



Luton come to Old Trafford with a new confidence. Although they are bottom dogs in the First Division, they took full points from top-of-the-table Tottenham last week at Kennilworth Road.

But last season it was lucky Luton for Manchester United who beat the Hatters at Old Trafford for their first win in ten matches. The Reds won 2-1 and then went on for their undefeated run of twelve games. Luton were United's turning point.

Violet and Charlton were United's scorers with Cummins replying for Luton. The teams then were:

United: Gregg; Foulkes, Carolan; Goodwin, Cope, McGuinness; Bradley, Quixall, Viollet, Charlton, Scanlon.

Luton: Baynham; Dunne, Hawkes; Morton, Owen, Pacey; Bingham, Turner, Brown, Cummins, Adam.

Luton playing personalities include:
Ron Baynham (goalkeeper).

Has been with the Club since 1951. Secured from Southern League Club, Worcester City. Has represented England on several occasions including their matches versus Denmark in Copenhagen, Ireland and Spain. Played for the Football League versus the League of Ireland on two occasions and also for the England "B" team versus the Yugoslavia "B". Was a member of the F.A. Touring team to South America last close season.

Seasmus Dunne (right-back).

Born in Limerick, Eire. Came to Luton from Shelborne F.C. in May, 1950. Has played for his country on numerous occasions and recently took part in their International versus Poland.

Alan Daniel (left-back).

A part-time professional player who recently came into the first team when Ken Hawkes had influenza. Son of Melville Daniel who gave the town fine service in a variety of positions immediately after the war. Before moving to Luton with his family, he was playing for Bexley Heath and then became a regular member of the Bedfordshire Youth Team.

Bob Morton (right-half).

Local born. Has been with the Club since 1948. Played for England "B" versus Switzerland "B" team, the Football Combination versus the Dutch XI (on two occasions) and



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also for the Football Association versus the Army. Was chosen as reserve for England versus Ireland at Wembley in 1955 and again when they played Ireland in 1958. A brilliant wing-half who has made numerous appearances at centre-forward, in fact played in this position in our F.A. Cup Final.

Allan Brown (right-half).

A Scottish International secured from Blackpool for a five figure fee in February, 1957. Has been extremely unlucky with injuries, missing two Cup Finals whilst with Blackpool and a further Cap against England in April, 1958. Joined Luton as a forward but has recently been playing at right-half with success. This is the position in which he started his playing career.

Terry Kelly (centre-half).

Born in Luton. Kelly played for Hitchin Town and Vauxhall Motors before joining the Town in 1950. Was a deputy to Syd Owen for many seasons. A very strong player who holds his own against most centre-forwards.

David Pacey (half-back).

First signed for the Club in August, 1956 whilst doing his National Service. Since his demob he has made exceptional progress and received his first honour when selected to play for the F.A. versus the R.A.F. in October, 1958. Has been a regular member of the first team for some time although has missed several games this season through injury. Was a member of the England "under 23" team which travelled to Italy in the last close season.

John Groves (half-back).

Son of Arthur Groves, the old Derby County inside-forward. Won Derbyshire Schoolboy honours and signed by Luton when only 15. Plays either inside-forward or wing-half. Has captained the side since Syd Owen's retirement.

Billy Bingham (outside-right).

Luton paid their highest ever fee for this player from Sunderland during the close season of 1958. Is a shining light of his country's forwards and has played in every international match for his country (Ireland) since he was first chosen in 1952.

John Kilgannon (forward).

After having him watched several times the Town paid quite a substantial fee to Second Division Scottish Club, Stenhousemuir in May, 1959. He showed such promise that he made his League debut in the home match with Blackpool on 25th April, 1959.

Manchester United's reserves are stealing all the thunder at Old Trafford these days. And with a tally of 16 goals from their last two games, it's hardly surprising!

It's no shock now to find United heading the Central League table either. Their recent form suggests they are going to stay there for the rest of the season.

The Reserves beat Bolton at Burnden Park 7-1 and then last week at Old Trafford hammered nine in against Chesterfield. Even though the whole team have been playing splendidly, I understand Mark Pearson has still managed to shine the brightest of all. He capped recent fine displays with six goals against Chesterfield.

Alex Dawson has also been among the goals and is now the club's top scorer with 20 goals - 18 for the reserves, one against Real Madrid when he came on as a substitute for Albert Scanlon, and one against Bolton.

This last goal looked likely to be the most important of the lot because it seemed all set to bust a ten-year-old Bolton bogey.

Not since the 1949-50 season have United won at Burnden Park. It was a grim but exciting game with the

defences on top until Alex Dawson broke through after seventy-four minutes to score from Dennis Viollet's headed pass.

With the assurance of their goal behind them, United played their best football of the game, but they still could not stop Dennis Stevens snatching the equalizer in extra injury-time with just seconds to go.

Although it seemed cruel luck, a draw was really a fair result in face of Bolton's lively attacking, particularly early in the game. Ray Parry showed the kind of form that earned him his place for England against Ireland.

The most heartening display in United's team came from Ronnie Cope who played with all his old confidence and skill.

The second round of the F.A. Cup will be played on 5th December. There is a big local derby for Cheshire fans with the tie between Stockport County and Crewe at Edgeley Park.

There's a Lancashire derby with Oldham travelling to Bury.

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
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A matter of interest

CLUB Comments

Britain's Soccer slump has been hitting the headlines with almost monotonous regularity in recent months and so it is very pleasing to report here that Manchester United's gripping performance in that eleven-goal Spanish run-out ten days ago gave English football a much-needed shot in the arm.

In a country where football is recognized as an art and attracts countless thousands to the various stadiums every Sunday, United's red-blooded display could not have come at a better time . . . for all international matches are widely reported in Spanish newspapers that devote half their available space to the country's No. 1 sport.

