

I know that they will give us a good and skilful game, and I hope that the weather is not so "Novemberish" as it was last Saturday!




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

GRANADA TV SPORTS COMMENTATOR RECALLS

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The picture on your television screen invariably tells an interesting story. But the story behind the picture can be even more exciting as I found on two visits to Old Trafford to commentate big matches for Granada Television.

April 25th, 1957. A milestone in United's incredible attempt to lift the Triple Crown of F.A. Cup, League championship and European Cup.

Real Madrid, famous, fabulous Spanish stars, were visitors for the second leg of the European Cup semi-final. United, 3-1 losers in the Madrid first leg two weeks earlier, were confident they could pull through on aggregate.

For weeks we planned our coverage of this event. Time schedules were carefully planned, technical details checked and rechecked. I had even flown to Madrid to see the first game and learn the complete background of Di Stefano and Co.

I'm sure you'll recall the atmosphere round Old Trafford that night. I think it has only been matched by the post-Munich games against Sheffield Wednesday and West Brom.

On the way to Old Trafford the side of my new car was smashed in by a van. A little shaken I climbed to the specially constructed studio and commentary position at the Manchester end.

Everything seemed fine as a last check was made for the two-hour show. It seemed nothing could go wrong. But we hadn't reckoned the referee would start the game a few minutes early.

That threw out our timings completely. Elaborate pre-match filming had to be ditched. We had a false start . . . then the waiting millions

joined the packed ground to watch United's courageous fight.

Yes, that was quite a night.

So to January of this year when with the Travelling Eye unit I was again at Old Trafford. Another European Cup game, this time against Red Star Belgrade.

We were to cover the second half but right through earlier play visibility got worse and worse. As the players went off for the interval I could only see forty yards.

"It's hopeless, we can't cover in this fog," the message flashed back to the studio. "We're coming over for a few minutes anyway" was the reply.

So for ten minutes I had to review a first half which had left us almost pop-eyed as we strained to follow the ball. Ten minutes "off the cuff" is never easy . . . and all the tougher with ten million pairs of eyes on you.

Visibility improved a bit after the second half start and special apparatus in the cameras gave viewers more of the action than spectators on the touchline could see.

I had to change my commentary style and talk twice as much as usual to supplement the picture. It was a challenge . . . which won us congratulations.

Memorable games . . . wonderful occasions . . . despite those problems. I hope there are many more Old Trafford visits to come in the near future.

The displays given by United's reserve side this season are most praiseworthy and encouraging, because they are perhaps the team hardest hit by the consequences of the Munich crash and the rebuilding efforts.

But they have knit together splendidly, and although the personnel of the team has not been greatly strengthened this season they have continued the good work, and at the moment of writing are well placed in the table with 22 points from 18 games.

The experience of Stan Crowther, the brilliance of Mark Pearson and the scientific work of Warren Bradley (before his elevation to the first team) have added a great deal, but players like Harrop, Holland, Carolan and Bratt have more than stood the test.

Shay Brennan has been a most consistent marksman, and is the team's only ever-present to date, and the young inside-forward Johnny Giles, who shares the burden of scheming with Pearson, is rapidly developing into an outstanding player.

Time has even been found to give some of the youth team players a run out in more experienced company, and both Norbert Stiles and Tommy Spratt have profited from this.

The team has scored a lot of goals, and some of its victories have been against much older and more experienced opposition. But perhaps their most spectacular game was the Lancashire Cup-tie against Manchester City, a thriller which they won 5-4, and for sheer excitement the best game I have seen since the famous Cup-tie against West Bromwich Albion.

Luton were our Christmas Day visitors last season, but they did not get much of a present from the Reds! They went home that night beaten 3-0, though they did get some consolation the next day with a point from a 2-2 draw.

Luton will always be welcome at Old Trafford. Their sporting gesture in so speedily releasing trainer Jack Crompton after the Munich crash will take some repaying.

Keep an eye on right-half Bob Morton, a player who is on the fringe of international honours. He was reserve against Russia and Ireland for England recently.

If you are weighing up the future of Gordon Turner, Luton's top scorer last season, note that both Middlesbrough and the Hatters strongly denied this week that there was any move between the two clubs in the offing.

Luton playing personalities:

Ron Baynham (goalkeeper).

Capped three times for England three seasons ago. Hails from Birmingham and joined Luton from Worcester City in 1951, making his league debut the following season. Rated one of the most consistent goalkeepers in the country.

Seamus Dunne (full-back).

Product of County Wicklow, signed from Shelbourne in 1950. Has given fine service at right-back and has many international caps for Ireland. Noted for his polished style.

Ken Hawkes (full-back).

Newcomer to Luton's senior side last season. Took his chance when Tommy Ahearne and Leslie Jones were injured. He is a product of North East football. Signed from Shotton Colliery Welfare. Born at Durham.

Bob Morton (half-back).

Local discovery from Aston Clinton, Buckinghamshire, who has developed into a grand utility player. Has figured at centre-forward and centre-half, but looks as if he is going places as a right-half. Has England B honours. Was a member of the F.A. team which toured South Africa and has been England reserve twice so far this season.

