



COMMENT . . .

Although United lost at Southampton it was only by a penalty goal awarded for a foul by George Dalton on O'Brien and it was ill luck indeed that they did not save the match. They played well enough in the second half up to goal but lacked finishing power.

One hard drive by Ken Leek was handled but the referee did not see the incident and had he done so then United would have had a penalty kick chance to equalise. The defence once again, this time with Bill McKinney for Dick Keith, did all that was expected. The two Georges Heslop and Dalton were in great form. Talent spotter for the England Under 23's former Wolves player and England captain for many years Billy Wright was delighted with the young United pair and it looks certain that they will be honoured.

The big problem is to restore the goal scoring potential of the team.

Against First Division defences last season they were ever amongst the goals. This term they seem fated not to repeat their success. It is a major problem that must be solved without delay.

Let us hope that the line on duty this afternoon can click into gear and bring back lost confidence. The players have the ability and must not be disheartened by past results. They should certainly gain full spoils from Luton

and unless they do so then they will find themselves having to struggle from the relegation fears even in Second Division football.

Len White played for the Central League side in an endeavour to restore his confidence and had a good game.

With White back at his best United could well find the lost scoring power.

The reserves are going great guns and it is some time since they held such a high place in the Central League. If they can keep up present form they could well be concerned in honours.



This week's Opponents - Luton Town

A. Ashworth (Inside Forward). The Player who, with Bramwell, joined Luton when Bingham was transferred to Everton. A very progressive player always looking for the ball.

R. Baynham (Goalkeeper). Has been with Luton Town since 1951. Secured from Southern League Club, Worcester City. Has represented England on several occasions. Played for the Football League versus the League of Ireland on two occasions and also for the England 'B' Team versus the Yugoslavia 'B'. Was a member of the F.A. Touring Party to South America.

J. Bramwell (Full Back). One of the two players who joined Luton from Everton when Billy Bingham, the Irish International, was transferred to that Club during the middle of last October. Is a very capable player and we are very surprised he has not been considered for International honours.

R. Cope (Centre Half). Signed from Manchester United just before the opening of the season. Has spent all his footballing career with Manchester United, signing as an amateur with them in 1950, turning professional in 1951. Was an England Schoolboy International. Has made 150 appearances for Manchester United in the First Team.

J. Fleming (Outside Left). Came to Luton from Partick Thistle when we transferred Joe McBride, in November, 1960. Is a very capable player with a tremendous shot and good turn of speed.

J. Groves (Wing Half or Inside Forward). Won Derbyshire Schoolboy honours and was signed by Luton when only 15. Uses his height to great advantage and is a most accurate distributor of the ball.

T. Kelly (Centre Half). Born in Luton. Played for Hitchin Town before joining the Town in 1950. Originally played wing half but was successfully converted into a Centre Half. A very strong player who holds his own with most centre forwards.

B. McNally (Full Back). Can occupy either full back position. Came from the League of Ireland Club, Shelbourne and has been with Luton since May, 1956. Played for Eire 'B' versus Rumania in Dublin in 1957 and also for Eire versus Czechoslovakia.

R. Morton (Wing Half or Centre Forward). Local born and has been with the Club since 1948. Played for England 'B' versus Switzerland 'B' team, the Football Combination versus the Dutch XI (on two occasions) and also for the Football Association versus the Army. Was chosen as Reserve for England at Wembley in 1955 and again when they played Ireland in 1958. Usually a wing half, but has made numerous appearances at Centre Forward.


G. Turner (Centre or Inside Forward). Came to Luton as a Wing Half upon his demob. from the Navy but found his true position in the forward line. Represented the English League versus the Scottish League in 1955 and also played for the F.A. XI versus the Army in 1958. The Town's leading goalscorer for seven seasons out of the last eight. Has a tremendous shot.

H. Walden (Outside Right). Joined Luton from Kettering last January and stepped straight into the first team at Norwich. An elbow injury prevented him from playing in the final weeks of last season, but he is now fully fit.
