

## HISTORY LENDS PIQUANCY TO TO-NIGHT'S GAME

TWO hundred and ten minutes of exciting, exhausting football, four goals and a long, long string of frayed nerves among supporters of both sides: whatever Ipswich or Luton may achieve in the F.A. Cup this season tonight's winners have reason enough already to regard this first, vital Third Round obstacle as the toughest.

Nine days ago at Portman Road, the tidy East Anglian home of Ipswich, and again last Wednesday at Kenilworth Road, scene of many dramatic Luton Cup battles, these two sides fought themselves to a standstill . . . and, on each occasion, a 1-1 draw.

Press descriptions of these red-blooded games ranged from: "A typical F.A. Cup tie with . . . rugged football and many thrills" to "This was a tremendous game." The verdict was unanimous.

On form, of course, Ipswich should long since have earned the right to travel to Norwich in the Fourth Round on January 27th. Ipswich, after all, have proved themselves one of the most consistent sides in the First Division since winning promotion last season while Luton, although never a side to be underestimated, have been meeting with modest success in the Second Division.

But—though there is little need for us to re-emphasise the fact here—the Cup does not recognise class distinction. Form means nothing; statistics even less. Famous and unknown, big and small, successful and unsuccessful . . . all meet each other on equal, but entirely fresh, terms in the F.A. Cup.

History, moreover, lends piquancy to tonight's game. Last season, when Ipswich desperately needed every point they could muster to bolster their wonderful promotion bid, they were beaten twice by Luton. And three years ago, when Luton played such magnificent football to reach the Cup Final, they beat Ipswich 5-2 in the Fifth Round.

### A Visit to Norwich

This tie needed one more thing only to complete the picture . . . and last Monday's draw for the Fourth Round at Lancaster Gate provided that the

winners will meet Norwich at Carrow Road.

Fierce rivalry exists between these clubs. Ipswich and Norwich, of course, sit alongside each other in East Anglia—and a Fourth Round meeting between them would contain not only all the ingredients of a Cup tie but those, also, of a local "derby." An explosive mixture indeed!

The rivalry between Luton and Norwich is shorter lived and has different foundations but, nonetheless, burns brightly. It began in season 1958-59 when Norwich, then in the Third Division, swept aside Manchester United, Cardiff City, Tottenham Hotspur and Sheffield United to reach the semi-finals. It looked as if a side which had begun the season as 2,000-1 shot for the Cup, was actually going to reach Wembley.

Alas, they clashed with Luton in the semi-final, and after holding their First Division opponents—Luton weren't relegated until the following season—to a 1-1 draw at White Hart Lane they lost the replay at St. Andrew's, Birmingham, by the only goal of the match.

### Unfinished Business

Norwich have good reason, therefore, to relish the opportunity of a second crack at Luton in the Cup; and Luton are unlikely to forget that Norwich completed the League "double" over them last season. All of which brings us back to the present unfinished business . . .

This is what has happened so far:—

Saturday, January 6th: Ipswich 1, Luton 1. Ipswich took the lead in the first minute through inside-forward Ted Phillips who, together with England centre-forward Ray Crawford, is their leading goalscorer. But Luton's resilience, speed and tenacious tackling unsettled Ipswich and in the 58th minute their own centre-forward Ray Chandler, 17-years-old and a late selection, hit the equaliser.

Wednesday, January 10th: Luton 1, Ipswich 1. Once again Ipswich scored first, left-half John Elsworthy giving them an interval lead. But once again Luton were able to hustle their opponents out of their stride and with only 12

minutes left Dave Pacey moved from his left-half position to equalise with a fierce drive. Extra time was played, but both defences held on . . . and so tonight's second replay became necessary.

Luton, if you insist on heeding the record book, have an immeasurably better Cup history in recent years than Ipswich. It was Luton, of course, who disposed of Ipswich in the Fifth Round in 1958-59, but in the following two years Ipswich failed to survive the Third Round. They were beaten 3-2 by Peterborough in 1959-60 and last season they were thrashed unceremoniously at Southampton by 7-1.

## Reached Wembley

Luton, on the other hand, not only reached Wembley, where they were beaten 2-1 by Nottingham Forest in 1958-59, but have reached the Fifth Round in each season since. In 1959-60 it took the eventual winners of the trophy, Wolverhampton Wanderers, to beat them 4-1, and last season they fell to Barnsley by a single goal.

Ipswich, now managed by Alf Ramsey, the former Spurs and England full-back, were founded in 1880 but did not turn professional until 1936. Two years later they were elected to the League (Division III South) so their rise to their present exalted place in the English League is one of the most stirring stories of post-war football.

Luton, whose manager is Sam Bartram, the former Charlton goalkeeper, have a much longer League history. They were admitted only twelve years after their formation in 1885—although the highest final position to which they have aspired is eighth in the First Division (1957-58).

Tonight's result will not depend, however, on what happened in 1895, or 1936, or last season or even last week. Once the whistle sounds pedigree and form will mean nothing.

They call it the Magic of the Cup . . .
