## EVERTONIA

### OUR VISITORS.

Welcome to Luton Town, visitors to Goodison Park today.

The 'Hatters' have had their ups and downs since their formation but have certainly established themselves as a First Division Club since they won promotion in season 1954-55.

They are having a successful season and, from all accounts, have been playing very attractive football. It was a great surprise to most people when they were so convincingly defeated by Stockport County in the 3rd Round of the F.A. Cup.

We trust that today's game will prove as entertaining and thrilling as the corresponding one at Kenilworth Road in the early part of the season when we just got home by the narrow margin of one goal to nil.

### FLOODLIT GAMES.

We would like to bring to the notice of our supporters two attractive friendly fixtures which have been arranged and will be staged under the Goodison Park lights. These matches are against Racing Club de Paris and Shamrock Rovers.

The fixture against the Irish Club will take place on Wednesday, 19th March and our French visitors will be here probably towards the end of February.

### INJURIES.

A number of players are still recovering from injuries received during and since the Christmas period.

George Kirby and Bert Llewellyn continue to make good progress from their operations and we are hoping that they will be able to resume playing shortly.

Ken Rea, Jimmy Tansey and John Clayton have also progressed very well from their injuries received recently and we are hopeful that all three players will be able to have try-outs today.

The unfortunate ankle injuries sustained by both Jack Keeley and Derek Temple in the first half on Wednesday evening against Blackburn Rovers have added to the complications of team selection. However, we are hoping that neither injury will prove too troublesome and that both players will be in action again very shortly.

## LUTON TOWN

Welcome to the "Babes" of the First Division and yet who were the pioneers of professional football in the south of England. Yes, the Town which grew out of clubs named Excelsior and Wanderers were the first to have an all professional team. It did not cost much you know, but . . . it was a start. In 1890 three players were offered five shillings a week, and a year later the entire team became professional, the players receiving 2s. 6d. for a home game and 3s. for an away game. Just to encourage the local lads to play for the local club they were paid double money. In 1958 a few shillings does not seem anything but a pittance, but money was really worth something in those days and there were no grumbles. If anyone mentioned to you that Luton Town had won a cup-tie at Wembley no doubt you would disbelieve them but it would be true. You see in their early days Luton had a cup-tie against Old Westminsters and the game was played at Wembley which was no more than a village. Yes, Luton won. We presume that it is only typical of the town itself that Luton should have set the fashion for players wearing coloured caps similar to cricket caps. Luton is known for its hatters, and in keeping with the town the early Luton players turned out in pink and blue caps! Luton Town became one of the nine founder members of the old Southern League, in 1894-5 finishing runners-up to Millwall Athletic the same positions being occupied the following season. Luton were dropped from the Southern League, and in 1897-8 they were elected to the Football League Second Division, finishing eighth of 16 to Burnley. By the end of season 1899-1900 Luton lost their place finishing second from bottom, and they returned to the Southern League to join such as West Ham, Portsmouth and Tottenham Hotspur.

Apparently the rulers of Luton at the time could not make up their minds about colours. They had started with pink and blue, then to cochineal, and around 1904 to blue. There was no change again until after World War One when Luton with the other Southern League clubs were made associate members of the Football League and became the Third Division (Southern Section). Then Town decided upon the present "strip" of white with black knickers. Life for Luton in the Southern League had not been without misfortune for at the end of season 1911-12 they were, with Leyton, relegated into the Second Division, Portsmouth and Merthyr Town taking their places. It was not until the end of 1913-14 season that they got back either. Town had a bit of a fright in 1919-20 for they contrived by one point to keep ahead of the two bottom clubs Merthyr Town and Gillingham, but it was all right for all clubs seeing that they went over in 1920 to the League. Luton always were a useful but hardly a prominent Southern Section club until the mid-thirties and then they began to make an impression. In 1935-6 Town were runners-up to Coventry City missing promotion by a point, but there was ample compensation in 1936-7 when Luton had two points to spare over Notts County and so returned to the Second Division after a lapse of 37 years. For eight seasons Luton never were really concerned in the second step upwards to the "Upper Circle," but six years ago began to play so well that rivals labelled them as "dangerous." The rivals knew something for by the end of 1952-3 season Luton were there in third place. The following season Luton were sixth to Leicester and ourselves, but in 1954-5 the promotion prize was won in a "photo finish" with Birmingham City and Rotherham United. Goal-average settled it with City first and Luton second. In the First Division, Town have become renowned as one of the most-consistent home teams.

