CLUB NOTES

WARMTH IN DECEMBER?

THE month of December has come in on a critical note and clearly we have to fare better than in either October or November to ease the situation by the New Year.

But although the City may be said to be in low water, they are far from sunk yet.

At least another five clubs are keeping us company in the danger zone, including our visitors this afternoon, Luton Town.

They, like ourselves, enter upon the mid-month of the season—not such a busy one by the way as some Decembers in the past—conscious that any slip can have vital consequences.

Open Struggle.—And, conversely, fortified by the knowledge that to strike a winning note might mean the inspiration towards a revival—and new hopes.

So it's really still a very open struggle. Only two points separate the last four clubs, three of which, including ourselves, are on the same mark.

The margin between the bottom club, Luton, and the club five places above it, is no more than five points. So with five months still to go, and more than half the programme left, it's a case of anything can happen.

That does not mean any false illusions as to the severity of the task ahead. It's going to be very, very tough. But the goal of safety still remains to be striven for.

We are given the chance today to strike an important blow, when entertaining comrades in trouble, from Luton.

Then and Now.—Defeat in the last three matches has left us one point to the bad compared with this time a year ago. And December happened to be a comparatively kind month in the City's 1958-9 story.

Two wins and a couple of draws out of the five matches caused Leicester League stock to rise. But only to fall again in the New Year—until that exciting last-ditch recovery.

How often this season we have had to accept decisive adverse blows almost immediately after a phase when our own hopes were running high!

It happened again in the last home

match, with Fulham. In a close contest, when owing to some sterling defence on either side, scoring openings were few and far between, we had the big opportunity to take the lead.

Before the Blow.—For once the Fulham goal, usually so efficiently packed at the slightest sign of danger, was gaping wide open. But only for the ball to end up literally shaving the outside of the post.

Within a matter of seconds of that palpitating let-off, the Cottagers were in front, thanks to an opportunist goal by their outside-left, Trevor Chamberlain. And stayed there to the bitter end.

Bolton Wanderers, whom we visited a week ago, had not lost at home since Arsenal went to Burnden Park, early in September, and won by an only goal scored in the second half. But nothing humiliating from this defeat. It could even have been very different but for Eddie Hopkinson being at the top of his England goal-keeping form.

One thing on the credit side is that the forwards did play with better design than against Fulham. They created a respectable number of scoring openings.

But, of course, it's one thing making openings—and quite another taking them.

Cup Draw.—Next Monday brings some diversion to the sustained tension of League soccer. It's the day for the draw for the Third Round Proper of the F.A. Cup, when what is left of the minnows go into the mythical hat with the better-known First and Second Division contestants.

Last season, we were twice given ground advantage by the draw. It was some consolation for having to travel in each of the two previous years. But did not avail us a great deal. We went out to Luton, one of the two Finalists.

When a club has a big job on in the League, controversy often gets rife whether a run in the Cup is help or hindrance.

But in the City's case there has been no falling between two stools. In fact, it's been the reverse. Twice the club has won promotion in the same season when in the last eight for the Cup.

Colin Appleton

LEFT half-back was the position COLIN APPLETON filled in his school's soccer team and although he has come a long way since then it still remains his favourite role.

A native of Scarborough, Colin played for the local schools in English Trophy games and was only 15 when he first turned out for Scarborough Town, as an amateur in the Midland League.

It was Reg. Halton, one of his predecessors in the Leicester City left-half berth, who first turned Appleton's footsteps in the direction of Filbert Street. Halton was Scarborough's player-manager when the bigger clubs began to show interest in Colin.

On Halton's advice, Appleton came to Leicester for a trial and his signature as a part-timer, early in 1954, was the result. Not many months later the Scarborough lad was playing in First Division football.

"I was following my trade as a joiner at the time," says Colin in recalling this exciting milestone of his career, "and used to go to the ground for lunch. Imagine my surprise when I chanced to look at the notice board, giving the team to play Manchester City next day, and saw my name there. I could hardly believe my eyes for a time. You see, up to then, I had played only three or four times for the City Reserves."

Since becoming a Leicester player, Appleton has performed his National Service and represented the Army many times on the soccer field. With team-mate Howard Riley, he was also a big force in the Royal Leicestershire Regiment's soccer and cricket teams.

One of Colin's biggest disappointments was when he learned he was a "possible" for an England "B" tour, but did not make the trip. He has plenty of time for his turn to come. His chief hobby is, of course, woodwork. Now that he is a family man, he should find it exceedingly useful.

OUR VISITORS — LUTON TOWN

TO-DAY'S tense struggle for vital League points is inevitably tinged with memories of Cup-tie thrills.

That heart-throbbing moment, for instance, when Jack Lee headed the equaliser with literally the last gasp, to make the phenomenal 5-5 score, at the end of 120 minutes of fluctuating fortune.

