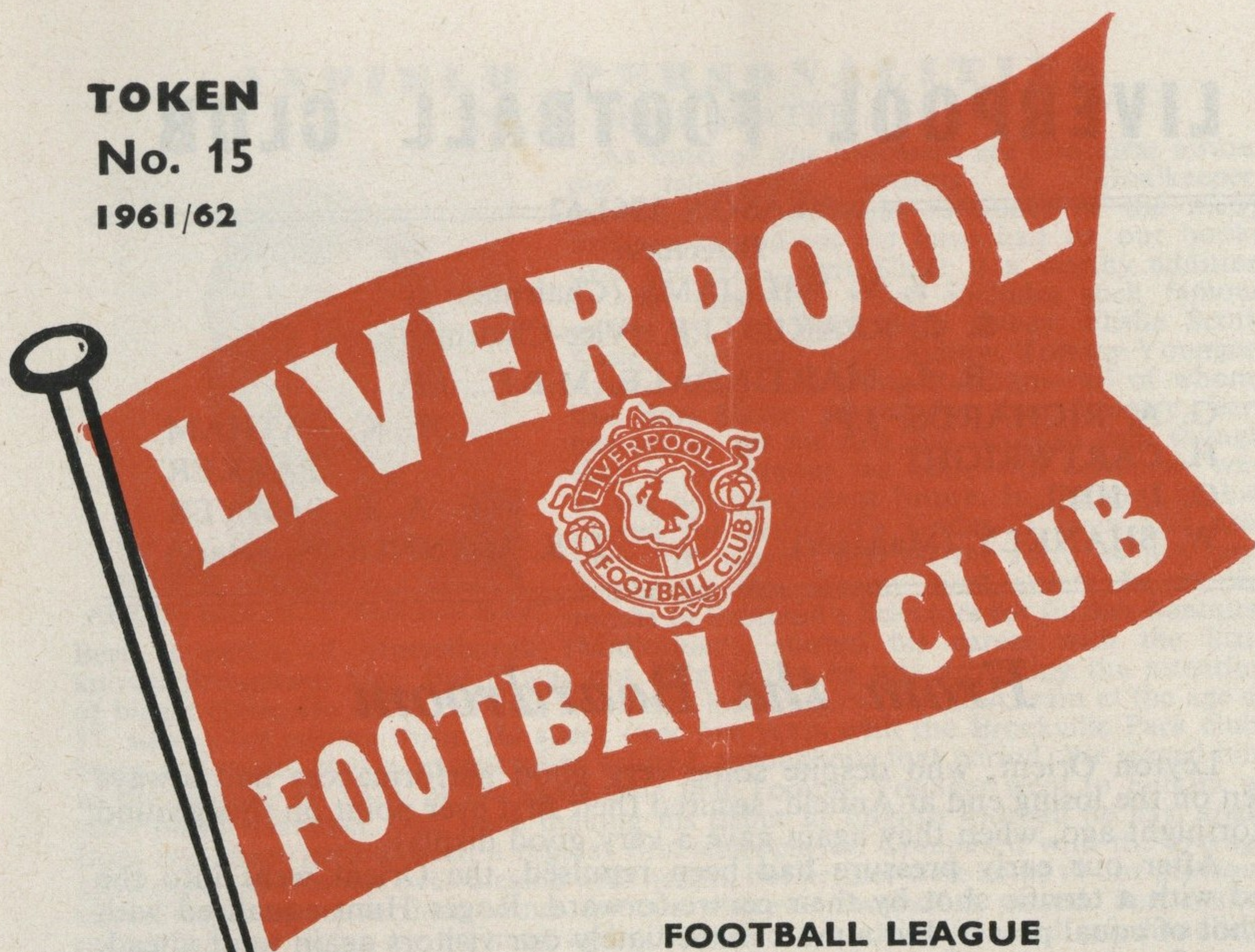

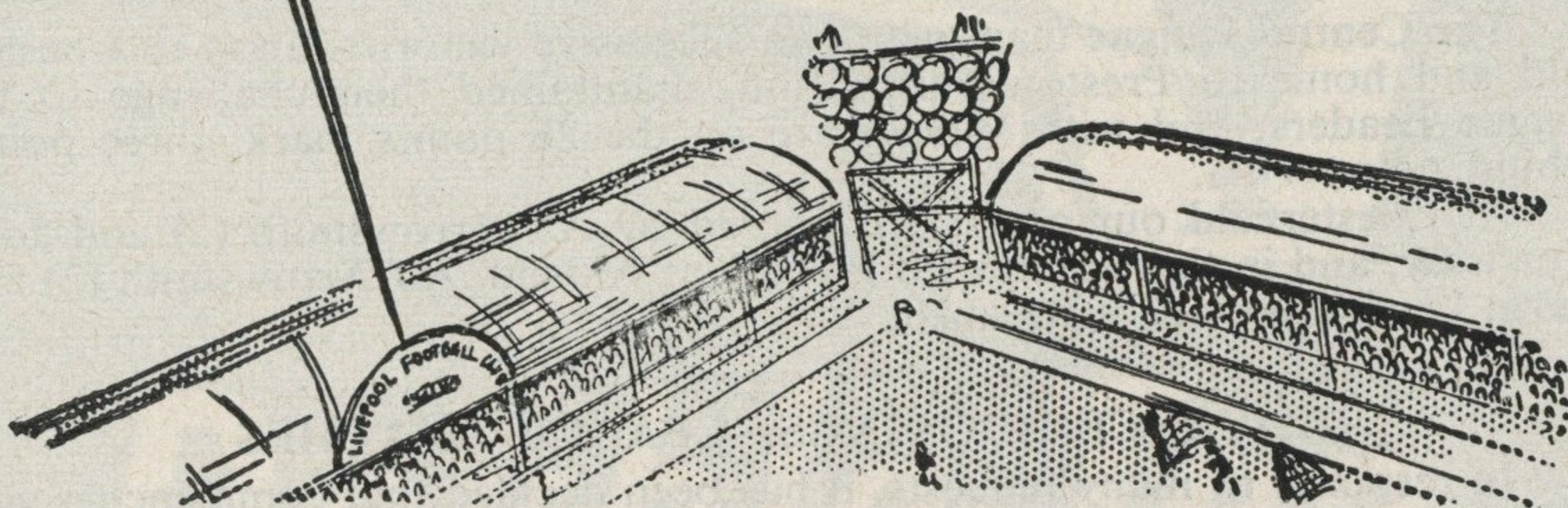

## From the Boardroom

Leyton Orient, who despite some very good performances had always been on the losing end at Anfield, secured their first ever point on this ground a fortnight ago, when they again gave a very good display.

After our early pressure had been repulsed, the Orient went into the lead with a terrific shot by their centre-forward. Roger Hunt equalised with a shot of equal power, but almost immediately our visitors again went ahead. Soon after the restart Roger Hunt again put us on level terms, and after Leyton had scored to lead for the third time, it was only in the closing minutes that we gained equality with a header from Tommy Leishman.

At Preston on Saturday last, our first visit to Deepdale for eight seasons, it appeared that our fans were in the majority, and spurred on by their tremendous support, we gained a comfortable 3-1 victory. Gordon Milne, playing against his former Club, who incidentally is managed by his father, gave us a first half lead. Further goals were secured in the second half by Ian Callaghan, making his first appearance of the season, and Ian St. John, with Preston scoring their lone goal about twelve minutes from the end.

The Central League team with two successive victories, away to Chesterfield and home to Preston North End, maintained their challenge to the League Leaders, and with Wolves are on the 26 points mark, three points behind Aston Villa.

At Chesterfield our goals were scored by Alf Arrowsmith (2) and John Morrissey, and in the match with Preston at Anfield, Alf Arrowsmith (2) and Kevin Lewis were our marksmen.

