WELCOME TO THE CUP FINALISTS

We give a hearty welcome this afternoon to our visitors, Luton Town, who have written a new and happy page in their history by winning their way to the Final of the F.A. Cup at Wembley on May 2nd when their opponents will be Nottingham Forest, and supporters will join us in offering

them congratulations on their achievement. Their best previous record in the Cup was in reaching the Sixth Round which they did in 1932-33, and again in 1951-52.

As a consequence of their successful run in the Cup in which they had three re-played Ties, Luton have a heavy League programme before them, and when the table was made up after the Easter holiday they still had 10 games to play in rather less than a month, sufficient to tax any club's resources.

Our visitors were one of the first clubs in the South to adopt the professional code, and they were elected to Division Two of the Football League back in 1897, but after two seasons they did not seek re-election and returned to the Southern League, and they continued in membership until 1920 when the Football League was extended by the formation of Division Three to which they were elected. In season 1936-37 they won promotion to Division Two as Champions of the Third South, and in 1954-55 came their great day in League football when they won promotion to Division One. In an exciting finish to the season there were three clubs at the top of Division Two with 54 points, and goal average was to be the deciding factor with Birmingham City in first place, Luton Town second, and Rotherham United third.

In our match at Luton on November 15th we were the winners by 2 goals to 1, and the following is the record of our results against the "Hatters" in Division One:—

Here are the Pen Pictures of the Luton Players:—

R. BAYNHAM (goalkeeper)

Birmingham-born Ron Baynham came to Luton's notice when playing with Worcester City, and was taken on to the Kenilworth Road staff in 1950. He made his debut during the 1952-53 season, and became an automatic choice three years later. Baynham played for England three times, against Denmark, Spain and Ireland in 1955.

B. McNALLY (right-back)

Prior to switching back to his present position at Christmas, Brendan McNally had one outing as leader of the Luton attack earlier in the season. An Irishman from Dublin, McNally was with Shelbourne before joining Luton in the summer of 1956. For a time he was kept in the background by the consistency of his countryman, Seamus Dunne, whom he succeeded when the latter was injured almost three months ago.

K. HAWKES (left-back)

Ken Hawkes had to wait a long time for his chance in Luton's senior side, for he was with the club for six years before his big opportunity occurred in December, 1957. He has played in every subsequent League and Cup engagement for the Hatters, and this winter is the last remaining ever-present in the defence. Hawkes hails from Durham, and was signed by Luton from Shotton Colliery Welfare.

J. GROVES (right-half)

The son of a former Portsmouth and Derby forward, John Groves has spent the whole of his playing career in Luton's service, joining them on leaving school. The club's utility man, Groves, who is a native of Derby, has had experience at inside-forward and leader of the attack, as well as in both wing-half positions. He was moved to the right-half berth with great success at Christmas.

S. OWEN (centre-half)

The veteran of the Hatters' team, and the man whose captaincy and high standard of personal performance have done much to ensure the club's success in this season's Cup competition, Syd Owen was signed from Birmingham, his local club, at a small fee, in 1947. In those days he was a wing-half, though within a short time he took over in the middle, where he has become one of the game's most cultured and consistent performers.

D. PACEY (left-half)

A former schoolboy player, who has proved to be the ideal successor to Reg Pearce, who was transferred to Sunderland last season, David Pacey is one of the few local products in the Luton team. He made his League debut on December 25th, 1957, shortly after signing professional forms. A strong, attacking player, he has netted three times in League and Cup this winter.

W. BINGHAM (outside-right)

The only experienced recruit to the Luton staff during the past close-season was Billy Bingham, the Sunderland winger. He has done much to improve the Hatters' front line, with 11 League and Cup goals this term, in which he has missed only one game, when on duty for Ireland. Bingham, who was born in Belfast, originally joined Sunderland from Glentoran in October, 1950.

The Editor's Review AND SPURS' GOSSIP OF THE WEEK

A. BROWN (inside-right)

More than any other member of the Luton side, Allan Brown will be thankful that the club has reached the Cup Final. The reason is that injury twice precluded his appearance there while he was with Blackpool. The powerful Scottish international from Fife first came to the front with East Fife, from where he joined Blackpool, at a fee of about £25,000 in 1950. He moved to Luton in February, 1957. Brown has netted 17 times in League and Cup games this winter.

R. MORTON (centre-forward)

The most successful of the five centre-forwards tried by Luton this season, Bob Morton is best known as a top-class wing-half. A native of nearby Aston Clinton, Morton is an England "B" international, and has been on reserve for the full national team. He signed professional forms for the Hatters in 1946. This term, in which he has missed four games, Morton has scored six times.

G. CUMMINS (inside-left)

George Cummins has re-established himself as a regular member of the Luton attack this season, after making only 15 senior appearances last winter. Born in Dublin, he was with Everton before being transferred to Luton in 1953. An Eire international, Cummins, who, at his best, has few peers as a scheming type of inside-forward, has five goals to his name this term.

A. GREGORY (outside-left)

An ex-England Youth International inside-forward, Tony Gregory is a native of Luton. Like Cummins, he has settled down this season after several previous spells of first team duty, chiefly at centre-forward, without managing to create much impression. Gregory has operated on the left wing since the Third Round Cup-tie with Leeds United at Kenilworth Road on January 10th.

G. TURNER (inside-forward)

A Yorkshireman from Doncaster, Gordon Turner signed professional forms for Luton on release from the Navy in 1950. Normally a prolific marksman, and the club's leading scorer in each of the past five completed seasons, Turner has not been able to hold down a first team place recently. He showed a welcome return to form last week, however, with two goals against Chelsea.

S. DUNNE (full-back)

Like Brendan McNally, the man who has taken over from him, Seamus Dunne was with Shelbourne, the Irish club, before he joined Luton in 1950. Capped many times by Eire, Dunne, who hails from Wicklow, is making a determined effort to win back the first team place at right-back which he occupied with such distinction for a long time before dropping out through injury at Christmas.

T. KELLY (centre-half)

If, as is his avowed intention, Syd Owen retires at the end of the season, it is likely that Terry Kelly will take over from him at centre-half. With limited opportunities Kelly has shown considerable promise in the past. Another local product, who was signed from the Vauxhall Motors' works team in 1951, he can also play in either wing-half position should the necessity arise.

BURNLEY HERE ON WEDNESDAY

Make a note that we shall be playing Burnley here next Wednesday, April 8th, in a re-arranged League match which was originally down for April 22nd. This has been brought forward to next Wednesday to avoid clashing with the International match between Wales and Ireland. The kick-off on Wednesday will be at 7.30 p.m.

OTHER FIXTURES

Next Friday evening, April 10th, on the eve of the England v. Scotland International match, the Metropolitan Police will play the Edinburgh Police on our ground, kick-off at 7.30 p.m. Tickets for numbered and reserved seats are now obtainable for this match at 7/-, 4/- and 2/6.

Our Reserves who play at Fulham to-day will have three mid-week Combination matches in April, all of them at home. Cardiff will be our visitors on Thursday, April 23rd, and the matches with Leicester City and Luton Town have still to be fixed.

The "A" Team to-day are at Lowestoft in the second replay of the Eastern Counties League Cup. The first leg at Lowestoft resulted in a win for the home club by 4 goals to 1, and in the second leg we levelled the scores by winning 3-0 at Brookfield Lane, Cheshunt.
