THE season's Cup hopes for Nottingham Forest, the holders of the trophy, founded at Bramall Lane last Saturday, when we went down to the Yorkshire side by three clear goals.

We take this opportunity of congratulating Sheffield United on their victory and wish them good fortune in their progress in future rounds. On the day, there was no doubt at all that victory went to the better team.

Of course we are keenly disappointed that we aren't to enjoy a good Cup run this season and, if not equalling last season's success, at least staying in for

a couple more rounds; still, that's the way this game of ours goes. To have continued success in soccer the chances must be taken as they come, and, as we know from our experiences in league matches this season, good finishing hasn't by any means been one of our strong points this term.

Every ounce of determination, skill and energy is demanded now of everyone concerned with City Ground affairs for the big task which now lays ahead of the club—to maintain First Division soccer for the City and for Nottingham Forest by climbing to a position of safety in the table in our remaining 14 games.

A point per match at least must be our target, and to-day, meeting improving Luton Town, we are presented with an ideal opportunity of taking the first steps to safety in a match that is worth four points to either club in actual fact.

Luton are certainly on the up-grade—if their recent record is any criterion—for they have had only two defeats in their last eight league games and have lost only one of their last six matches (two cup and four league), and they have also scored 18 goals in their last eight league games.

Without a league home win for ten weeks (since November 28th v. Leeds United) our loyal supporters certainly need a win to give them something to cheer about, and we sincerely hope that to-day's game—with all respect to our visitors—will prove to be the tonic we are all looking for.

INTRODUCING our VISITORS

THERE must have been very few of the spectators present on October 11th, 1958—when Luton Town were last at City Ground—that imagined they were watching a Cup Final rehearsal between the two clubs who were to eventually reach Wembley.

The crowd of 30,187 who saw our win of 3—1 voted this to be the best game seen at City Ground last season; incidentally, our goals came from Dwight, Wilson and Gray.

In May, when we met in London in the Final, few of the 100,000 present—including officials and players of both teams—could have dreamt that in the short space of nine months both clubs would be meeting again in what could prove to be the most vital match of the season for either club.

Both ourselves and Luton have had a dismal season in the league, but Town have shown a gradual improvement in recent weeks—only two defeats in their last nine games—and visit us having lost only one of their last five away games. The "Hatters" also, at long last, seem to have found their shooting boots because they've notched 19 goals in these last nine games.

Their league record to date is: (Home) Leeds United 0—1, Manchester City 1—2, Bolton Wanderers 0—0, Forest 1—0, Wolves 1—5, Chelsea 1—2, Burnley 1—1, 'Spurs 1—0, Preston North End 1—3, Newcastle United 3—4, Everton 2—1, Fulham 4—1. (Away) Blackpool 0—0, Everton 2—2, Fulham 2—4, Manchester City 2—1, Sheffield Wednesday 0—2, West Ham United 1—3, West Bromwich Albion 0—4, Birmingham City 1—1, Manchester United 1—4, Leicester City 3—3,

Arsenal 3—0 and Leeds United 1—1. They have played one match less than us—their away game with Bolton being postponed on January 16th.

Formed in 1885, when two existing Bedfordshire clubs—The Wanderers and The Excelsiors—amalgamated, they first joined the Southern League but became members of Division Two of the Football League in 1897. They lost this status in 1900 and it wasn't until 1920/21, when they gained admittance to Division Three, that they got back into the League.

They were champions of this division in 1936/37—one year after being runners-up—and, after the war, gradually made progress in Division Two until

they were promoted, as runners-up, in 1954/55. Although they had twice reached the quarter finals of the F.A. Cup (in 1933 and 1952) they had never been in the semi-finals or final until last season.

It's unfortunate that their manager, Mr. Syd Owen, should see his team struggling at the foot of the table during his first year at the helm (he retired after leading his side in the Wembley game); he was also voted "Footballer of the Year" last season—just reward for many years of loyal service to his club.

RON BAYNAM

One of the Division's poorest supported sides at home—the average attendance last season was only just over

19,000 (the lowest in the division)—this season's highest attendance at their Kenilworth Road enclosure (where the ground record is 30,069 made in the cup game with Blackpool in March of last year) is 22,909 for the visit of Wolves. Away, it is the "gate" of 40,572 at Old Trafford for their game with Manchester United.