### No. 6. BERT SLATER

As most of our followers are doubtless aware, our telegraphic address is "Goalkeeper, Liverpool", a constant reminder of the many brilliant custodians we have had on our books over the years. Bert Slater is a worthy addition to that long list, which includes such famous names as Ted Doig, Sam Hardy, Elisha Scott, Kenny Campbell, Cyril Sidlow, Tommy Younger, Arthur Riley and Doug Rudham—all of whom, like Bert Slater, played for their country. Bert has yet to get his first full Scottish cap, though that is an honour we hope will come his way in the not-too-distant future. In the past he has played for Scotland's Under-23 team and also their "B" eleven, and on the form he has been displaying this season must surely be in the minds of Scotland's Selectors for further honours. Bert, a native of Musselburgh (Midlothian), started his career with the little known Broughton Star, but it was not long before he was attracting the attention of bigger clubs. He chose Falkirk, and made his debut in their first team at the age of 17, soon after joining them. He spent over five years with the Brockville Park club, being automatic choice, except when injured, throughout that period. We signed him in the summer of 1959, at the same time that Tommy Younger went to Falkirk as their player-manager, and since making his debut in English football he has, apart from one short period, been a regular first-team player. Compared with the average goalkeeper, Bert is not over-blessed with height, but neither were some of our previous custodians who made their names famous wherever football is played. Bert makes up for lack of inches by amazing agility, wonderful anticipation and safe handling.

## Pen Pictures of the Luton Town Players

**J. STANDEN (Goalkeeper).**—Signed from Arsenal at a fee of about £8,000 on October 28 last year, Jim Standen helped at the time to solve a problem for Luton who a little earlier had lost England international Ron Baynham with a fractured skull. When Baynham was fit again he returned to the senior side, and Standen dropped out. That was towards the end of February, and the former Gunner was not called upon again until early last month, when it was Baynham's turn to be replaced. A native of Rickmansworth, Standen first signed for Arsenal in 1953, and played in 35 First Division games for them before moving to Luton.

**B. McNALLY (Right-back).**—For a long time the right-back berth in Luton's senior side was the almost exclusive property of Eire international Seamus Dunne. Last winter, however, he gave way to his fellow-countryman, Brendan McNally, who quickly established himself as an automatic choice. McNally, a native of Dublin, played for Shelbourne before joining the professional staff at Kenilworth Road in May, 1956. The following year he played for Eire's "B" team, and in April 1959, won a full cap against Czechoslovakia. This season McNally has missed only one League game for the Hatters.

**J. BRAMWELL (Left-back).**—On October 13 last year Everton and Luton were involved in a three-player transfer deal involving the Hatters' Irish international winger, Billy Bingham, who went to Goodison Park, with John Bramwell and Alec Ashworth, plus a fee, going to Luton. Bramwell quickly settled down in the Hatters' rearguard, and has not missed a League match since making his debut for them two days after being signed. Originally a wing-half he joined Everton from Wigan Athletic in 1958, was converted to full-back and had a fairly long spell in the senior side. A native of Ashton-in-Makerfield, Bramwell only lost his first team place at Everton through injury.

**R. MORTON (Right-half).**—The longest-serving member of Luton's staff, Bob Morton first signed as a professional for them in 1946. Born at Aston Clinton, Bucks, he has made his name as a wing-half, though he has turned out in several other positions in attack and defence. Rightly regarded as one of the best uncapped players in the game, Morton's only representative honours have been for England "B" and for the F.A. This season he has played exclusively at right-half with the exception of one outing as leader of the attack three weeks ago.

**R. COPE (Centre-half).**—Ever since the retirement of Syd Owen at the end of the 1958-59 season, Luton have tried to find an adequate replacement at centre-half. Last winter they utilised four players there without completely solving the problem. Now their hopes of a solution rest upon Ronnie Cope, for whom they paid Manchester United a fee of about £15,000 during the close-season. A native of Crewe, and a former England Schoolboy international, Cope signed as a professional for the Old Trafford club in 1952, and made 97 First Division appearances for them. He has missed six League matches for the Hatters this term, due to injury.

**J. GROVES (Left-half).**—A Luton player whose strong suit is his versatility, John Groves spent most of last season in the middle line, in which he filled all three positions. The son of Arthur Groves, the former Derby and Portsmouth player of pre-war days, he was born at Derby. He joined Luton

from school, signing as a professional in 1951 and was given his first chance in the senior side, at inside-left, in April 1954. Groves again started this season at left-half, playing there without a break until a fortnight ago, when he moved forward into the attack again for one match. He has scored one goal this season, in which he is an ever-present.