If anyone has any doubts about Luton's ability to do well at their Kenilworth Road ground then reflect on Luton 8, Sunderland 2; Luton 5, Wolves 1; Luton 4, Newcastle United 1; Luton 6, Sunderland 2, and you'll understand why most teams fear a trip to Bedfordshire. Today Luton have a splendid team under Manager Dally Duncan, the former Scotland and Derby County star and with Jack Crompton, the former Manchester United goalkeeper, as his trainer. We have two ties with Town, for our trainer, Harry Wright, joined us from Luton, and it was to Town that we transferred the Eire internationalist, George Cummins. Luton boast England players in Ron Baynham, Bob Morton and Gordon Turner, and in the past had many famous men on their books. The brothers Bob and Fred Hawkes were mighty stars of the early days of this century and a descendant of their's is now playing with the club. What a great tribute it was to Luton ability when in 1922 for the England v. Ireland international, Luton provided three forwards to the game. Yes, Ernie Sims played centre forward for England and Alan Matheson and Louis Bookman formed the left wing for Ireland. For the record the result was 1-1. The men behind Luton do a tremendous job willingly and successfully for they have a small ground judged by First Division standards and have to exist on low gates. Why the ground record is only 28,433 and that for a cup-tie against Arsenal.

## Pen Pictures Of The Luton Town Players

**R. BAYNHAM (Goalkeeper).** In his seventh season with the Club. Secured from Southern League club, Worcester City. Has represented England on several occasions including their matches versus Denmark in Copenhagen, Ireland and Spain. Played for the Football League versus the League of Ireland on two occasions and also for the England "B" team versus Yugoslavia "B."

**S. DUNNE (Right Back).** Born in Limerick, Eire. Came to Luton from Shelbourne F.C. in May, 1950. Has played for his country on several occasions and was recently chosen to captain the Eire team versus Denmark.

**K. HAWKES (Left Back).** A product of North Eastern football, he joined the Town in 1951 from Shotton Colliery Welfare and was signed after a trial in one of our teams. Made his debut in League football on 14th December, 1957, against West Bromwich Albion. Has a younger brother also a professional with Luton.

**R. MORTON (Right Half).** Local born. Has been with the Club since 1946. Played for England "B" versus the Switzerland "B" team, the Football Combination versus the Army. Was chosen as reserve for England versus Ireland at Wembley in November, 1955, and recently played for the Football Combination versus the Dutch XI in Amsterdam. A brilliant wing-half who has made several appearances at centre forward. Was a member of the F.A. party which toured South Africa in the summer of 1956.

**S. OWEN (Centre Half).** Captain of the side. Previously with Birmingham City. Has been with the F.A. Touring party on three occasions—to Australia, the West Indies and South Africa. Was a member of the Football League team which played in Copenhagen in May, 1953, and was in the England party in Switzerland for the World Cup games in 1954. Is a qualified F.A. Coach and coaches the younger players of the club.

**R. PEARCE (Left Half).** Signed from Winsford United in November, 1954. Has proved himself a utility player in both the forward and half-back lines. Occupied the left half position during the latter part of last season and has continued this season with a series of brilliant displays. Played for the Football League versus the League of Ireland and also for the Football Association versus the Army in October, 1957.

**J. ADAM (Outside Right).** Recommended by our North Eastern scout and signed from the Northern club Spennymore United in June, 1953. Can get quickly off the mark and is always a potential danger.

**G. TURNER (Inside Right).** Came to Luton as a wing-half upon his demobilisation from the Navy in 1950 but found his true position at inside right. In season 1954-54 he broke the Club's individual goal-scoring record since their promotion to the Second Division with 37 goals. Was again the Club's leading marksman last season. Represented the English League v. the Scottish League in October, 1955.

**A. BROWN (Inside Left or Centre Forward).** Secured from Blackpool for five figure fee in February, 1957. A Scottish international who made his debut for the town at Leeds in last season scoring the winning goal. Was very unlucky, missing two Cup Finals through injury while playing with Blackpool.

**G. CUMMINS (Inside Left).** An Irishman from Dublin. Cummins first crossed to sign for Everton in 1950 and it was from the Merseyside club that Luton secured him for a big fee in 1953. A brilliant ball player. He has already played for Eire on several occasions, including their matches with Luxembourg, Norway, Yugoslavia, Spain and Denmark.

**J. GROVES (Wing Half or Inside Forward).** Son of Arthur Groves, the old Derby County inside forward. Won Derbyshire Schoolboy honours and signed by Luton when only 15. Plays either inside or wing-forward.

**G. McLEOD (Forward).** Born in Inverness, Scotland, where he played for Clachnacudin. Following a recommendation we sent our North Eastern scout to watch him and as a result he was signed for Luton in January, 1955.






