

Good Evening, Ladies & Gentlemen,

On Saturday last, we made the long journey to Exeter City in search of League points. Dick Spiers came into the side at left half back in place of Tommy Cronin, this being the only change in the team.

The ground was very hard and a strong wind was blowing from goal to goal. In the opening half we had the advantage of the elements and did most of the attacking. After some twenty five minutes play we took the lead, when a through ball from Tommy Dixon found Jimmy Wheeler, who took the ball in and as the keeper came out, lobbed it over his head into the net.

We had several chances and also "near misses" but at half time we still led by the only goal scored.

In the second half with the wind behind them, Exeter City had most of the game and it appeared from the touch lines only a matter of time before they scored. However, our defence held out for some seventy five minutes although they were never the compact force they had been in previous games, and it was no surprise at all when they equalised. Our attack was very seldom in the picture and was most disjointed but collecting a point away from home was highly satisfactory and in spite of everything, we are still in with a chance.

Our Football Combination side entertained Ipswich Town and were defeated by four goals to nil.

Conditions here were somewhat similar to those at Exeter and were not conducive to good football. Our side which included three amateur players, did not have one of their best games, and on the day's play, victory went to the better team.

The 'A' team met Newport Res. at Basingstoke, and won a hard game by two goals to one, against a very strong side.

It is very pleasing to note that our 'A' team have won their last three matches and every credit must go to them in their fight to avoid relegation.