**J. FLEMING (Outside-right).**—Among the best features of the Luton attack in the second half of last season was the promise shown by 18-year-old Jim Fleming. A Scot from Glasgow, Fleming was signed, at a small fee, from Partick Thistle on November 28, 1960 and was given his first senior game by the Hatters, at outside-left, in the middle of the following month. He made 17 further first team appearances last season, scoring four goals. This winter Fleming has again been a regular choice, playing exclusively on the left flank until a fortnight ago, when he switched to the right. He has netted twice in his 15 Second Division games this term.

**T. McKECHNIE (Inside-right).**—Also a native of Glasgow, Tom McKechnie was signed from a Scottish junior club in April of this year. He was due to make his senior debut for Luton in the opening game of this season, only to miss his chance through injury. His opportunity came a week later, however, and he has subsequently shown considerable promise, as well as plenty of scoring potential. McKechnie, who has played in both inside-forward positions, has scored six goals in 12 League outings, a total which makes him the Hatters' third highest marksman.

**G. TURNER (Centre-forward).**—After missing two games through illness Gordon Turner was back in action for Luton last week, and played a big part in the home win over Leeds United. A native of Doncaster and easily the most experienced member of the Hatters' front line, Turner first signed as a professional at Kenilworth Road in 1950. One of the game's most consistent marksmen, he topped Luton's scoring list last term, for the sixth time in eight seasons. Turner has again been well on the mark this winter, his 14 League matches having brought him eleven goals. In all he has netted more than 200 times for the club.

**A. ASHWORTH (Inside-left).**—Southport-born Alec Ashworth's move from Everton to Luton, along with John Bramwell, in October last year, proved to be highly beneficial for both the player and his new club. Ashworth, who was not able to command a regular senior place at Goodison Park, has been an automatic choice with the Hatters, injuries apart, and this season, in which he has played in both inside-forward berths as well as leading the attack, he is an ever-present. He is also second only as a marksman to Gordon Turner, having scored nine League goals. Ashworth first signed as a professional for Everton in the summer of 1957, made his senior debut for them the following April, and played in eleven first-team games.

**R. LEGATE (Outside-left).**—Five players did duty on the left flank of the Luton attack last season, among them Roland Legate, who played in the last five games, scoring four goals. A native of Arlesey, Legate had a fairly long wait for his chance in Luton's senior side, for he first signed as a professional for them at the age of 17, in 1956. He made his debut on April 8 this year, and kept his place for the rest of the season. Legate did not start this term as first choice and did not play in the League side until a fortnight ago, when he scored a goal in the 4-0 win at Norwich, followed by two against Leeds United last Saturday.



## Welcome to our Visitors from Bedfordshire

### LUTON TOWN HAVE QUITE A GOOD RECORD THIS SEASON

A glance at the Second Division table discloses a state of affairs which has not previously applied for many seasons at this stage of the campaign. Only seven points separate Southampton, our nearest challengers, and Stoke City, who are third from bottom, while there is only three points difference between the Hampshire club and Brighton and Hove, who are in the thirteenth position—and all of those below Southampton have at least one game in hand over the southern team.

It seems a reasonable assumption, unless some club later emerges from the general body of promotion aspirants with a burst of success, that there is going to be a very tight struggle for at least one of the two top places as the season gets still further advanced. Our own fervent hope, of course, is that we can continue to preserve the same comfortable margin between ourselves and our nearest rivals as that which marks our position at the moment. While a good start is said to be half the battle, it is equally true that when any team establishes a lead like ours all the clubs below are doubly anxious for the distinction of lowering their colours. Every game becomes increasingly like a tense and sudden-death Cup-tie, and the strain upon the players grows in intensity.

So far our team has responded magnificently to almost every challenge and will, we hope, continue to do so in the same determined and courageous fashion, so that whatever team may eventually emerge from the pack upon our heels as the most likely rivals, our own lead will be maintained right through to the end.

Our visitors from Luton are in with a very good chance of promotion, and will obviously be exerting every effort today to strengthen their hopes still further. Last season, their first in the lower sphere since they gained promotion in 1955, they could do no better than finish in thirteenth place, mainly because of their disappointing away record. They had to wait until the early part of March before winning their first game on an opposing club's ground and only added one further away victory in subsequent games. Four away games were drawn, giving them a total of eight points. This season they have already won four away matches, but have not had an away draw, the other four having resulted in defeat.