The club's scoring record is a total of 55 goals scored by Joe Payne in season 1936/37 in Division Three—the same year that he set up an all-time league record with ten successes in one match (Luton v. Bristol Rovers in 1935/36). Luton also set up the league record score for the division that afternoon with a score of 12—0.

Their leading scorer in the league this season is Ireland's winger, Billy Birmingham, with 11 goals, followed by Allan Brown with five.

It's interesting to note that in their nine previous visits to City Ground (two in this section) they have scored wins on only two occasions (1947/48 2—1 and 1954/55 5—1), the other seven games all being won by us. At Luton we have only won once and drawn once in the same number of games. There's been no drawn games as yet between us here at City Ground.

Still keeping an excellent goal for Luton is former England player RON

BAYNHAM, who started his career with Worcester City. Birmingham born, he played for England v. Denmark, Spain and Ireland in 1955.

At Wembley the backs were BRENDAN McNALLY and KEN HAWKES, respectively, but both have been in the reserve side this season, although the former—injured in the Final—only played his first competitive match of the season two weeks ago; he's an Irishman from Dublin. Hawkes is Durham-born, was previously with Shotton Colliery and joined Luton in 1953.

Last Saturday's Cup game at Huddersfield saw Luton fielding Eire International SEAMUS DUNNE, formerly with Shelbourne, who has been with the "Hatters" since 1950, and ALAN DANIEL, the 5ft. 11in. Kent-born youngster who has been making fine first team progress in the full-back position.

JOHN GROVES is still—as he was at Wembley—the first-choice right-half; he's been at Luton since he left school. A native of Derby, he is a more-than-useful centre-forward too. Replacing Manager Syd Owen at centre-half is TERRY KELLY, who is locally born and used to play for Vauxhall Motors; Terry can play at wing-half too. On his left is Young England selection, DAVID

PACEY, who gained first-team recognition in 1957—after a spell with Hitchin Town—and is one of the country's foremost young defenders. He too played in the Cup Final.

Danger-man BILLY BINGHAM occupies the outside-right berth; this former Glentoran and Sunderland player is an extremely fast and skilful winger—as witness his goals tally this season—and has had the distinction of playing in every Irish International match since 1952!

Inside-right last week was GORDON TURNER, the Doncaster-born "goal-poacher," who, since he joined Luton several seasons ago, has always figured high amongst his club's and the league's scorers, but he hasn't had the same sort of success this season so far. The centre-forward position is held by former Blackpool, East Fife and Scotland inside-forward, ALLAN BROWN; played 14 times for his native country did this Fife-born player who, because of several injuries causing him to miss further honours and vital Cup games, is generally regarded as one of the game's unluckiest players.

BOB MORTON, a loyal club-man if ever there was one, sacrificed the chance of a "cap" at wing-half in the interests

of his club when they desperately needed a centre-forward a year or so back was at inside-left last Saturday. Luton has been his only professional club.

He displaced key ball-player and Dublin born GEORGE CUMMINS last week. Cummins joined Luton from Everton in 1953 and he's represented Eire ten times since that year.

The outside-left position presented a problem for Luton for most of last season, but TONY GREGORY hasn't let them down whenever he has been included (his two goals were mainly

responsible for the defeat of Everton and he notched two more against Arsenal). Locally-born, he too started his career with the Luton firm, Vauxhall Motors.

Luton took a plunge into the transfer market last week and bought—for a reputed fee of £8,000—a 17-year-old Scot, HARVEY MacCREADIE, from Accrington; he had been attracting much attention (including our own) with his goal-scoring efforts for the Lancashire club, but, of course, Luton may feel he lacks the necessary experience for to-day's big game.

Another recent acquisition for Town has been the signing of former England

amateur International from Crook Town, MIKE TRACEY, who combines soccer with the law (he's a solicitor in London). He's a fine inside-forward who could make as big an impression in the professional game as he has done in the amateur sphere.

Twelve months ago, on Saturday, January 24th, 1959, a new ground record was set up here when 42,236 onlookers saw our Third Round F.A. Cup replay with amateurs Tooting and Mitcham United. This is the highest attendance we have ever had in a match against opposition not from the Football League.

Odd coincidence is that it's almost two years ago to the day that another record was created when the visit of West Bromwich Albion for a Fifth Round replay saw 46,477 attending on January 29th, 1958. This figure is an all-time mid-week cup record for City Ground.
