CANADIAN JOURNEY, Part 7

Friday, June 5th—and we were installed in the Royal York Hotel in time for lunch—quite a place this. We had stayed in many first-class hotels since first passing through Toronto and saw no reason to doubt the proud claim that this was still the largest hotel in the British Commonwealth. Our party's share of the 1,700 bedrooms was on the tenth floor—with a magnificent view out over Lake Ontario.

The size of these lakes never ceased to impress itself on our minds—we could well have been gazing out across a mighty ocean with smoke slicks drawing their punctuation marks across the horizon. The big steamers are beating inland from the sea—its rolling billows now two thousand miles astern, exchanging greetings with the crossing grain ships thrusting seawards—five hundred miles of sailing put behind them clear from the twin railhead ports of Fort William and Port Arthur.

Canal engineers have made this possible—a joint effort between Canada and the United States has linked the lakes and opened up the very heart of Canada to ships of every nation. This enterprise is rightly named—we have the Panama Canal, the Suez Canal, but this is greater, this is no "canal", truly it is "The Seaway".

A tremendous amount of capital has been involved, and many Canadians we talked to were worried that Britain was not putting in as much as they might—they pointed to their shops—where British goods were on display—to their streets, where British cars abound—to their clothing stores where British textiles were on show—to these and many more evidences of trade with the "old country". They felt this money would prove a wiser investment used for Canadian development rather than simply flowing back to Britain—but in ice-cold fact, for every five dollars earned by Britain in Canada we buy from them eight dollars worth of Canadian exports.

British capital, we feel sure, will be poured into Canada, indeed we go so far as to say must be poured in when available, for here is the richest undeveloped country in the world.

We had seen much of Toronto and took the opportunity to relax a little—sunbathing on the shores of Lake Ontario or crossing by ferry to stroll in the sunshine on the picnic grounds of Centre Island. It seems strange now to look back on the sunshine in Canada—here in England in early October we are, or rather were, still waiting for the autumn rains, whilst over there snow has swept across the golden wheatfields and prairie lands from far south across the "Forty-ninth parallel" in the mountains of Wyoming and Colorado—snow to a depth of three feet has fallen on standing crops lost for ever. This is one problem our farmers are not faced with at harvest time, and one they are doubtless happier without.

The game at Toronto was our third fixture with Dundee, and when they flew in from U.S.A. both sides were entertained to dinner by the Toronto Football Association. As usual—speeches of welcome were made and replied to—and the Canadian F.A. made a presentation to the Dundee team. Readers will perhaps recall that Albion

had been so honoured in Winnipeg. The Dundee party was a little more restrained than on the last occasions we had met, and we felt they had it well in mind to show us that seven-goal defeat in Vancouver was nothing like their true form.

The kick-off was set for 8.0 p.m., and as the evening approached the mercury in the thermometer began to fall a little, giving promise of more bearable "soccer conditions". Our team was: Potter; Williams, S., Williams, G.; Robson, Barlow and Drury; Hogg, Burnside, Allen, Kevan and Jackson, and promptly on time the match was under way.

Dundee's good intentions were soon to "gang agley", since the match was virtually won in the first fifteen minutes. In five minutes Allen accepted a Burnside pass to score—two minutes later Burnside accepted an Allen through ball to beat Brown easily. At nine minutes Hill caught two of our defenders politely leaving the ball to each other, and pulled one back, but Dundee's hopes of revival were "scotched" when the ball, swept beautifully from Barlow to Allen out on the left wing, on to Burnside racing through the centre, and Albion led 3-1.

There was no further score in this half, but three minutes after the break, Burnside scored his hat-trick goal when Brown failed to hold a shot from Jackson. Dundee fought hard and Hill reduced the arrears just before the end, but all the play was at the other goal, and Albion ran out winners 4-2.

Next morning we shook hands with all our Toronto friends. One of our hotel room neighbours—an old lady of around eighty, had showed a little interest in us, so Dick Graham and Alan Everiss stopped by to have a "little chat" before leaving. Mrs. Mason, as she proved to be, told us she had lived in this hotel, up there on the tenth floor, since it was built—for many years she had been a widow, and saw no one outside the hotel staff. What a coincidence—we found she had been born in West Bromwich, a Miss Salter, one of the Salter family so closely concerned in the formation of the Albion club back in 1879. It had been many years since she had talked of her home town she had left with her husband so long ago, to make his fortune. We said goodbye regretfully, as Mrs. Mason shed us a tear or two to remember—and once more we were off to the airport.

We were bound for Ottawa, the capital city of Canada. Ottawa lies about two hundred and fifty miles to the north and to the east, and our Viscount had us there within an hour. No British side has been in Ottawa since the war, and we were surprised at the warmth of our welcome, stepping down from the aircraft steps into a wildly enthusiastic band of soccer followers and their wives, offering us sightseeing tours in their cars, and invitations to join them for meals and parties.

As was our custom, we closed ranks, whilst our officials thanked everyone, and begged to be excused until we had checked into our hotel, after which we would be at their disposal.

True to their words, our hosts drove up at the appointed time, led by their Chairman, Mr. Alf. Hanwell, and we left the Lord Elgin Hotel to see the sights.