Their away victories have been at the expense of Plymouth Argyle (3-0), Middlesbrough (4-2), Charlton Athletic (1-0) and Norwich City (4-0). The defeats have been sustained at Derby (0-2), Swansea Town (2-3), Newcastle United (1-4), and Brighton and Hove Albion (1-2). The pattern has been somewhat similar in home games, of which five have been won and three lost, with no draw so far. In the League Cup Luton defeated Northampton Town 2-1 at Kenilworth Road, but were knocked out 2-0 by Rotherham United in the second round after a goalless draw at Luton.

Luton manager Mr. Sam Bartram, who will be remembered by our older followers as an occasional war-time "guest" at Anfield, as well as for his long and distinguished service as Charlton Athletic's goalkeeper, has so far called upon the services of nineteen players to fulfil the club's fixtures to date. Two of the three ever-presents in the team are the former Everton players John Bramwell and Alec Ashworth, who went to Luton just over a year ago in part exchange for Irish international winger Billy Bingham. The other Luton player to appear in all their League games is left-half John Groves.

During the close season Luton parted with a number of players who had had varying lengths of service with them. Mike Dixon went to Coventry City; Ken Hawkes to Peterborough United, Mike Tracey to Lincoln City and others elsewhere. Newcomers to the Kenilworth Road staff in the summer included full-back Barry Reed and centre-forward Jack Lornie from Leicester City, Tom McKechnie from the Scottish junior club Rob Roy, and a well-known player in centre-half Ronnie Cope from Manchester United, secured in the hope of filling the gap which had never been really satisfactorily occupied since that great player, Sid Owen, hung up his boots after the 1959 Cup Final.

Sid Owen gave Luton Town wonderful service for ten years and was always a model player, a fact reflected in the choice of the football writers when they made him "Footballer of the Year" on the eve of the Cup Final. The following season Sid Owen took over the management of the club he had served so well, but unfortunately Luton, who had been having something of a struggle in the League even in the winter they got to Wembley, struck a very lean patch—largely because of a succession of injuries—and lost their First Division membership. Mr. Owen resigned his position after this one ill-fated season and took a job on the coaching staff of Leeds United. He was succeeded as Luton manager by Mr. Bartram, to whom reference has already been made.

The most difficult problem which Manager Bartram faced last season was at inside-left, where no fewer than nine different players were tried. The outside-right berth also caused some anxiety after Billy Bingham had been transferred to Everton, and seven players appeared in this position. This season Harry Walden, who made his debut from Kettering last January, was regular choice at outside-right in the early part of the season, but more recently the position has been occupied by Jim Fleming, a Scot from Partick Thistle who has been switched from the outside-left berth.

A year ago Luton also had a brief period of anxiety over their goalkeeping position when Ron Baynham had the misfortune to fracture his skull in a home game against Sheffield United and Alan Collier, normally the reserve team goalkeeper, was also laid aside with a broken arm. To get them out of this difficulty Luton introduced a 16-year-old amateur into their team in Mike O'Hara, an Irish lad from Belfast. Young O'Hara gave a fine display against us in the League Cup second round game at Anfield, which was drawn 1-1, but had not much chance of averting defeat in the replay at Kenilworth Road, where our attack was in great form and played a big part in our 5-2 victory.

Though Luton Town's history goes back to their entry into the Second Division of the Football League in 1898, it really begins mainly with the formation of the Third Division after the first world war. After three seasons in the Second Division in their early days Luton resigned their membership for financial and other reasons, and did not seek to renew it until the Third Division was inaugurated. There they remained until winning promotion in 1937, and then, after eleven playing seasons in the Second Division, they ascended to the top sphere of all at the conclusion of the 1954-55 season. But it was touch and go right to the very last game that winter. At the finish Birmingham City, Luton Town and Rotherham United all tied with 54 points, with Birmingham taking the championship on goal average, and Rotherham failing to get the runners-up position because their goal average was a fraction worse than Luton's.

In their five seasons in the First Division Luton only twice finished in the top half of the table, when they were eighth in 1958 and tenth two years previously. But at least they added a new distinction to the club's record by getting to the Cup Final.
