day. Good news also about Jimmy Meadows. He has had the strapping taken off his leg, and should be able to do some light training in a few weeks' time.

TODAY we welcome Luton Town whose team probably will be chosen from the following players :—

BERNARD STRETON (goalkeeper).—Holder of both amateur and full England caps. Played with the amateurs while with Shrewsbury and Notts County, and won full recognition in his first season with Luton in 1948.

SEAMUS DUNNE (right back).—Eire international who was signed from Shelbourne in 1951, and came into the Luton League side same year.

BUD AHERNE (left back).—Born in Limerick, he often partnered Dunne in Eire's international side. Also capped for Ireland. Luton signed him from Belfast Celtic early in 1949 for £8,000.

JIM PEMBERTON (right half).—One of Luton's longest-serving players and has been on the books since 1947 when he left Stourbridge. Has appeared as full-back and forward.

SID OWEN (centre half).—Left Birmingham City for Luton as a wing half-back in 1947, but has become one of the outstanding centre halves in the country. Graduated from England 'B' side to win full caps in 1954.

WALLY SHANKS (left half).—Was with Chelsea when Luton signed him in 1947. Played in several positions before settling down at left half, and has been a great asset.

MICHAEL CULLEN (outside right).—Went to Luton, from a junior Glasgow side on the recommendation of a Scottish scout in 1949. Recently this Scottish international asked for a transfer, but changed his mind.


GEORGE MCLEOD (centre forward).—Signed from Scottish junior club in January last year. Has shown great promise in the reserves, and may prove solution to Luton's centre forward problem.

BOB MORTON (inside left).—Luton fans have been asking why this accomplished player has not played for England at wing half or centre forward. Toured South Africa with F.A. last summer.

TONY GREGORY (outside left).—Local product who has played several times for Bedfordshire County. Part-time professional who signed for Luton in May last year.

RON BAYNHAM (goalkeeper).—Jumped into the news when promoted to the England side against Denmark last season. Arrived at Luton from Worcester City, a non-League club.

LESLIE JONES (right back).—Moved to Luton from Wales as a youngster, and Luton have never regretted granting his request for a trial. Signed in October 1950, and has been watched by the Welsh international selectors.

SPORTSMAN'S CORNER

REFEREEING FROM TOUCHLINE

I ENJOY reading your answers to sportsmen's enquiries, but think you should stick to football. That's by the way! Could you tell me if the referee always controlled the game from inside the playing area? —T. H. Heaton Park.

This particular column is open to all sportsmen whatever their interest, and we like to help them with their queries if we can. So far as yours is concerned, in years long since passed the referee complete with whistle and notebook operated outside the actual field of play. From 1891 onwards, he was made to feel more at home by being transferred from the touchline to the

point of fact, that particular team was well known 40-odd years ago and a group picture appears in the official history of the Football Association. It includes Major Buckley, who was associated with Derby County at the time, Captain Woodward (Chelsea) Sheldon (Manchester United and Liverpool) Bullock (Huddersfield Town) and Bell (Southampton).

COULD you tell me when Barne Hudson first played for Salford? I believe it was about Easter 1927.—J. T. Urmston.

Hudson signed for Salford at Easter time 1928, and played his first game for them against Keighley on April 7th that year.

MY pal says Jack Dyson has never scored for City in a League game at Maine Road. Would you put him right please? —TOM HALEY, Carrington.

Certainly, but surprisingly enough he's not far wrong. Since he made his debut last season, Jack has scored 17 League goals, all but two of them away from home. The odd-two were against Sunderland at Maine Road on April 2nd last when City won 4-2.

CUP REVENGE?

IT was one of those intriguing features of the third round F.A. Cup draw which makes the competition the attraction it is that Manchester City should be drawn against Newcastle United.

Thus, the two teams who met at the end of the Wembley road only two seasons ago now clash at the beginning—and, doubtless, City's eagerness to win at Newcastle next week will be increased by memories of that tragic Cup Final of 1955 when, after fighting back with 10 men to get on level terms at half time they found the wide open spaces of Wembley too much for them in the second half and ultimately finished a well-beaten side.

What are the chances of revenge next Saturday? Writing so far in advance and with Newcastle due to play again on New Year's Day the constitution of the United side can only be guessed at but if it is anything like the same team I saw play Bolton at Burnden Park recently it will contain a sizable proportion of the winning Wembley line-up.

Milburn, who scored that first-minute shock goal in the 1955 Final should be facing City again as should Mitchell, the left winger who first tantalised Jimmy Meadows into making that disastrous turn and then later scored Newcastle's second goal and made the third. Jimmy Scouler, whose tactical game in the second

half at Wembley really clinched the match for Newcastle, is another who, barring injury, seems certain to line-up against City again.

City, of course, have already won at St. James Park this season, a fact which ceased even mildly to surprise me after I had seen Newcastle play against Bolton. Milburn was strangely ineffective at Burnden Park, Mitchell was barely a shadow of the dazzling winger we saw at Wembley and the Newcastle team as a whole lacked that purposeful touch which has made them such famous cup-fighters since the war.

But it would be wrong to draw hasty conclusions from that form. The team is well endowed with talent and when it clicks, as it did in last week's resounding 6-2 win over Sunderland and 5-2 victory over West Brom., it is capable of top class Soccer. The Cup seems to bring the best out of Newcastle, but it is true that it seems to do the same for City and I say the Blues can force a draw next Saturday. If they do I would strongly fancy their chances of winning the replay.

LET'S HAVE MORE COLOUR

IT is generally agreed that soccer needs brightening up and that too many clubs involved in this great game have fallen into a rut, with the consequent stifling of all individualism. Football could do with more colour . . . and it would not be a bad idea to start with the shirts worn by players in the First and Second Divisions.

I have been checking up on the colours worn by the 44 leading teams in the country—and, as I suspected, more than half of them are quite satisfied to turn out in red, or royal blue, or white, shirts.

Distinctive

No fewer than 10 clubs in the First and Second Divisions wear red shirts, eight settle for white, and seven sport Royal blue. Is it any wonder that it is the regular practice for so many to change shirts when playing in away matches?

I applaud Manchester City for the distinctive, and so smart, pale blue strip which has been associated with Maine Road for so many years. Praise too, to Wolves and Blackpool for endeavouring to get away from the inevitable red, white and blue.

Plymouth Argyle (emerald green shirts with black collars and cuffs) were, I believe, the only English club to favour green before the war. They too believed in getting out of

the rut . . . and Argyle's turn-out was admired wherever they played.

Away with monotony. Let us have a team wearing green and yellow hoops, another with orange and black quarters, another in all black from top to toe—even if it does put the referee and linesmen to some inconvenience!

A few years ago, a reader sent me his complete list of suggested shirts for football clubs . . . all 92 of them being different. Blackpool players were recommended to wear the Tower on their chests, Arsenal a massive cannon, Northampton Town a pair of boots and Grimsby Town a fish, though the species was not mentioned.

Wouldn't Bite

I thought enough of his idea to print it, even though the clubs would not accept the bait . . . not even Grimsby Town.