Without doubt, that was the greatest drama we experienced on our way to the Wembley Cup Final of 1949.

Strangely enough, almost exactly ten years later, Luton had almost as close a shave, with a late equaliser at Filbert Street that enabled them to realise the much-cherished ambition of playing in the Final.

Like ourselves, Luton were not destined to win the Cup on that occasion. And also like ourselves, they are now preoccupied in staving off the danger of relegation.

Last season brought the third time in which the two clubs have been paired in the Cup and Luton were, naturally, glad to be able to wipe something off the slate.

In 1949, we beat them 5-3, after the historic 5-5 draw, and in 1956 won 4-0 at Luton.

FACING A BOGEY.

But the Town are still faced with a bogey at Filbert Street, where their only success to date was in the improvised League South competition of the season immediately after the war.

League rivalry between the clubs actually began as long ago as 1896, followed by a gap from the turn of the century to 1946.

Since World War Two, the Bedfordshire men have made ten visits to us in search of League points, before today. Seven of these have ended in their defeat and they have drawn on the three other occasions.

When Luton gained promotion to Division 1 in season 1954-5 it was a case of squeezing in. Birmingham, Luton and Rotherham all finished with the same number of points and the first two went up by means of better goal averages.

This, however, is the first time Luton are finding themselves having to struggle to stay there.

THE PLAYERS.

ALAN COLLIER (Goalkeeper). Called upon as England international Ron Baynham is on the injured list. Alan comes from the nearby village of Markyate and joined the Luton ground staff after leaving school.

SEAMUS DUNNE (Right back). Born in Limerick (Eire) and came to Luton from Shelbourne in May, 1950. Has played for his country on numerous occasions.

ALAN DANIEL (Left back). A part-time professional recently promoted to the first team. He is the son of Melville Daniel, who gave the Town fine service immediately after the war. Before moving to Luton, Alan played for Bexley Heath.

JOHN GROVES (Right-half). Syd Owen's successor as captain of the team. John is the son of Arthur Groves, the old Derby County inside-forward, and first attracted Luton interest when playing for Derbyshire schoolboys.

TERRY KELLY (Centre-half). Native of Luton. Played for Hitchin Town and Vauxhall Motors before joining the Town in 1950.

DAVE PACEY (Left-half). Is a native of Luton who played for Hitchin Town before signing for the Kenilworth Road Club in August, 1956, whilst doing his National Service. He was a member of the England "Under 23" Team who travelled to Italy in the close season.

BILLY BINGHAM (Outside-right). Luton paid their highest-ever fee to Sunderland for this winger during the close season of 1958. Has played in every international match for Ireland since being first capped in 1952.

BOB MORTON (Inside-right). A local-born player who has been with the Town since 1948. Has twice been chosen as reserve for England and also played for England "B". Also given many fine displays for Luton as wing half-back.

ALLAN BROWN (Centre Forward). Scottish international secured from Blackpool in February, 1957. Injuries caused him to miss two Cup Finals with Blackpool and a further cap against England in April, 1958. Joined Luton as a forward but has recently returned to the half-back line in which he started his career.

JOHN KILGANNON (Inside-left). Signed from the Scottish Second Division club, Stenhousemuir, early this year and soon after made his League debut for Luton.

TONY GREGORY (Outside-left). Local product, who has also played at centre-forward. Earned youth caps for England and also figured in Bedfordshire youth and county sides before becoming a professional.

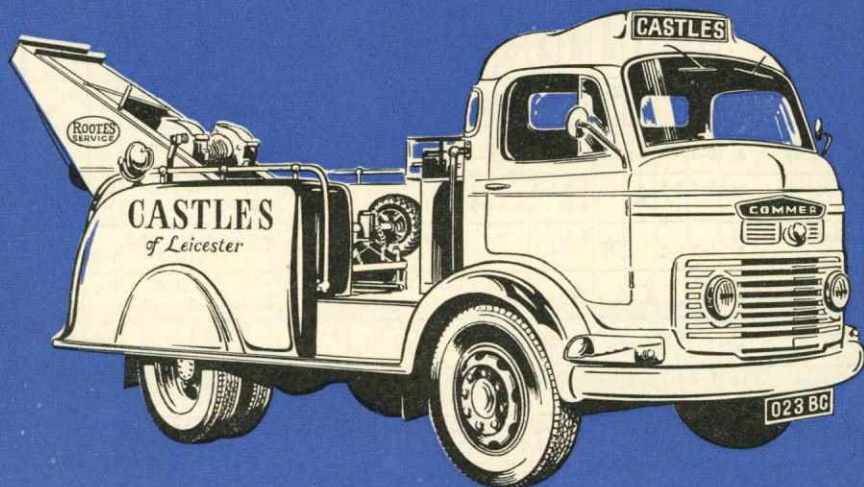