Sid Owen (centre-half).

Signed from Birmingham for a modest fee in 1947 and has made a name for his prowess

in the middle and grand service for Luton. Gained three England caps in 1954 and regarded as one of the most consistent centre-halves. Born in Birmingham.

David Pacey (half-back).

A Luton boy who came up through local school football. Made his league debut at Old Trafford last season and did so well that he kept his place for the return match at Luton the next day. Playing well this season — so well that Luton let Reg Pearce go to Sunderland.

Billy Bingham (outside-right).

An Irish boy who left Glentoran for Sunderland in 1950, and the move helped his style so much that he won international honours and has more than twenty caps to his credit. Luton signed him from Sunderland during the last close season. A small and clever winger.

Gordon Turner (inside-forward).

Luton's top scorer for the last three seasons. He is the son of a former Hull City winger and is a native of Hull. Was signed on demob from the Navy in 1950 and was one of the mainstays in Luton's battle for promotion which they won three seasons ago.

Allan Brown (centre-forward).

Former Blackpool and Scottish international who can also play wing-half or inside-forward. He cost Luton a big fee two seasons ago but has been worth every penny. Converted to centre-forward most successfully. Came into English football with Blackpool from East Fife in 1950.

George Cummins (inside-forward).

Irish international signed by Luton in 1953 from Everton. Was a reserve most of last season but has since displaced Groves at inside-left.

Jimmy Adam (outside-left).

Speedy Scot who is equally at home on either wing and was playing on the right-wing last season. He was signed as an outside-left from North Eastern club Spennymoor United six seasons ago and is now back to that position. Born Glasgow.

John Groves (inside-forward).

Son of a former Derby player who was a team-mate of Dally Duncan, Luton's previous manager. Derby signed him straight from school. Made his league debut at inside-right, though can play centre-forward. Lost his place recently.

Tony Gregory (inside-forward).

A youngster waiting for regular promotion. Local player who joined Luton in 1955 and signed full-time professional this year after finishing his apprenticeship in the motor trade. Can play centre-forward as well as inside.



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
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
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UNITED JOTTINGS

You can hardly boast about a 6-3 defeat, but there were several cheering features of this grim fog-bound battle with Bolton.

Warren Bradley for instance made a most impressive debut in the first team and showed clearly that he is going to slip smoothly from amateur ranks into professional football.

Warren soon got his chance in the senior side. He signed professional forms on the Monday and won promotion within five days.

He will be a part-time professional, incidentally the first part-timer in the league side since Bill Foulkes made his bow as a miner and part-time player.

Warren will continue teaching at his school near the ground. He first came to Old Trafford with two other Bishop Auckland amateurs — Bob Hardisty and Derek Lewin — in the emergency shortage of players after the Munich crash.

Then he decided to settle in his home town of Manchester after three years in the R.A.F. in the North East and studying at Durham University.

So Flying Officer Bradley became a flying winger in the Central League side. He has eleven amateur caps for England and was current choice at outside-right.

He told me he had enjoyed his amateur career but realized he could not seriously challenge for a first team place until he signed professional and concentrated on his game with the club.

As it was, international calls and requests to play for three different counties were constantly interrupting his play with the reserves.

The small, bounding Bradley certainly turned in a fine show against England defender Tommy Banks last Saturday. In fact towards the end I



saw Banks switch places with his full-back colleague Hartle in an effort, I think, to subdue the Reds' right wing.

Other pleasing aspects were the improved form of Bobby Charlton who got one of United's goals, and also Alex Dawson who scored a couple of grand goals to end his unlucky run.

Some slow covering in defence let Bolton pile in six, and there is room for more teamwork in attack, but three goals is a fair tally — and a good enough one to win many games.

The Reds came through without injury and with Dennis Viollet playing an excellent game in the reserves — also free of injury — manager Matt Busby can now play around with team selection more freely.

Certainly it was disappointing to fall victims of Bolton once again after the Cup-final defeat — but spirits are high at Old Trafford.

Bolton Res. 2 v. United Res. 3. 8th November, 1958.

Bolton has never been a happy hunting ground for points for us in the past. However, our last visit turned the tables at last! Bolton's forward line included four forwards with First Team experience, and as we were without Morgans, Pearson and Bradley we must give credit to the young boys who filled the vacancies. They all played good football, and combined with spirit and determination, came out of the match with flying colours.

The game started in a quiet fashion but it was not long before the Reds went ahead. In the 10th minute Hunter scored when his centre was dropped by the Wednesday keeper. Five minutes later Gaskell sent a long clearance up the field which was passed to Brennan who shot past the oncoming goalkeeper into the net. With two goals in the first 15 minutes United were well on top but in the 38th minute Violet put United further ahead and 3 minutes before half time Giles scored the fourth.

In the second half United did most of the attacking. After 60 minutes our boys had five up when Brennan converted a penalty. Three minutes later Sheffield Wednesday were given a penalty.