In fact, bull fighting has to rely upon the tourists for at least fifty per cent of its cash customers - as do the theatres and night-clubs who made a specialty of staging Andalusian dancing and music, because the locals talk only of last Sunday's Soccer match or the one that is to come.

These facts became apparent during United's visit to Madrid and the day-to-day plans of the whole party were given great prominence in the local press. America is spending literally millions of dollars in this sun-drenched country and so a visit from President Eisenhower next month is of immense political importance - but United and the decision that Berasaluce would be Real Madrid's substitute goalkeeper merited nearly five columns in one newspaper and Ike's trip a mere thirty lines and a picture!

Overwhelming is hardly the word to describe the welcome that the

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frank and always friendly Spanish officials handed out to the party; staggering is the only way to describe the lavish hospitality.

United's first visit of the trip to the Santiago Bernabeu Stadium attracted a large gathering of club members - and quite a few Real Madrid players, including Alfredo Di Stefano, the fabulous Didi, wing-half Antonio Ruiz and the unfortunate Alonso, who is unlikely to keep goal again for the Spaniards after making a good recovery from a serious chest complaint.

Di Stefano, reputedly a millionaire, was very interested in Johnny Giles. He knew that the youngster had won a "cap" for Ireland after only two senior games for the Reds - what did I tell you about the overall football coverage in Spanish newspapers? - and quickly singled him out for special praise when I chatted to this brilliant player when the training session came to an end.

Di Stefano and Didi were also interested in Albert Quixall, who unwittingly gave them a demonstration of his famous ball-on-head balancing act; the dynamic shooting of Bobby Charlton and, finally, the likely United line-up the following evening.

The game itself was one I am convinced the Reds would have won, but for the biased control of the French referee. He awarded two extremely doubtful penalties to Real, gave them a goal when Mateos was clearly five or six yards off-side and his general control left much to be desired from any point of view.

Finally, at the banquet that followed a memorable match Senor Santiago Bernabeu, Real's veteran President, paid a fine tribute to Mr. Busby - "the greatest man I have ever met in football" - and to the team and officials.

United Res. 9 v. Chesterfield Res. 0.

With the game barely three minutes old Lawton put United into the lead. Pearson added a second five minutes later and further increased the lead from a Lawton pass in the fifteenth minute. United could have been excused if they had taken things easy at this stage but Morgans increased the lead in the twenty-fifth minute after taking a pass from Pearson. Half time 4-0.

United who were giving a wonderful exhibition of football added two more to the total with two well-taken goals by Pearson in the sixtieth and sixty-first minute. Not content with these goals however, Lawton added a seventh after sixty-eight minutes and Pearson brought his own personal tally to six with two well-taken goals in the eighty-first and eighty-fifth minutes. Except for sporadic attacks which petered out in mid-field the Chesterfield attack did not have many chances and throughout the game Gaskell was never severally tested. Over 7,000 spectators greeted the final score of 9-0 with the acclamation it deserved.

The surprise defeat of the Juniors at home by the Y.M.C.A. is the highlight of this week's results. There was no fluke about the Y.M. boys' victory for they played well and deserve full credit for a great performance. In beating Bury the "A" settled the issue at the head of their supplementary section and now await the outcome in Section B where Merseyside looks likely to provide the winners with Liverpool strong favourites. With no further supplementary games played in the last fortnight the "B" are still in need of the two points that will make it a club double.

7th November, 1959.

United "A" 3 v. Bury "A" 2.

We were soon in command in this game at the Cliff, Chisnall netting in 3 minutes from McMillan's pass. Although further goals always looked likely to come our way it was Bury who next found the net, Stott following up to take an easy chance after Briggs had failed to hold his first shot. The lead was soon restored, Bolton heading home a McMillan centre. United continued to hold the advantage but failed to increase their lead due to weak finishing and paid the penalty for this when, against the run of play, Bury again got on terms, Woodward appearing to handle the ball before going on to score. Having matters very much their own way in the second half the "A" found Bury defending strongly but midway through

the half Moir cut in to collect a left-wing centre to get the decider.

United "B" 1 v. Burnley 0.

The "B" made heavy weather of collecting these points at Padgham. They missed a number of easy chances whilst the woodwork came to the rescue of the home team on several occasions. A 0-0 draw at the interval was certainly a travesty of justice and Burnley took advantage of their good fortune to put in some strong attacks after the resumption. Surviving this early spell of pressure we again assumed command, but when the winning goal came it was a streaky effort, a shot by Poole being deflected into the net by a defender. Although the home team fought hard for an equalizer in the late stages our defence held on to their advantage. It was symbolic of the game as a

Gordon Turner (inside-forward).

Came to Luton as a wing-half upon his demobilisation from the Navy in 1950 but found his true position at inside-right. In season 1953-54 he broke the Club's individual goal scoring record since their promotion to the Second Division with 37 goals. Represented the English League versus the Scottish League in October 1955, and also played for the F.A. XI versus the Army in 1958.

George Cummins (inside-left).

An Irishman born in Dublin. Cummins first crossed to sign for Everton in 1950 and it was from the Merseyside Club that Luton secured him for a big fee in 1953. A brilliant ball player. He has already played for Eire on many occasions, including their matches with Luxembourg, Norway, Yugoslavia, Spain, Denmark, Poland and Czechoslovakia.

Tony Gregory (forward).

A local product who played for Bedfordshire's Youth team, earned youth caps for England and was also a member of Bedfordshire's team in Southern Counties Amateur Championships. Has made many appearances in our First team and was also playing at outside-left in the Cup Final team. Now doing his National Service. Has also played centre-forward on quite a number of occasions.
